


# ASFS future Times

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The ASFS Future Times is the official publication of The Atlanta Science Fiction Society, a gathering of aficionados of the Science Fiction and Fantasy genres (in all media). ASFS meets the first Sunday of every month at 2:00 p.m. Meetings consist of a formal business meeting, followed by a program item (guest speakers, videos, group discussion, etc.), each lasting approximately one hour. ASFS produces a club newsletter, containing local items of interest, reviews, artwork and news of upcoming events. Other activities include dinners, film premieres, and attending area conventions. Dues are \$12.00 per year, to cover the cost of the newsletter, programs and activities. The ASFS Future Times is published monthly. Subscriptions are \$12 annual/\$1 per issue or trade.

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July 4, 1998

The July meeting of the Atlanta Science Fiction Society was held on Saturday, the Fourth of July at the home of Regina Kirby (and spouse). The date was changed from the traditional first Saturday of the month in order to have a holiday cookout.

Chairman Ian Letendre called the meeting to order at 4:18 p.m. There were 10 members, and several other interested parties, in attendance.

In old business, the treasury reported the additional dues for 3 new members. The dates and location of upcoming meetings were reviewed. Ken Poskey reported that club T-shirts were still available. Chairman Letendre reminded members that a vote on the Society by-laws is scheduled for the August meeting. Members are asked to make suggestions/ amendments at that time.

In new business, the deadline for the August issue of *Future Times* was given, along with submission guidelines. Lewis Murphy reported on the establishment of the club lending library, making fanzines and other publications available to paid members for one month at a time (from meeting to meeting). The library will be maintained by Lewis Murphy


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and Javne Rogers. Former Chairman Randy Cleary donated a copy of the Southern Fandom Confederation Handbook to the lending library. A list of upcoming conventions was reviewed. Regina Kirby will use club funds and donations to provide a gift of chocolates to the staff of WorldCon in Baltimore. Flyers and newsletters will also be taken. Chairman Letendre reported on his discussions with Ed Kramer regarding ASFS hosting a breakfast at DragonCon. It was determined that a separate breakfast was not possible, and ASFS may provide a breakfast as part of the Con Suite. A final decision was tabled until the idea could be discussed with the DragonCon consuite director. The scheduling of the September meeting as a program item at DragonCon was also discussed. Input was provided by John Tackett, the convention's programming director, who was in attendance at the meeting. Copy for the program book will be written by Lewis Murphy. Chairman Letendre mentioned expanding the lending library to include books. It was discussed by the membership. Randy Cleary recommended using the club a network to locate books, rather than having a standing library. No final decision was made. pending further discussion. This ended new business, and the meeting was opened to the floor.

Lewis Murphy proposed approaching the Science Fiction and Mystery Bookshop about providing members with a 10% discount in exchange for advertising in the *Future Times* and other general publicity. The idea met with general approval, with others suggesting genre related businesses which could also be approached. This led to mention of the need for club membership cards. Michael Leibmann offered to work on a card design.

Ian Letendre proposed making some type of book donation to the Buckhead branch of the Fulton Co. Library, as a sign of appreciation for use of their meeting space (and as a contribution to overall literacy). This met with overall approval of those in attendance. A final decision was tabled until details could be worked out. At approximately 5:00 p.m., the meeting was adjourned.

### InConjunction Review

InConJunction was held over the 4th of July weekend at the Marriot in Indianapolis. This year there was a special pre-session writers' workshop with the "Kris and Dean Show" (Kristen Kathryn Rusch and Dean Wesley Smith). This was an intensive presentation on the ins and outs of the publishing business. The sessions on Thursday concentrated on the mechanics of writing saleable commercial fiction. while the sessions on Friday concentrated on the business side of a writing career, including dealing with agents, sales figures to know, and the basics of living on a writer's budget.

The Friday session overlapped the setup and first few sessions of the convention itself, so I had the enjoyable experience of hurrying to help unload dealers' stuff, then running to the workshop, then running back to help in the dealers' room, as well as getting my art checked into the Art Show.

The con suite was good as always, with a generous supply of snackies and pop. There were a few parties on Friday evening, but they were pretty disappointing, unfortunately. There was a Babylon 5 party and a couple of publicity parties for other conventions.

