
MIDAMERICAN (MAC) REPORT by Linda Bushyager

On the surface, MAC worked out well, mostly due to the fact that only 2614 people attended, not including children and special guests out of a total of 4184 registered (including supporting). About 125-150 paid \$50 at the door. If 4000 people had shown up, it would have been a disaster, since the video tape never worked right, despite Scott Imes and other KMAC staff members desperate efforts to fix things. This was the hotel's fault, because the hotel did not have the same kind of equipment they'd promised the video people. Almost everything was taped however, and possibly will be seen at future cons. Many items were broadcast during the last few days, but with poor quality.

Underneath the surface, though, MAC did not come off so well -- confusion, poor management, and overspending hurt the con. The average con attendee probably didn't see this, but those of us helping the committee did. I consider Jim Loehr and Ken Keller great people and my friends, I hope what I'm about to say in the way of criticism won't hurt our friendship.

Giving criticism to friends is just about as bad as giving a friend a bottle of scope -- you hope it won't ruin your friendship or hurt his feelings, but you feel it must be done for the good of all.

BUDGET: This was the greatest failure. Reportedly the initial budget was never updated to reflect increased costs; extra spending was allowed; and by the con, there was in effect no budget at all. As a result, Jim Loehr was signing checks during the con without even knowing how much money was in the bank. The lack of a proper budget was one reason former treasurer Sherry Fesselmeyer quit. During the con and afterwards, the committee had no idea whether the con was in the red or in the black. Although some might blame Ken Keller and Tom Reamy (who did most of the actual running of the con) for overspending, the blame must also be placed on the 30-member MAC committee which did not oversee spending and act when initial budgetary problems came to light. A reported budget problem was that no one had budgeted in the cost of mailing out program books to non-attendees. Since this turned out to be around 1600 people, those postage costs will be high. Also, MAC failed to get tax-exempt status and now will have to pay a 4% sales tax to Missouri on memberships. Hucksters also had to charge 4%.



OVERSPENDING/ULTIMATE-WORLDCON SYNDROME: In Ken Keller's quest for the Ultimate Worldcon, he spent a great deal of money on program items/publications which many attendees felt were unnecessary and extravagant. The ambitious play "Sails of Moonlight, Eyes of Dusk" is a prime example. It was too long, not tightly written, but well-acted and produced. But the main point is that even if it had not been a failure, spending over \$8000 for a 1-night show is an unnecessary luxury for the Worldcon. (Reportedly this was double the initial budget and includes paying equity wages to actors, professional and renting the music hall for the drama only). Tom Reamy and Ken Keller receive the major credit for fancy progress reports and a hard-backed program book. I've heard that the program book alone cost \$15,000. 5000 of these were printed, by the way, and extra copies are available for \$6 from P.O.B. 221, Kansas City, Mo. 64141. By eliminating the hard-bound book and the drama, each member could have saved \$6; or for that kind of money several giant free parties could have been held.


The publications were nice, but again, not necessary. The program book can be criticized for many things -- the fact that it was too heavy to lug around yet contained vital info on the hotel including maps; the poor Heinlein art portfolio; the amount of space devoted to films; etc. The George Barr cover was beautiful, but it was also the best thing therein. A slight postscript, the MAC decided it couldn't afford to give away 1000 copies of the neo-fan's guide, so sold them for 25¢ each (leftovers were donated to DUFF and can be purchased from me for 50¢ for DUFF); with all the spending on the publications, this seems silly; also, the 24-page guide could have been included in the program book and to my mind this would have been a better use of the space than all those film reviews & some of poorer Heinlein-folio drawings (not all were bad, but there was plenty of bad among good).

PROGRAM: The individual program items I saw were quite good. The Hugo presentation was perhaps done a bit too quickly, but using the Academy Award "hand me the envelope" style worked well. The separation from the banquet was fine, in fact the banquet could have been eliminated (I believe only 800 seats were sold). But the scheduling of events was lousy. Many events overlapped (4 items occurred between 1 and 2 p.m. on Fri. alone), yet much of the time there was nothing going on (for example there was no programming from 4:30-8p.m. on Sat. while the masquerade was set up, nothing during the banquet, and nothing on Monday night). The film program was constantly changed and no final program set up and published. When the video tapes were played, no schedule was available.

MASQUERADE: The best ever. A really well done show put together by Joni Stopa with help from Ann Cass, Phyllis Eisenstein, JoAnn Wood, Lynne Aronson and others. The costumes were so good that none were eliminated in the pre-judging, which resulted in a glut of 10 judges. Patia von Sternberg did a strip during intermission and the Passavoys and other Dorsai sang filksongs. The only real problem was that someone should have announced that Patia would do an X-rated strip so that small children could have left the room.

