

The Atlanta Stereo Club – this year's host committee – has done an outstanding job coordinating all the events that will take place over the course of the convention.





Keynote Speaker:

Bob ZellerCivil War Photos and More


Bob Zeller is best known in the 3D world for writing The Civil War in Depth, Volumes One and Two, and being the banquet speaker at the 1998 Richmond Convention. The program for the 2003 Charleston Convention will venture a bit further afield. In addition to some of his great Civil War views, Bob will also present and discuss a selection of Charleston views, Osborn & Durbec views and selected Anthony Instantaneous views of New York circa 1859-1860. Bob was selected as this years speaker because his topic is of interest to 3D photographers and his presentation lively enough that you won't go to sleep when the lights get turned down.

He pioneered the modern presentation of stereoscopic Civil War photography with The Civil War in Depth (Chronicle Books, 1997), the first 3-D photo history of the war. Bob, who is a writer, journalist and historian, spent 23 years in newspaper journalism, specializing in investigative reporting and later working as a motorsports beat writer covering NASCAR. Bob has published seven books, including The Civil War in Depth Volume Two (Chronicle, 2000) and Daytona 500, An Official History (David Bull Publishing, 2001). He is a native of the Washington, D.C. area and has been presenting lectures with 3-D slide shows of original Civil War photographs since 1997. He is one of the leading private collectors of original Civil War photography. Images from his collection were featured at the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery exhibition on Mathew Brady in 1997-98.

Bob Zeller, wet plate photographer Rob Gibson, and the late Al Benson founded the National Center for Civil War Photography in 1999. The mission of the National Center for Civil War Photography is to educate the public

about Civil War photography and its role in the conflict; to promote the continuing study of its rich variety of forms and formats; to preserve original Civil War photographs and equipment as well as the original methods and techniques for making them; and to present interpretive programs that use Civil War 3-D photographs and regular images to their fullest potential.

It exists today as Gibson's Gallery, the world's only operating Civil War wet plate studio,



in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. The Center has also been on the Internet since March 2000 at http://www.civilwarphotography.org/. When it is fully operational, the Center will be unlike any other Civil War museum in existence, featuring far more than exhibits and displays. The Center will have a 3-D theater featuring unique stereoscopic presentations of original Civil War photographs. It will have an expanded Gibson's Gallery, where visitors learn how Civil War photographs were made while customers are actually having their pictures taken.

The NSA 2003 "Logo" House

The Convention logo is based on the Kittredge - McAllister House at 17 East Battery. 17 East Battery is located on Charleston's famous "High Battery" facing Charleston Harbor and Fort Sumter. This magnificent home was built c. 1895 by the Kittredge family of Dean Hall Plantation (now owned by the City of Charleston and operated as Cypress Gardens). The Kittredge family was in the forefront of the preservation movement in Charleston after moving to the South from New York.

Mrs. John McAllister purchased the home in 1922 in her later years. She is the granddaughter of James McAllister of New York who founded McAllister Tug Boat Lines, based in New York Harbor. Today, McAllister Tugs can be seen in every major port in the world, including the Port of Charleston. The home remains within the McAllister family to this day.

This home is described as late Victorian (a rare architectural gem in the area, as most Charlestonians were too morally and financially destitute in the times after the War Between the States to build), yet features classic piazzas on two sides of the house to catch the prevailing sea breezes. Wrought-iron gates from the East Battery sidewalk open to a small, yet meticulous garden, and white marble stairs lead to the impressive front door of carved mahogany.

The house features original inlaid heart-pine floors... soaring ceilings... and a treasure chest of family silver, portraits, and furnishings. To this day, a family tradition of holiday parties... familial celebrations... and bridal portraits made on the imposing interior staircase keep the household staff and family members busy performing the same tasks as their ancestors: the ancient and graceful "art of entertainment."





Notes on the NSA 2003 View-Master Reel

The NSA 2003 Charleston View-Master® reel contains images from the period just before to just after the Civil War. Very few stereoviews exist of Charleston before the War. The blockade of the port cut off sources of photo supplies and the photographers volunteered or were drafted for military service, so there are no views known to be taken after the first couple months of the conflict. The common views are all from just after the end of the war.

