The Nature of the Beast

A Column By Ted Skirvin

The Two Roads, The Wood, And The Divergence

This is the second installment of my column and it is related to the first one. Although I will wax philosophic in columns to come, I indicated in the last one that I need to throw a few definitions out there so that there will be a frame of reference.

This time I am going to address that morass of a genre that I find so compelling: Alternate History. Essentially, AH fiction is about history happening in a way that is different than what happened in the real world.

In the typical AH story, history is identical to our own until a certain break point. After that things are different. For instance, Hitler is killed in WWI. Or, Einstein decided to become a concert pianist. Or, Attila ignored the Pope and sacked Rome.

For those stories that deal with multiple alternate timelines, there are basically two paradigms. In one kind there was originally only one universe. As time passed new timelines came into being to embody various possible outcomes of events. The other paradigm is that all the universes always existed separate from each other.

It should be kept in mind that AH stories are not always science fiction. For those that are SF (see my previous column) the advanced technology is usually a device that allows one to travel to an alternate timeline. AH stories that are not SF generally take place only in one timeline. However, it seems the inhabitants often speculate about a timeline that is remarkably like our own.

Okay, enough with the definitions. Here are some future column titles:

Science Fiction: What is it REALLY about?

J.R.R. Tolkien: racist and imperialist or just a racist?



In the summer of 1973, officials from the New Zealand Diocese of the Catholic Church held a meeting to discuss what to do to recruit and keep young people. At this meeting was newly-ordained Father Thomas Leach, who had only recently arrived at the parish from Tacoma, Washington, Father Leach had been watching Star Trek, and was amazed at the bold vision of Star Trek's future, its positive and inspirational message, and its faith in humanity. The only thing he felt was missing was a sense of spirituality: surely, he thought, the Catholic Church would still be around in the 23rd century. While Star Trek hadn't vet reached New Zealand, Father Leach's enthusiasm for the show impressed the elders, and he spoke of his idea of creating a show along those lines which would inspire teenagers and others to join the Church.

Of course, the Church had no idea how to go about doing this, but Father Leach got help from some friends, mainly Dr. P.R. Lenardo, a doctor of theology who was working as a religious columnist for a local newspaper, and Russell Summers, an independent producer who had done some work in Australia. Father Leach, Dr. Lenardo and Mr. Summers worked out a plan, which included financing, and presented it to the Church leaders, who approved wholeheartedly.

For the next year, they worked to sell the show without avail. Their financial backers, a group of local businessmen with ties to the Catholic Church, were just about out of patience when they learned about the creation of a new television station, TV2. The station owners were eager for new material and wrote the show (now titled *Critical Mass*) into their inaugural fall schedule.

The series was poorly received by critics, not so much because of the production values, which for the era and the small budget were excellent, but because it was so obviously a means for the Catholic Church to recruit people. It still might have survived, but New Zealand's television, like the BBC in Britain, is state-run, and an investigation (rumored to have been started by the Anglican Church, the predominant church in New Zealand) revealed the influence of the show and it was forced off the air.

While Critical Mass had a few fans, the series hadn't yet had enough time to reach a solid audience. Only thirteen episodes were made, and (as far as we know) none of the original prints has survived. Home video wasn't widely available in New Zealand at the time, so any copies of the show are nearly impossible to come by.

Sci-Fi Summer is proud to celebrate the 25th anniversary of this little-known show, and we hope to gather as many of the original cast and crew as we can to participate! We'll keep you posted on these events as they occur!


Polaris, North Star For Now

Polaris, meaning Pole Star, is quite an unusual star. Polaris is the nearest bright star to the north spin axis of the Earth, the North Celestial Pole. Therefore, as the Earth turns, stars appear to rotate around Polaris, making it the North Star. Although Polaris is not the brightest star on the sky, it is easily located because it is nearly aligned with two stars in the cup of the Big Dipper, and is the last star in the handle of the Little Dipper.

The north pole of the Earth doesn't stay pointed at a fixed direction in space. Like a wobbling top, the Earth *precesses*, tracing out a full circle, in the sky every 25,800 years. As the Earth's axis slowly turns in space, the position of

space, the position of all the stars as seen from Earth, changes. Polaris is only the pole star at the moment. About 4,600 year ago, Thuban (Alpha Draconis) was nearest to the North Celestial Pole. Our Polaris will reach its closest point to the true north pole in the year 2105, and by 8500 AD brilliant Vega (Alpha Lyrae) will point the way north, at which time Polaris will be an obscure star almost 45 degrees from the pole. During the time when the Egyptians were building the three Great Pyramids, there was no North Star. The first pyramid built was in fact lined up facing North. The Egyptians used two stars that lined up north as their guide. However, by the time they built the second one, they were off by a few degrees, and by the third pyramid, they were considerable off true North. All because they used the same set of stars.



Precession is often called the precession of the equinoxes, since one of its most obvious consequences is the slow progression of the position of the Sun at the time of the equinoxes from constellation to constellation over the centuries. Preces-

sion is both the bane and the guaranteed meal ticket of the positional astronomer.

Astronomers record the positions of celestial bodies in an *equatorial* coordinate system-based on the Earth's equator and poles. But since the poles move with respect to the stars, any position must be qualified by the date for which the position is valid (its "epoch").
