

CONFESSIONS OF A NEW BABYLON 5 JUNKIE

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I confess. I deliberately did not watch Babylon 5 when it first aired several years back. I had just started a new job and was involved with my fan friends, only seeing them at Bill & Caran's for New Year's Eve. During the second season when Bruce came on, it was harder to ignore, but somehow I did so.

My re-entry into fandom began at the party celebrating the end of the Olympic year and the start of 1997. The conversation had turned to the internet (how amazing). I was toying with the idea of eventually getting an e-mail account at Life, so I solicited a few e-mail addresses from long time friends who were technologically "with it". When I finally get an e-mail account in May, I contacted a few people. One message led to another and I found the Dragoncon website. Shortly thereafter I am again on Staff, getting re-acquainted with old friends, authors and TV shows.

When the good news broke late in 1997 that *Babylon 5* would have a fifth season, I had a dilemma: start watching the new season and play catch up with the previous episodes - or delay beginning Season 5 until I plowed through the first four? I watched the two special movies, and began watching the rebroadcasts at 7PM. Well, this would take forever. Luckily, an original, diehard *Bab 5* fan (Avery), came to my rescue. He lent me his entire collection of episodes, along with written season guides from the Internet. Now, when I have nothing to do (and often when I have something else to do), I sit down and watch 1 or 2 episodes.

Avery said I *could* start watching the new season after War Without End I & II, but I've decided to wait. I should be caught up in a couple of weeks. What's 8 or 9 episodes unwatched, after 80-something? Sometime in April I'll have my life back - just in time to finish (start?) my income tax.

Some days my universes get crossed. One Sunday I watched two *Deep Space 9's*, 2 *Babylon 5's* and one *Stargate*. The aliens currently tormenting Captain Sisko and company look related to some who where mouthing off to Commander Ivanova early in Season 4. I wish my brain would do better at remembering details of all those shows. "Trekkies" were lampooned for maintaining total recall of every episode ever made - quite a feat nowadays. I find many *Babylon 5* fans who remember particular episodes better than I do, and they watched

them three years ago. I just saw them a month ago! I guess my mind seems the think remembering my students and the problems with their accounts and registration is more important. I know I've got lots of unused room up there - maybe I need to be de-fragged.

We went to Perimeter Mall March 14 to see the Babylon 5 exhibit. As we arrived after 2PM, we missed the new Captain, and the lines were already huge to meet Jerry Doyle. We got a close-up look at him, while chatting with friends up at the front of the line. He seemed flattered by the turn-out, and amused by the display. There were a couple of uniforms, (including Ivanova's post-secession gift from Delenn), various weapons, and other props. The quality of the props was pretty was pretty high-the weapons in particular didn't look like cereal box toys.

The realism of all production aspects of the show is quite impressive. The aliens are top-notch, the sets and "pseudo-sets" are magnificent, and the ships and fighting scenes...probably the best on television. Even my cat can't take her eyes off the screen during a big battle. She especially appreciates maneuverability of the White Star fighters.

I'd like to discuss the characters a bit. My favorite is probably Susan Ivanova. I'll miss her when I begin fifth season. Besides her obvious qualities - leadership, wit, bravery, loyalty, compassion, she is extremely human and vulnerable. As the joke goes, for someone named Christian, Claudia got the Jewish angst down perfectly. I've been trying to modify that part of my genetic code for decades. My family came from Ukraine, hers lived in Russia - same roots.

The episode where Theodore Bikel (great casting) played the family rabbi was poignant for me. I never had any training in Judaism - my parents weren't into organized religion, so I didn't have quite the same dilemma Susan did when her father died. We didn't even have a funeral for my father, let alone sit shiva. My sister and I buried cremains under a tree in a park near our childhood house. This was what he wanted. The part that got to me was how Susan dealt with grieving (or not) for a father with whom she had a rocky relationship. I found that what I missed was not my actual flawed father, but the father that he might have been had he worked on his problems.

Delenn is a fascinating female character. She is



so powerful, focused, courageous and strong in her beliefs, but new at "human" relationships. I love watching her and John Sheridan as their romance develops. Such challenges!! Not only do they 50 or so steps they have to take to satisfy Minbari tradition, but one or the other of them keeps getting dragged off to be tortured. Maybe we shouldn't complain when our partners have to work late.

I was relieved in a way that I did not get to speak with Jerry Doyle at the mall. At the time I was furious with Garibaldi for being such a jerk. The next night I found out why. The why was, of course Bester. It's always interesting to an actor you remember in one role portraying a totally different type of character. Both Walter Koenig & Bill Mumy had this opportunity to live down their 1960's personas. Poor Chekov - when he was too old in the movies to simply be cute he was mutilated by alien ear mites or splattered on nuclear wessels and threatened with brain surgery. Many of grew up watching Bill Mumy trying to keep a straight face in the campy, yet addictive TV series Lost In Space. I have my doubts about the upcoming movie going the serious drama route. That's why I want to see it at the Fox - if the movie is movie is bad, at least we'll get to see Ted & Jayne and the stars on the ceiling.

Bill Mumy's Lennier and Stephen Furst's Vir are my favorite second tier characters. Maybe I empathize with them working for challenging mentors. In Lennier's case he is apprenticed to a near Goddess whom he loves, but knows he will never have. I don't relate to that part, but I enjoy watching the interaction between the two. Vir works for an erratic, emotional, prideful and not always trustworthy boss. Been there, done that. Vir survives by holding on to his values and keeping his sense of humor. I think he will be Centauri's best emperor, if he has any subjects left alive to rule.

As of this writing, I have three episodes left to watch in Season 4. In a few weeks I won't have to leave the room when the discussion turns to the new season. I suspect I'll shell out some bucks for some Babylon 5 goodies at DragonCon. I may not be one of the original fans, but I'm now as die-hard as any of you old timers. It's never too late to discover a true masterpiece.
