Gillings To Publish New British Pro.

After 3 years of preparations, Walter Gillings, founder and editor of Britain's pioneer stf magazine, Tales Of Wonder, announces the publication of a new magazine under his editorship.

The magazine will be titled Fantasy. The Magazine of Science Fiction (Temple Bar Publishing Co London, Ltd., 24 Store St., London, W. C. 1). This is not the pre-war British pro Fantasy.

It will be 96 pages, large - pocket size, 2-color art cover; and many interior illustrations. The price will be one shilling and the first issue will be outin December. Stories will be by John Russell Fearn, P.E. Cleator, Arthur C. Clarke, L.V. Heald, S. G. Weinbaum, and a new English writer, Norman Lazenby,

The Weinbaum story will be the first of the Van Manderpootz series which Fantasy is reprinting; not because of any lack of new material, but to indicate what has been done by American writers in the past, and as a criterion for new writers to follow, All the other stories will be new.

The magazine will have a general appeal and will try to present the best stf available in Britain.

Circulation will be limited by the paper available in England to new publications. Because of the restrictions, it is not known how frequently it will appear, though monthly publication was planned.

HAMLING QUITS FANDOM

James V. Taurasi, Editor of Fantasy-Times, received via air-mail, on Ziff-Davis letterhead, an open letter to Fandom.

In 5 single-spaced, small-type pages, Hamling confirmed Palmer's hoax and strongly defended him.

The complete letter will be read at the next meetings of the ESFA and the QSFL. It will also be published in its entirety in the proposed Fantasy-Times Annual

Following are a few excerpts from Bill Hamling's letter.

Dear Jimmy,

".. I will first of all confirm a rumor featured in your Fantasy-Times, No. 25, claiming that the. Palmer Insanity affair was a hoax It was. It was a hoax which I and Raymond instigated for a big laugh. and we got it ... So out of the clear blue sky came I Remember Le muria by Richard S. Shaver, intro ducing the most astounding theories of them all --- and in Amazing Stories. It is almost a safe thing to presume that if this series had appeared in any other stf pulp, the Shaver stories would have been welcomed with wide-open arms --- as is the policy of fan decisions ... The Shaver Mystery opened up an entirely new field to fandom....But when fans came out (continued on page 2, column 1.)

and say the stories are preposterous, insane and sheer drivel. then I draw the line. Is anything more preposterous than the situation as presented in Colossus? Is anything more insane than the science presented by Doc Smith ... in his novels?...It isn't that the fans hate Shaver, but that the fans hate Palmer. The very same Palmer who has gone out of his way to contribute to the fans whonever the situation made it possible to do so, Romember the Nycon? Romember the Chicon? Who sponsored the affair in Chicagowho contributed cold hard cash to all the fans He contributed stacks of original covers and interiors that had cost Amazing Stories \$7,500 ... At every meeting of groups of fans, somebody always gets up and spiels for an hour or so on the horror of the Shaver Mystery, and then a motion is made to go on record en masse against the Mystery. And then what happens? The vote is in a majority against the motion. And how does fandom explain that? The answer is very simple. It isn't the Shaver Mystery the fans hate -- it is Ray Palmer, and anything he does... This is the strange paradox of juvenile minds that exists in the so-called "fan" world today nothing has changed except a few names on the fan rosters. Mine is gone, and I'm glad, I had sense enough to realizethat it was a futile effort to try anything constructive as a fan...I'm sorry to have to say this. I'm sorrier than you can imagine. But every word I've said is the truth and you know it their action against Ray Palmer is nothing short of stupidity The greatest mistake the fans evor made with their dealings with a professional house, they made with Ray Palmer and Amazing Stor-ies. Whether you believe it or not, the fact remains that Amazing Stories, and its companion, Fantastic Adventures, are the

leaders in the stf field today. The Shaver Mystery, true or untrue---and what difference it makes I fail to see--will continue to go on, more and more. This is only the beginning. As usual, the fans, and the minority they represent, have missed the boat. It is lamentable, and a shame. But knowing the fans as I do, it is nothing but what one would expect..."