These views are from my personal collection. I selected them for their particular historical interest and uniqueness as stereoviews. Steve Hughes scanned the images, repaired deterioration in the views which detracted from the image and prepared the digital files for conversion to a View-Master reel. Larry Moor coordinated with Fisher-Price to actually produce the reels. Michael Kaplan at View*Productions produced the envelope for the reel. Thanks to all of these people and Fisher-Price, we can each have our own reel of great early images to remind us of the Charleston convention.



<u>View 1 — Slave quarters on a plantation in South</u> <u>Carolina</u>

This view was probably taken by Osborn and Durbec, Charleston photographers. It is believed that this is a part of a series of a plantation at Rockville, SC, on St. John's Island, about 22 miles southwest of Charleston¹.

It was published after the War by S. T. Souder. This is part of a series, which also contains a photo of a black church interior in 1860. Souder added the following description on the back of the card:

"This picture represents the Negro Quarters on a Plantation, as taken 1860. It is a true picture of life on a well organized Plantation in South Carolina. Old and young are assembled after the heads of the families have finished their tasks, to partake of the meals ..."



View 2 - Interior of Secession Hall, 1860

Also known as Institute Hall, it was mainly an exhibition hall for industrial, agricultural and cultural assemblies. This view shows it being decorated as an Oriental bazaar². This is one of two known stereoviews of interiors of buildings in Charleston, taken before the civil

war. Both are of Secession Hall. Thought to have been taken originally by Cook, this view was reissued by Cook in 1880 from original negatives.

This hall was the location for the Democratic Convention in April 1860. There was so much violent disagreement over slavery at the Convention that

45 southern delegates walked out. After 57 ballots were taken, they were still unable to agree on a candidate. This split in the Democratic Party assured the election of Lincoln. In December of 1860, 170 delegates assembled here and took South Carolina out of the Union.



View 3 - Furnace for heating shot

This view shows the damage done by the guns at Fort Sumter to the hot shot furnace at Fort Moultrie on April 12, 1861. It was taken just days after the battle by Osborn and Durbec, Charleston photographers. Behind the furnace is the officers' quarters, and upon

the balcony rest Confederate soldiers who are apparently airing their clothes. This is one of the few stereos that depict Confederate troops.

Osborn and Durbec would take at least 38 views of Sumter, Sullivan's Island, Fort Moultrie and Morris Island. It is a rare series and ranks among the finest for journalistic photography³. It was taken between April 17 and 21 in 1861.



<u>View 4 – Torpedo boat used during late Civil War, on</u> Charleston Harbor

The Confederates made repeated attempts with "Davids", or torpedo boats, to destroy the Federal blockade. The David was a fore runner of the Hunley. The David in this picture is believed to be the first

one built in the Confederacy. It was driven by steam with a crew of four volunteers. A total of nine wooden Davids were built, but there were only engines for three.

The boat was armed with a 30 foot pole and an 80 pound torpedo. On the night of October 5, 1863, she succeeded in exploding a torpedo under the new "Ironsides," putting her out of commission for a time⁴.

George Cook, a Charleston photographer, posed his family in front, and took this stereo. A child can be seen playing in the boat hatch and a nanny is also pictured. The image was probably taken just after the war.



View 5 - The Old Post Office

This shows the destruction wrought by the War. The Old Post office (built in 1771) is shown in shabby condition. The street is dirt. It had been paved with cobblestones, but Confederate Engineers had gathered them up for fill to support harbor fortifications.

Newspapers reported that many palmettos had been planted in the city prior to the war, but few survived. This palmetto might have been an advertisement, for behind the tree is a wrought iron gas light with a shop sign: Palmetto Shades⁵. This is unusual since most iron had been used for scrap during the war.

The view is probably by George N. Barnard for Brady & Co., probably in March or April of 1865.



View 6 - East Battery looking south

This view by S. T. Souder has a date of 1872 written on it. Almost all of the mansions on East Bay Street had been heavily damaged during the war and some had been totally gutted by fire. During the occupation, the Federals used soldiers and hired workers to entirely

rebuild this area, including cellars, cisterns and drains. The granite-faced sea wall had been built to protect the low-lying tip of Charleston from hurricanes. It quickly became a favorite promenade. A breeze could be enjoyed almost any time, even during the summer⁶. It is still a favorite local spot.