The judges were Bjo Trimble, Alex Eisenstein, George Barr, Chris Lundy, Asenath Hammond, Bruce Pelz, Mike Glicksohn, Amy Bronstein, Sally Rand, and Polly Freas. Someone noted it took 2 hours to judge, 1 hour to see the costumes. The costumes were really great though, so I can see why it would take a while to pick winners.

ART SHOW: The International Science Fantasy Art Exhibition run by Bjo and John Trimble was of unusually excellent quality. The show was separate from the Worldcon, with the Trimbles as per usual receiving any profits or taking any losses. They put out a flyer this year stating that expenses generally run from \$1800-3000, and for the first half dozen years the shows ran at a steady loss and only in recent years have the proceeds been enough to pay for expenses. They state they will cut back on the number of art shows run. They did a very good job of running things, and the Dorsai did a good job with security (although a camera was stolen before they were able to set things up). Unfortunately the auction was held in a tiny room the first day, and bidders had a hard time getting in. Also the auction ran on and on, at least 3-4 hours on Sun. and all day on Mon.

MISCELLANY: The non-removeable tag turned out to be a white hospital-type wristband. Security was not terribly tight, but no gate crashers were in evidence. No one lost his tag.

The Community Blood Bank of K.C. gave a plaque to Heinlein for his efforts in supporting voluntary blood donation. A bloodmobile set up at the con got over 100 pints (no word on exact figures now available).

Sally Rand, noted stripper, and class-mate of Heinlein's attended. She did not know much about SF, but she was an expert in fans. She is also Hank Beck's sister (he's a fan).

The Muehlebach did not follow its contract & booked certain rooms on Thurs. and Fri. which should have gone to the con. Ice machines were set up off the mezzanine instead of being on each floor.

Asenath Hammond's leg was injured when the Knights Templars leaving the con first tripped over her and then kicked her, on purpose. She ended up in a wheelchair.//I heard an unconfirmed rumor that a femmefan was attacked by 2 non-fans in a hotel hallway and stopped the attempted rape by kicking and screaming.

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ROOMS: Were small. Some were strange, like 414 which had an exit sign outside the door, a glass door painted over, and was huge, yet a single, because of 1 bed. No window, but shutters covered over windows down to an airshaft. You had to see it to believe it.

PRAISE: To all the Columbus fans, who despite losing their bid, worked their tails off to help MAC. They did more than some KC fans. To Bob Tucker for being an excellent toast-master as always. To George Barr for his fantastic work in the art show and in the special room, as well as the cover of the program book. To all the people who helped with so many events, even though their rooms weren't paid for and their memberships not refunded (unlike Dorsai, Gofers, & others who did get rooms, memberships, etc.)



HEINLEIN: Heinlein evidently gave the con committee a lot of trouble. He was the one who wanted a black tie Hugo presentation. That ended up strangely, with some fans in tuxes, others in jeans or cutoffs. It was the most wide range of dress ever seen at the same event. Heinlein was very nice to all the fans he met, gave a good but rambling GoH speech, and a fine and funny banquet speech, seemed to enjoy himself, wore Patia von Sternberg's bra (from her strip) as epaulets on his shoulders, inspired most fans to donate blood, handed out nice little pins to blood donors and autographed their books, and generally acted as a good GoH despite earlier conflicts with the con committee.

DUCK'S BREATH MYSTERY THEATER appeared as the Midnight special Fri. night. These Iowa fans managed to get at least 2 standing, shouting, raucous ovations from a horde of wildly enthusiastic fans. The group consisted of 5 slightly demented wackos in a cross between Monty Python and Firesign Theater. They do this professionally as well. The first skit about Gonad the Barbarian (Leon Martell) ranged from slapstick to puns. Gonad encountered a number of unlikely terrors while trying to avenge his people sometime in the future after wars had reduced civilization to rubble and slag-heap kings.



Bill Allard was the sneaky king, Dan Coffee his crafty advisor, and Jim Turner the beautiful princess. Ho-Down, the sidekick, was played by Merle Kessler. The names are worthy of recital. Duck's Breath's performance, with a minimum of props and some topical references, was one of the high points of the con. Other skits included a brief lecture on art history that included 4 of the zanies portraying everything from Botticelli's "Birth of Venus" to Duchamp's "Nude Descending a Staircase." Martell also gave a lecture on sex which included warnings against the use of condominiums by bachelors and other wicked people to prevent sperm from entering the utopian tubes and producing a baby. "Naturally, woman can use I.D.s or Diagrams for the same purpose."

