Ken Poskey arranged the newly produced club T-shirts on a table near the entrance for everyone's perusal.

Chair Ian Letendre called the formal meeting to order at 2:26 p.m.. In attendance were 12 officers, members and others. Three new attendees were present, and brief introductions were made.

In Old Business, Ken stated that club T-shirts were now available in sizes M through 2XL. Members may purchase shirts for \$4.00; no price has been set of non-members. Mention was made of BarbequeCon, and intentions for another event in 1999 were stated. Acting secretary Lewis Murphy made the treasury report.

In New Business, the deadline and submission guidelines were given for the newsletter. 'Zines received in exchange for our newsletter will be made available to the

The July meeting will take place on Saturday, July 4th at the home of Vice-Chair Regina Kirby. The meeting will include a potluck dinner/cookout.

Upcoming conventions were discussed. Former Chair Randy Cleary and Regina Kirby will be attending Deep South Con, and will promote the ASFS there through various publications and word-of-mouth. A motion was made, and carried, to purchase chocolate snacks for the Bucconeer/ WorldCon staff, with the ASFS's compliments. Regina Kirby, who will be attending WorldCon, will handle the chocolates. Flyers and sample newsletters will also be distributed at WorldCon. It was decided a breakfast social would be hosted by ASFS at Dragon\*Con on Saturday morning. Regina Kirby offered to obtain food for the event. Lewis Murphy reported meeting with Ed Kramer, who assured him that the club would have programming space at Dragon\*Con for the September meeting.

Anne Brungaard volunteered to handle club meeting programming. The nomination passed unanimously. Already scheduled for the August meeting programming is SF Pictionary, with B5 prizes awarded to the winner(s).

In other business, Michael Liebmann made attendees aware of the new Dragon\*Con Christmas ornaments available for \$6.00. Aaron Dunne informed the membership that Monarch Computers will donate systems to be used at Dragon\*Con, which would be offered for sale after the con at substantial discount. Regina Kirby proposed a group viewing of the X-Files movie to take place on the Saturday afternoon following the film's release. Aaron Dunne reported on the recent Vulkon convention. He stated that Joe Motes, the con organizer, was soliciting advice from fans on how to improve Vulkons. Numerous suggestions were made for Aaron to take back to Mr. Motes. Lewis Murphy mentioned that the club received several e-mails asking if the ASFS had a writing critique group. Several in attendance were interested in forming one, and a sign-up sheet was provided.

Ian had to leave the meeting due to a domestic medical emergency; Regina presided over the remainder of the meeting.

Bill Bevil offered to make a vinyl banner for the club, using the logo and font, to be used at meetings and conventions.

Regina adjourned the meeting. Attendees mingled at the library for a few minutes, several then went to Fado's for food and drink.

3. Make sure there are enough plot holes to make fans need to watch the television show next season to fill them in. I do not mean cliff-hangers but huge plot holes.


4. Hype it up. Use clever trailers to get people interested. Milk that chocolate cow so you can earn excellent profits.