<u>View 7 – Laborers returning from picking cotton on Alex Knox's plantation</u>


George N. Barnard returned to Charleston in 1873 and began to take a series of city views and of locations made famous by the War. He appears to have been very sympathetic to the plight of the freed Negroes and

showed them in many of his views, including this one taken in 1874.

Charleston had changed very little since the War and his views of returning cotton pickers could have come from any period prior to the conflict. Note the black overseer with a stick. Barnard would remain in Charleston until 1880 and would take some of the finest stereo views ever published.

Charleston 2003 Slide Competition

Official Rules and Procedures

All slides must be shot in Charleston or the surrounding area during the NSA Convention period Friday, July 18 through Saturday, July 26 2003.

Only NSA Charleston 2003 Convention registrants may submit entries.

All slides must be mounted using RBT mounts. Four RBT mounts will be provided to each member who enters the competition. A variety of mount sizes will be available. Room 1 will be available with mounting aids and projection available to check the mounting at scheduled hours.

A maximum of four slides per registrant may be entered.

Slides will be projected with a Brackett Dissolver projector for judging. Judges will compute scores for each slide and total member scores will be tabulated. The top scoring three slides shall be given awards and possibly amazing prizes. Members of the Convention Committee are not eligible for awards or prizes. This is not a PSA recognized exhibition.


Deadline for entries: Sunday at 12:00 pm. Projection will be at 3 PM Sunday. Slides must be mounted and labeled by the deadline. Labels and markers will be available in Room 1.

E-6 development will be available for \$4 for 24 exposure rolls and \$6 for 36 exposure rolls. A drop-off schedule will be provided on site. There is limited capacity, so drop off exposed rolls at the NSA convention registration desk as soon as possible. Two to three drop-off/pickups per day are planned starting Thursday and ending Saturday afternoon at 4 PM. Film will be processed in the order received. Film exceeding the processing capacity will be returned unprocessed and the processing fee returned.

All entered slides will be returned by mail to the registrants address if not picked up at the convention.

There will be three judges: Steve Hughes, Marilyn Morton, David Starkman




Monday's Plantation Tour

A day of adventure is planned. We'll start by boarding the bus outside the entrance to the hotel at 8:00 am sharp. Our first stop will be Boone Hall where a tour of the plantation is included. We will then proceed to Patriots Point where we'll have lunch at noon aboard the aircraft carrier USS YORKTOWN. Our last stop will be Middleton Place Plantation with 65 acres of gardens to explore. The bus is scheduled to return to the hotel at 5:30 pm.

BOONE HALL

Boone Hall Plantation, arguably "the most photographed plantation in the world." The Plantation was part of a series of land grants from South Carolina's Lords Proprietors to Major John Boone, the earliest grant dating from 1681. As cotton became king of Southern agriculture, Boone Hall, a cotton plantation spread over thousands of acres, became a giant of the Low Country's plantation culture. The lives of the early owners of Boone Hall Plantation are interwoven into Carolina's history. Major John Boone came to South Carolina's shores with the first group of English settlers, known as the "First Fleet." For many years the Boones were one of the state's most influential families. A learned family, the Boones fought publicly for the equality and privileges the colonists so passionately desired. John Boone's daughter, Sara, married Andrew Rutledge. They became the parents of two of South Carolina's most noted sons: Edward Rutledge, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and John Rutledge, first governor of South Carolina. When Sara Boone passed away in 1743 she was buried beneath her pew at Christ Church. Another Boone grave is located in the Christ Church cemetery. Captain Thomas Boone lies buried beside the magnificent oak avenue he planted.



PATRIOTS POINT NAVAL AND MARITIME MUSEUM

Patriots Point is dominated by the USS Yorktown, a retired aircraft carrier that served in WW II and Vietnam. Near the end of WW II, "The Fighting Lady", a film depicting life aboard an aircraft carrier, was shot aboard the Yorktown. The film is shown regularly in the ship's theater. In the hangar bay are exhibits of fighter planes and mementos from some of the 3,000 crewmen who worked and lived aboard the carrier. Visitors can tour the ship's bridge, wheelhouse, flight deck, sick bay and other areas. Also open to visitors are the WW II submarine Clamagore, which operated in the Atlantic and Mediterranean and patrolled Cuban waters during the 1962 Cuban missile crisis; the Laffey, which participated in the D-Day landings of Allied troops at Normandy; and the Coast Guard Cutter Ingham, which sank a U-boat in WW II. The complex also houses the National Congressional Medal of Honor Museum.

