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BOOK REVIEWS -JACKIE WATKINS

ON A PALE HORSE - Piers Anthony (Del Rey, 232 p., \$12.95 hb)

With this novel Piers Anthony departs from the world of XXANTH to begin another set of novels entitled the INCARNATIONS OF IMMORTALITY. The story basically depicts a few days in the life of Zane who meets Death, beats him at his own game, and then must assume the role of Death himself. Needless to say there are other subplots, contrivances, and of course, puns. Overall ON A PALE HORSE is a humorous fantasy; but on a deeper level it is a scathing satire of modern life, especially of the medical world.

THE INTEGRAL TREES - Larry Niven (Del Rey, 235 p., \$14.95 hb)

Once again Larry Niven has created a unique and interesting world; here he presents humans who live in freefall within a gas torus circling. a neutron star. Many of the isolated tribes inhabit these integral trees, and the story chronicles the quest of a small band of these humans in search of new food supplies as their tree migrates away from the median of the Smoke Ring.

THE INTEGRAL TREES is just one more credit to Niven's ability to create fascinating new worlds and beings. And while this novel relies manly on humans (as opposed to moties and kzin), there are still some new animal forms. Excellent Niven reading.

MOVIE REVIEWS - Jackie Watkins

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This is one of the better King translations to film. It follows the storyline from the novel closelly and the few changes do not detract from the original. The cast is superb, especially George C. Scott as Rainbird. The major problem is with Charlie McGhee's dialogue - it's done much too adult for an eight year old; Drew Barrymore could have done better with a more realistic script. Overall the special effects were good; the one flaw was Charlie's handling of bullets. Supposedly she exploded them in mid-air but on the screen it looked more like they bounced off her like Superman. Good entertainment.
