I collect books with interesting art, so I can usually find something to decorate an apazine with. I've barely touched the nine volumes of bookplates published by the *Ex Libris Society* that I got on sale years ago. Some time ago I used a picture of Merlin and Vivian in a boat and can't find again the issue or the book I lifted it from. A fan in the UK wanted to know.

John George Hohman's **The Book of Powwows** or The Long Lost Friend is real enough - I have two editions of it. Hohman seems to have borrowed much of it from folk beliefs or older books. It contains a spell similar in purpose to the one quoted in Manly Wade Wellman's Vandy Vandy, but the language is not as poetic. The earliest Hohman (or Johann Georg Homann or Hohmann) edition was published in Pennsylvania in 1819. but some of the material has been traced back to a 1725 book attributed to Albertus Magnus - who lived in the 13th century. Both the books I have are 20th century and in turgid prose. They give the original 1819 Preface - there is no mention of a translator, so perhaps Hohman's was the first version of the material in English. Aside from the Wellman connection, the book figured in the Blymyer "witch murder" trial in York PA in 1929, which was the basis for the Arthur Lewis novel Hex, made into an excellent Donald Sutherland film Apprentice to Murder. But the book itself is "white magic", full of crosses and invocations of the Trinity.

I don't object to Fahey's "Christmas music" because it is Christian - I am a Christian. But I have seen the song lists and for the most part it isn't music I care to hear again, in any form.

I think it was Huntz Hall with the beanie - wasn't he the tall goofy-looking one?

I may get the Pogue's Peace and Love if still available, thanks for the song list.

I may still have the TurboBasic program I wrote for the rate of exhaust of air from a pressurized vessel.