MIDDLETON PLACE PLANTATION

Middleton Place is a National Historic Landmark and a carefully preserved 18th century plantation that has survived revolution, Civil War, and earthquake. It was the home of many generations of Middletons, beginning with Henry Middleton, President of the First Continental Congress; his son Arthur, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; his grandson Henry, Governor of South Carolina and an American Minister to Russia; and his great-grandson Williams, a signer of the Ordinance of Secession. Middleton Place encompasses the Gardens, the House Museum, and the Plantation Stablevards.

He has exhibited in New York, Chicago, Boston and Cleveland, and will use his latest book as a basis to compare and contrast historic with contemporary stereo photography.

Spend an hour with Ed Jameson as he shares with you, his own experiences spanning forty-three years as a diver, underwater photographer, experimenter, designer and builder of underwater camera equipment including many 3D underwater camera systems. During this workshop, Ed will have three or more of his underwater 3D systems covering macro through wide angle, and will discuss the principles and evolution of each. This workshop will be of interest to novice through advanced 3D enthusiasts who are tide pool waders,



snorkelers and/or divers. Participants will learn how to take and view 3D underwater photographs using the simplest underwater disposable cameras along with learning the principles needed to use available systems to construct 3D underwater systems of their own. Ed will illustrate this workshop with the cameras, 3D underwater slides and stereo cards from his collection.

The FrankenPony Project

Bill Davis will again be presenting his popular workshop on building a full-frame 35mm camera from inexpensive used cameras found on eBay. Bill has now built over 20 of these cameras, learning and improving with each one. This will be the most comprehensive (and perhaps the last) presentation yet on this topic, so if you're interested in full-frame stereo but can't justify the cost of those expensive European models, you should attend this workshop! The workshop specifically covers Siamesing two Kodak Pony 135 Model C cameras, but the techniques can be applied to nearly any camera.





Charleston Harbor Photo Cruise


Sunday July 27

This Sunday evening, come aboard the two-deck, dual-paddle wheel "Nautical Queen" to snap those photos of Charleston Harbor. We will begin loading at 6:30 PM and depart from the Maritime Center at 7:00 PM. Since the sun will set around 8:30, we will have about two hours of sunlight to get photos/views of the Cooper River Bridge and its replacement, Fort Sumter and Fort Moultrie, the Battery, Patriots Point, Shem Creek and the other historical and naval sites in Charleston Harbor. Saving "Sea Dream"

All too often little bits of history just get swept, often literally, into the dustbin. This is especially true of film history with many wonderful movies having vanished over the years. Early this year one of those loses was averted.

Way back in 1938 Marineland of Florida, then called Marine Studios, was founded to provide a place to film marine life and to be a tourist attraction. It was never very successful as a movie studio, the most famous film shot there being Revenge of the Creature, but it became the most popular tourist attraction in Florida in the 1950's. This popularity was not to last.

In the 1970s, other attractions opened, most notably Disney World, and attendance plummeted. In an attempt to win back it's following, Marineland added several attractions including a spectacular 3D movie: Sea Dream.

Unlike the 3D films of the 50's, often shown in theaters badly designed for 3D, Marineland designed a theater for the sole purpose of showing this one film. It was a tremendous success.

Thousands of visitors flocked into the 400+ seat theater wearing "dolphin" glasses to watch the show. Sadly, Marineland attendance continued to decline and the theater was closed in the late 90's.

The property changed hands as various people tried to save it none of them having very much luck. Then Jim Jacoby, an Atlanta businessman, who saw the property as an opportunity to build an educational eco resort, bought the property and started restoring it. Unfortunately the old 3D theater played no part in his plans and it was scheduled for demolition.

This might well have been the last we saw of Sea Dream but for a stroke of luck: Atlanta 3D club member Peter Bahouth was part of Jim's project team. He recognized the value of the movie and put out a call for help from the other club members.

