We are publishing on an issue-to-issue basis with no long-range plans and neither the need nor the desire for long-range subscriptions.

If you are a member of FAPA, or if there is no "X" on your label, you should not send money or stamps for the next issue. However, we still appreciate getting cards or letters of comment.

"CONDOMINIUM" COMPLETED & VITH PUBLISHER

John D. MacDonald mailed the final draft of CONDOMINIUM to his publisher on July 80. He says it is "forty-three chapters, 560 pages, 168,000 words" and that he has "absolutely no opinion about it at the present time".

17th McGEE PARTIALLY WRITTEN BUT UNTITLED; OTHER McGEES REPRINTED

John is partway into the 17th Travis McGee novel and says "it should go quickly now". Some time ago he mentioned the possibility that "ginger" might be the color used in the title, but as of July 12th the title was not yet determined.

Lippincott is about to bring out the hardcover edition of A PURPLE PLACE FOR DYING. This will be the 14m McGee they have done.

John received a large-print edition of THE DREADFUL LEMON SKY as published by Hall. He says "It looks mighty strange".

NOTE TO THE UNWARY: "THE BLUE HAMMER" IS NOT A MCGEE NOVEL.

"...note that I did not write THE BLUE HAMMER," says JDM. "Can't say I am displeased to see somebody come out with a movie called MOVING TARGET, not from anything written by anybody called Macdonald. And it is not true that I am writing a book called THE WAY SOME PEOPLE LIVE."

CORRECTING THE CORRECTIONS: Jan Linard of Vesoul, France informs us that the correct
French translation of A BULLET FOR CINDERELLA is UNE VALDA
POUR CENDRILLON, as listed in the JDM MASTER CHECKLIST, and not "VALDE" as listed in
our Corrections & Additions (No. 17). "Valda" is French slang for "bullet". It is also
the trade name of a popular French cough drop or throat lozenge--presumably because of
its shape.

We might add that if anybody comes up with a chronological exegesis of the McGee series, we would be interested in publishing it some time in the future.

THE MYSTERY LIBRARY

The University of California, San Diego Extension, has established a publishing project called The Mystery Library. The project's goals are to reprint fine mystery fiction that is not otherwise obtainable in hardcover editions; to publish an original "appreciation of the mystery story" book, called THE MYSTERY STORY, which may also be used as a textbook; and to create and make available to schools, colleges and universities everywhere courses on the mystery story.

Al Hubin's fine journal, THE ARMCHAIR DETECTIVE, will also become an official publication of the Mystery Library project. Al will continue as Editor-in-Chief, but will no longer have to do the rest of the work involved in magazine publishing. That part of it will be taken over by Publisher's Inc., 243 12th St., Drawer P, Del Mar, CA 92014. A one-year (4 issues) subscription to TAD is \$10 in the U.S.A., \$12.50 elsewhere. The September issue will give more information on the Mystery Library, as well as on the history of TAD and its founder-editor, Al Hubin. The June issue is currently available from Publisher's, Inc.

The Mystery Library's editorial board is chaired by John Ball, Editor-in-Chief of the project, and has as its members Robert E. Briney, E. T. Guyman Jr., Howard Haycraft, Allen J. Hubin, Francis M. Nevins Jr., Otto Penzler, Ellery Queen, James Sandoe, Aaron Marc Stein, Hillary Waugh and Phyllis Whitney.

The Mystery Library hopes to have the next issue of THE ARMCHAIR DETECTIVE available at BOUCHERCON 7, as well as copies of THE MYSTERY STORY and also the first of their reprint series.

Larry and Noreen Shaw (who are doing the programming and helping with publicity)


Bruce Pelz (our treasurer and one of the founders of the Bouchercon)
