"The Voyage that Lasted 600 years" - Tom Wallace, better than usual. Jack West returns with "Revolt on Io" - adventure which used to think of similar Westerns; you know how tough guy drives up country for farmers. Forget cover by Harry for "Brigades of Space" - fair.... Ruth Cover - Patterson from "Life on Mars"....
