Don't get me wrong. Even Buffett in coasting mode has the talent and technical skill to produce superior work. This is an enjoyable album, though not a great one. I'm going to be a bit slow in buying the next offering. I'm sure Jimmy will focus his talent again -- I just hesitate to buy his contract-mandated albums in the interim.