On Saturday I spent most of my time helping in the dealers' room, although I did get out for two panels by Vincent DiFate on art and the business of art. I also checked on my art, and discovered that one of my pieces had actually sold.

Immediately after the dealers' room closed for the evening, it was time for the art auction. Although I didn't have any pieces on it, I always enjoy seeing what things go for. However this year people weren't spending that much and there were very few bidding wars, none particularly heated. This matched what I saw in the dealers' room.

There was only one party that evening, so after supper I spent the time before bedtime working on a novel.

On Sunday there wasn't that much activity, other than getting my art checked out of the art show and helping in the dealers' room. Then it came time to pack up everything, say final good-byes, and head back home.

"Well,...no.", tentatively says one of the two designers that Leary hasn't



fired with the take over. 'I want them to do that!' says Leary and that's where the fun begins.

The other designer had come up with a idea for a set of monster toys, that even though they look weird, are meant to be nice, sweet and educational. Leary says that the Commando Elite need enemies to fight and promptly elects the monstrous looking Gorgonites. He also says he wants them on the shelf in 3 months. Forget all that safety testing stuff!

This movie is directed by Joe Dante, who directed Gremlins. If you like those films you will definitely like this one.

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# Lethal Weapon 4: \* \*


The fourth installment of the Lethal Weapon series adds Chris Rock to the cast as a new detective who always seems to be trying to get on the good side of Danny Glover's character, Murtaugh. You find out why shortly into the film, although Murtaugh doesn't until close to the end. Joe Pesci is back as Leo, who has become a private eye and spends a good part of the film trying to prefect his



tailing technique. There is a scene with Rock and Pesci talking about cel phones that is so funny you will be falling out of your seat. Riggs(Gibson) and Lorna Cole (Renee Russo) are having a baby and trying to figure out if they want to get married.

But the real story is that Riggs and Murtaugh try to stop the Chinese Triads from doing their illegal business in the U.S. The Triads (led by Jet Li) & Chinatown's mob boss Uncle Benny, have imported Chinese slaves to pay for an artist to create counterfeit Chinese currency which they will use to buy the heads of the Triads, called the Four Fathers, back from the Chinese military. Riggs & Murtaugh stumble onto the plan by accident but are soon up to their necks in it.

Lots of the action you have come to expect. If you liked the other 3 films, you won't be disappointed with LW4.

# A Statement About the Future of RiverCon



s the end of the millennium approaches, we have decided to retire RiverCon, Louisville's annual science fiction and fantasy convention, after the 25th convention in the year 2000.

After much consideration, this decision was based on two main factors. The first, and foremost, was that we do not wish to continue running RiverCon beyond that time when we can still do it well, and can do it with enthusiasm and fresh ideas. We want RiverCon to end on a high note as a successful and enjoyable convention, not only for the members but also for those running it as well.

The second factor relates to our committee members. We have enjoyed an association with a fine group of talented and dedicated people who have been working on and supporting RiverCon for many years. However, it is obvious that this same group of people cannot continue to run RiverCon indefinitely. Replacing retiring committee members, department heads, and even staff has become increasingly difficult. By establishing an ending date, we have hopefully provided that "light at the end of the tunnel" that will give all our committee members (and ourselves!) the incentive to stay with RiverCon through the very last one.


The RiverCon name and distinctive logo will be retired with the convention. The names "RiverCon" and "NorthAmeriCon" are service marks of the Louisville Science Fiction Association, Inc., and cannot be used without the express written permission of the Association's Board of Directors.

Any group that wishes to begin a new SF convention in Louisville does so with our best wishes. If asked, we will be happy to offer any advice, wisdom, and guidance our cummulative decades have given us. We want to make it clear, however, that any new Louisville SF convention will be completely independent of RiverCon and its present committee, even if there is an overlap of individual members.

We sincerely hope that the many people who have attended and enjoyed RiverCon over the years will continue to do so through the year 2000. We and the RiverCon committee offer our thanks and appreciation to all those who have given us their support and enriched our lives since RiverCon began its long voyage way back in 1975.

For the time being, we invite you to attend RiverCon XXIII, July 30 - Aug. 1, 1998; RiverCon XIV, July 30 - Aug. 1, 1999; and finally, RiverCon XXV, July 28 - 30, 2000.
