SPECIAL ISSUE TO EXPLAIN HOW TO USE THE WO3W QUOTE_CARDS @ THE SAN FRANCISCO CONVENTION, 1954

Floating somewhere hereabouts, there should be a sample of some "quote-cards" that have been prepared by the members of the WO3W ("Wide-Open-Three-Way"--Redd Boggs, Bob Silverberg & yed) and this is to tell you what to do with them.