This group first showed up a year ago at an I-Con. One hopes they'll continue to turn up at conventions.

FINAL REMARKS: MAC may show that "gigantic" Worldcons are slowing down, but maybe not. Meanwhile, it did show the importance of good Worldcon management. Although almost all the program events went off well, it seemed to be due to the panel members and inertia of things, rather than to con committee efforts. If MAC makes a profit or breaks even it will probably be due to luck, rather than management. The sloppy disregard for finances and budget, the wasteful spending, the inequities in paying some fans for working and not paying others (most payments were in terms of reduced or free memberships), the lack of centralized leadership, the stupid meet-the-pros party (outside around the pool -- it was so dark you couldn't see each other let alone read pro nametags), etc. all show the hazards of what can happen when a group of just a few fans run a con, and the rest of the committee doesn't take action. If those few fans are wrong, don't plan well, fund pet projects, or find themselves overworked, the rest of the con will suffer. I've already complained about non-SF material at SF cons (we had belly dancing and stripteasing this year), the Hugos (getting dumber, especially in the fan categories, now fans such as Susan Wood, Dick Geis, and Tim Kirk seem to be getting credit as fans for their professional work such as The Clubhouse in Amazing, Geis's column in Galazy, Kirk's Tolkien calendar, respectively, etc.), gigantism, etc. Undoubtedly these and other problems of big cons, Worldcons, MAC, and so on will be discussed at regionals and in many fanzines -- at least I hope so.

WORLDCON CONSTITUTION: A slightly larger group voted on this year's amendments, about 150 people I'd guess. I'll be reprinting the new constitution next issue, I hope. I'm missing some of the changes, so if you did attend the business meeting and got the changes, I'd appreciate hearing from you (especially about items 11 to 17).

I FORGOT TO MENTION: Rereading the above I noticed a few things I forgot to mention. Regarding the Hugos, I did get a look at the voting results & it was interesting to note that Tim Kirk won overwhelmingly, by about 420 votes compared to about 200 for the next several artists. In fan writing, Geis and Wood were way above the rest, with no award 3rd. It is incredible that anyone reading fanzines would have placed no award 3rd above the other nominees, which is one reason I think Geis and Wood got votes for their prozine columns rather than fan work. ///John Miesel made a motion to abolish the fan Hugos which was soundly defeated, but if you look at the award winners over the past several years and you read fanzines, I don't see how you can say the Hugos are going to the "Best" people

--for goodness sakes, in the case of Tim Kirk, several Hugos have gone to him when his fan work was about nil. So although John Miesel's proposal was stopped this year, it is something that people will be talking about and possibly voting on in the future./// Since MAC is now immortalized on tapes, and since other cons are or will be videotaped, we may soon go to Tapecon, with nothing but tapes of old programs.///About 800 tickets were sold to the overpriced lunch (\$10.50).///The Neo-Fan's room wasn't as good as the Fan History room at Torcon, but did contain an excellent video-tape introduction to fandom produced by the Stilagi Air Corps (the Ann Arbor group). I hope the tape shows up at future cons.///Program books are supposed to be sent out to all members (both attending and supporting) who did not attend the con.

SUNCON



Phoenix won the bid. Voting was close, 533 for Phoenix, 460 for L.A. Membership is now over 1200. P.R. #0 announces that the con will be called (take a deep breath) Iguanacon II, held Sept. 2-6. For info write: Iguanacon II, P.O.Box 1749, Phoenix, Arz. 85001. Pro GoH is Harlan Ellison, Fan GoH Bill Bowers, Toastmaster F. M. Busby. Attending membership rates are \$7.50 until Jan. 1, 1977, \$15 until Dec. 31, 1977, \$20 until Sept. 1 1978, \$25 at the door. Supporting memberships are \$7. Children under 12 at time of the convention are free. Block memberships will be sold. Supporting memberships are convertible to attending by paying the difference between the current attending membership rate and the supporting rate.

He was naturally mad, so the committee will make up another Hugo for Dena Brown (they had a couple extras).

Larry Niven dropped his Hugo and bent it, so another extra was used to fix it.

