MODEL KIT REVIEW:

REVELL: BABYLON 5'5 STARFURY 5A-23E

This long awaited model kit was eagerly opened and scrutinized from the beginning. It's hard to tell how accurate the kit is from the brief glimpses off the TV series, but the decal options are a delight to ponder. There are four different ways to decal the model:

- 1.) President Santiago's escort craft with two different painting schemes
- 2.) Bester's top secret Black Omega
- 3.) The Sea Witch, a commonly seen Starfury
- 4.) Lt. Comdr. Ivanova's Starfury from the "Ghost Riders" fighter squadron

The assembly can go very rapidly if you don't care for detail and just want to put it together fast. However, if you want a sharp looking model you will have to take your time, use lots of putty, and be patient with this one. The first obstacle will be the poor fitting pieces, gaps galore (1-3 mm). They show up too easily and look the worst of all the problems encountered. There are wing gaps, the lower inner wings don't quit touch the body, again leaving large gaps (1-3 mm). The upper laser cannons are difficult to keep in position, while fitting the upper inner wings into place, it takes a bit of work to get them in between the wing bases. The cockpit canopy also has..., you guessed it, gaps.

The exterior decals have great detail and add the perfect touch to the finished kit. There's a decal for the interior, however, when finished it can't be seen from the outside. Revell should have made a decal for the panels on either side of the pilot instead. I painted these panels with florescent colors, this will light up the interior, when under a "black" light. The decals leave an off-white color after they dry and the adhesive doesn't keep the decals on very well, I had to use some decal set to keep mine in place long enough to give them a final coat of clear dull coat paint.

Overall this kit was a breeze to put together, it required a lot of putty work to make it appear as if it could fly in outer space. But in my experience, an overall poorly made kit with little of the quality that is normally associated with the Revell name, a real disappointment.

STILL SLIDIN' ON


'Sliders', the alternate worlds series created by Tracy Torme and Robert K. Weiss seems to have as many lives as the proverbial cat. After three seasons on Fox the show becomes the Sci-Fi Channel's premier hour long drama with a season of 22 new episodes beginning June 8.

A special Sliders Night hosted by Jerry O'Connell opens the new season with a half hour behind the scenes special on the making of the series, followed by the season three finale 'This Slide of Paradise' and two new episodes 'Genesis' and 'Prophets and Loss'. Sliders Night will run from 7:30 PM to 11 PM EST. The show's regular slot is Monday at 9:01 PM and 1:01 AM EST.

Fans are optimistic about the new season; new producer and writer Marc Zicree has writing or story credits on five episodes. Jerry O'Connell contributed one story, which will be one of two episodes he'll be directing. The new season includes an episode set in a pro-drug culture, but it is not based on O'Connell's story for Acclaim Comics 'Narcotica'. Several leading SF authors have been approached about, or expressed interest in, submitting scripts for a possible fifth season including David Gerrold, Joe Haldeman, Harry Turtledove and Dorothy Fontana.

This years Dragon*Con includes a Sliders programming track for the first time, and it is hoped that members of the cast and crew will be appearing as guests at the convention; see the Sliders track section on the Dragon*Con webpage at http://www.dragoncon.org for further details.

Lost In Space

I have fond memories of being a child and watching re-runs of the 1960's series Lost In Space. While though the series was not top



notch Science Fiction, it did originally attempt to bridge a gap between the genre and family viewing audiences.

This spring, amongst all the other retro TV/cinema revival films, New Line Cinemas has once again made the Robinson Family Lost In Space. This effects-heavy film casts William Hurt as Prof. John Robinson and British Indy sensation Gary Oldman as fellow shipmate/nemesis Dr. Zachary Smith.

The premise is that Prof. Robinson and family are selected to take a 10 year trip to Alpha Prime. Once there, the Space Family Robinson would construct a Hyper-Jump Gate to help colonization from Earth. With wife Maureen (Mimi Rogers), daughters Judy & Penny (Heather Graham & Lacy Chambert) and genius 10 year old son Wil (Jack Johnson), the Robinsons begin their exploits normally with pilot, Major Don West (Matt LeBlanc).

Things go crazy when terrorist Dr. Smith unwillingly finds himself a stow away aboard the family's "space camper", The Jupiter II. The Robinsons and Major West are nearly all killed after Dr. Smith re-programs the ships resident sentinel, The Robot. From here, the Jupiter II is warped blindly across the known galaxy to save its crew.

Now the story really begins. There are few aliens encountered, but the ones that are, definitely are not Ewoks or E.T. While the main story of the film begins here, it probably should end here as well. Akiva Goldsman, who wrote and produced Lost In Space also lends a credit to writing last summer's

lack-luster, Batman & Robin. It shows in LIS. This film borrows too many Star Trek cliches'.

Several cameos are made by cast members from the original TV series. Look for spots made by June Lockheart (Maureen Robinson), Mark Goddard (Major Don West), Marta Kristen (Judy Robinson) and Angela Cartwright (Penny Robinson). Dick Tufeld (original Robot voice) even lends his voice to act as that of the new Robot (who gets several cool make-overs throughout the film).

I feel the two biggest slights in casting were the absence of Bill Mumy (Wil Robinson) and Jonathan Harris (Dr. Smith). Both have been staunch supporters of doing convention/media appearances for the original show. Bill Mumy of course has even continued in the genre', portraying the Minbari Lenier on Babylon 5.

For great computer effects and a decent nostalgia factor, check this out at least once. My only warning, make it a matinee showing and save your money. My vote, 2 1/2 stars.


Georgia Filkdom is Putting on a Convention!
