SCIENCE FICTION SITUATION IN GREAT BRITAIN

Conflicting reports of the stiff situation in England have been arriving in Australia for quite some time. In order to clear up any wrong impressions, we, the editors of Futurian OBSERVER, will give below a survey of the British fan and professional field. The information given has been collected from any sources, so if any acknowledgements are due we apologise in advance.

Prior to the outbreak of war, there were two British pro, TALES OF WONDER and FANTASY. The first of these had been appearing quarterly for well over two years and during this time had built up quite a large following. When the war broke out, fears were expressed for its continuance, but these fears were proved groundless when TOW continued to appear, although greatly reduced in pages.

Three have been issued since Autumn 1939. However, it seems as though TOW has gone for good now as Walter H. Gillings has been discharged by his firm for registering as a conscientious objector. Whether a new editor will be appointed is rather problematic. It remains to be seen.

FANTASY was another quarterly which saw three issues prior to the "declaration." Its editor was instantly called up for the air force and it was suspended for the duration. About this time rumours commenced to trickle through of a new British pro. A few words here, a hint there, a hint there and a confidential message somewhere-else, began to piece together into a definite scheme. It now appears that the leading British fan, Ted Carnell, had arranged with a company to issue a monthly pro known as NEW WORLDS (Carnell had a fan magazine of the same name) which would jump straight into the style of style of story used by ASTOUNDING in its peak years under Tremaine. Negotiations continued for a while, but eventually owing to technical difficulties the whole scheme had to be shelved. Carnell, we understand, told the full story in a supplement issued with a recent VoM.

In the fan field, most of the amateur magazines went early because of the editors enlisting. Also the powerful and efficient British Science Fiction Association went into suspended animation thus depriving fans of organised leadership. Nevertheless, a few such as FANTAST, FUTURIAN, SATELLITE, SCIENCE-FANTASY REVIEW continued for a while although their quality began to wane. With the introduction of higher prices of paper, ink, stencils, etc. and the increase in postage, even some of these dropped out of the picture. At the present moment our sole contacts with England are: "The Pseudo-Futurian," "SFR War Bulletin," and "Fantasy War Bulletin".

And there is the level to which British science fiction has been forced. The European conflict is not over and will not be over for a long time to come. What, then, will happen to British fandom by that time? We in Australia can do precious little to aid the Britishers.

We can only wait and see.

REPRINT EDITIONS ARRIVE

Eight months after having been printed limited supplies of the British reprint editions of ASTOUNDING and UNKNOWN have arrived in Sydney. It is uncertain as yet whether copies have appeared in other Australian cities, but reports are expected to arrive anytime now.

The issues released are reprints of ASTOUNDING for August, September, October of 1939 and UNKNOWN for September, October, November, 1939. Though not many fans are buying them for their own collections some are being bought in order to

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(Cont. from page 1.) swap with Americans who may want copies for their collections. Americans who can't get the reprints from England should try Sydney fans for them!

Incidentally, the reprints of "Science Fiction" did not reach us.

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VOL MOLESWORTH has been taken to hospital, a victim of sugar diabetes.. Monsieur Molesworth requests that fans drop him a line to the following address :- c/- Mens' Medical Ward, Mater Misericordiae Hospital, North Sydney. This applies to Aussie fans only...

Finally, visiting hours to the hospital are from 2.30 to 4.0 on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and from 7 to 8.0 on week nights... We hope we have these hours right, Vol!

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SYDNEY CONFERENCE SOON

Some time in November the Futurian Society of Sydney is to be revived. Also in November will the Society celebrate its first anniversary, despite the fact that it has been in a state of suspension since September.

Last Wednesday the editors of OBS paid a visit to David R. Evans, Director of the Society, to find out at what he had relinquished his position. His statement was: "I have no further interest in the Futurian Society. I want nothing more to do with it." However, the purpose of the visit had been to find out what Evans' attitude to a Sydney Conference of fans (to decide of the action of the Futurian Society in November) would be. It has now been decided that the Conference will be held though where and when is not yet settled.

At this conference the first point will be to appoint a temporary Director for the Society. Then will commence the real purpose of the gathering - what the Futurian Society will start out to do in November. William D. Veney has drawn up constitution which he thinks would be the best idea for the Society to adopt. This among other ideas will be put before the fans.

The FSS has lost many of its older members. However, before this happened many of them exposed themselves in their true forms. Much new blood will present at the November meeting and the Society will probably start out afresh and succeed where it formerly failed!