SF Expo rides again. This is the postponed SF Expo, now moved to Oct. 22-25 at the Playboy Resort and Country Club, Great Gorge, N.J. Nichelle Nichols is featured ST star, with Asimov, Clement, Fabian, Pohl, and others scheduled. Reportedly, this con will not make up for the \$70,000 already lost in the Expo failure, but is being done to satisfy members. Although SF Services says about 3000 people were members of the Expo, they now list only about 1000 members. The rest reportedly received \$ back. If you were a member of SF Expo you should have received free tickets to the Playboy Con or your money back. If you haven't, they will send either. Info, questions, etc. to be directed to The Playboy SF Convention, P.O. Box 862, Montclair, N.J. 07042. Include stamped, self-addressed envelope. Four-day attendance \$12.50, 1-day attendance \$5. Reserved seat buses from N.Y.C. will be available each day and return each night. Rooms in Playboy resort are \$38 single, \$44 double. If you are interested in attending, remember what happened to SF Expo. According to an SF Services spokesman, the hotel and guests are all paid for & this con will occur, but I can't vouch for that. The Playboy resort is supposed to be very nice, with free movies on TV, kingsize beds, etc. Hucksters, art show, costume call, movies, etc. scheduled. Note, N.Y.C. fan and 1980 N.Y. bid chairman Tom Anderson is now involved with this as convention coordinator.



If things had gone a little differently, we might have met as boys. Instead, we met in college and became close friends at a frantic pace; trying to make up, as if by unspoken agreement, for lost time and lost chances. Now, all chances are lost; all the puns and music, all the earnest arguments, all the laughter and learning that could yet have been. Barry Smotroff is dead, murdered at the age of 22.

Born on December 21, 1953, he lived in Queens all his life. He attended the schools there, all the way up to and including Queens College (a short walk halfway between our homes), where I met him in 1970. At the college he was active in the SF club (was, in fact, president for a time), on one of the college papers, and especially, on the college radio station. His love of music made that activity a special pleasure for him, and the job he found at a record store (where he eventually rose to Assistant Manager and, with typical generosity, used his position to help other fans find employment) was almost equally enjoyable, for the same reason. Had he lived, I think he would have made his career in the music industry. He talked of someday opening a record store of his own in Minneapolis.

Barry's appreciation of life's pleasures was broad and deep; from his sophisticated enjoyment of a fine Chinese meal, to his everlasting delight in the simple joys of pinball -- and everything in between and beyond -- Barry made the best of life. If we can envy him for that, we can also admire him for the way he shared that happy mode of living. Barry was the kind of guy who'd call you on the phone just to relate a good pun he thought you in particular would enjoy. On his radio program and in his living room, his sharp critical faculties and his keen, sympathetic perception of his friends enabled him to give them the gift of unexpected music. He always knew what you would like and could turn you on to it. In the latter part of his fan career as an enthusiastic apan, he was a charter member of Apa-Q, a member of TAPS, and a stalwart of Minneapa, where he made so many friends that Minneapolis became a second fannish home for him. He was an appreciator of art and enjoyed all its varieties, from the comic and fan art of his onetime roommate Steve Stiles, to the favorite Picasso print of Don Quixote that always hung on his wall. A lover of Science Fiction, too, of course, for many years he slept beneath wide, wall-hung shelves piled high with his collection. All these things and more made life worth living for him, and though a very private person in some ways (self-contained, self-sufficient, never maudlin or self-pitying), he never hesitated to share the things he took pleasure in.

With Steve Stiles, and later with Lou Stathis, he was the host of Fanoclasts. In that capacity and as the coproprietor of an apartment that was so much the natural place for visiting fans to stay that he took to calling it "the Flophouse," Barry earned a reputation as a genial and generous host. It is, perhaps, in that role he relished so much that he will be best remembered.

Of course, I will always remember him above all as the friend with whom I published and coedited my first fanzine. It was his clear-sighted yet tactful honesty and his hard-nosed realism that helped me to perfect my fanwriting and kept us from making many

mistakes with our zine. Although I am thought of now as a very fannish fan, I started out very sercon, and it was Barry who first adopted the fannish style and led me into it, just as he led and I followed into off-campus club fandom and into apadom. Barry had a permanent effect on the shape of my life in these ways and in so many others too complex or personal to describe here. He affected, and was a part of, the lives of all who knew him.

All I can think of now are all the things he might yet have done and all that he might yet have been. Barry's life had taken a particularly happy turn in recent months, with his decision to share an apartment with Suzy Tiffany. She came all the way from Michigan to be with him. They'd had good luck in apartment hunting and in job hunting for Suzy, and things were going really well for them. They were happy. What can we say to Suzy now?

Looking back, we are grateful he had those few months of special happiness. Looking back, we are grateful to have known him. Looking around, we find we can't believe he's gone, and when we touch belief even for only a moment, we cry and curse. We will cry and curse and dream bad dreams for a very long time.

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