Peter, Lamar Kennedy, my wife Suzanne and I launched an all out effort to salvage as much as possible of Sea *Dream* from the theater. We owe Jim Jacoby sincere thanks for delaying the demolition of the theater to allow time for our salvage efforts.

I am happy to report that several excellent prints of the movie were found. Even better, Mr. Jacoby, impressed by Lamar's showing of the film in his home 35mm theater, decided to save the projectors and screen opening up the possibility that Sea Dream might someday be seen in it's original glory.



Sea Dream

Sea Dream is a very remarkable 3D film created by Murray Lerner, a New York based Academy Award winning documentary filmmaker. Sea Dream is a nature documentary that makes excellent use of the 3-D process.

It was filmed in Spacevision utilizing a single 35mm camera with the Spacevision trioptiscope lens that "sees" two viewpoints on a horizontal plane similar to one's eyes. These two images, corresponding to the right and left eye view, are stacked one on top of the other within the standard 35mm frame.


Dr. Land, a pioneering 3-D developer, has said that Sea Dream incorporates some of the finest 3-D photography he has ever seen.

One aspect of the film that will surprise 3D enthusiasts is the way Lerner placed much of the action between the screen and the audience ignoring the conventional 3D "window". This, combined with quadraphonic sound and the wide screen format of 1:2.4, has the effect of immersing the viewer in the film, admittedly at the cost of a little eye strain.

Sea Dream in 16mm

The short version of Sea Dream I am showing at the convention is quite possibly the only 16mm Spacevision® movie ever made. It was originally developed to test the possibility of showing 3D movies in schools. Both the print and the prototype Spacevision adapter lens were found in a Marineland storeroom. This version of the film, unfortunately without a sound track, consists of the better underwater footage from the complete movie.


After seeing the film, you might want to take a close-up look at the 3D projection adaptor. I will be available after the showings to answer questions about the film and the projection equipment.




Barnard's Charleston Gallery

By the time the Civil War broke out, George N. Barnard was an established photographer working for Matthew Brady in New York. Barnard had the opportunity to follow Sherman and photograph his infamous "March to the Sea" in 1864. These, along with photographs he took in 1865, were the source of the 61 photos which comprised the book "Photographic Views of Sherman's Campaign" which he published in 1866. Working out of Chicago in 1871, he produced a series of stereoviews of the Chicago fire which totally destroyed his studio. In 1873 Barnard opened the gallery on King Street seen in the picture below. He worked out of Charleston until 1880 when he moved back to New York.



H.L. Hunley

On April 19, 1861 President Abraham Lincoln issued an order for the Union forces to begin a blockade of all major Southern ports. This strategy set a chain of events in motion that would bring about groundbreaking advancements in naval warfare and eventually lead to the building of the world's first successful submarine: H.L. Hunley.

In 1863, news from Mobile of the successful trial runs of the Hunley had made its way to Charleston. With proof of the submarine's destructive powers becoming more known, the Hunley arrived by train in Charleston on the morning of August 12, 1863.

On February 17, 1864. the H.L. Hunley rammed the Warship Housatonic in the stern area, planting a 135 pound torpedo. The torpedo explosion caused the USS Housatonic to burn for three minutes before sending the sloop-of-war collapsing to the bottom killing five sailors. The Hunley then surfaced long enough for her crew to signal their comrades on the shore of Sullivan's Island, indicating a successful mission. But minutes after her historic achievement, the Hunley and all hands onboard vanished into the sea without a trace.

Since the end of the War Between the States, explorers and treasure seekers have scoured the sea around the site of the fallen Housatonic, hoping to discover the Hunley and her crew.

The recovery of the Hunley has turned out to be one of the most important single events in the history of South Carolina. After being lost at sea for 137 years, the Hunley was revealed on August 8, 2000, seen for the first time in her entirety, from bow to stern and top to bottom.

Tours of the Hunley restoration are available every Saturday from 10 - 5 and Sunday 12 - 5. Tickets are \$10.00 plus a service charge. Tickets for the Hunley tours can be easily purchased by either calling toll-free 1-877-448-6539 (1-877-4HUNLEY) or on the Internet at www.etix.com. Walkup tickets are also available on a first come, first serve basis.
