Rosel George Grown died in New Orleans in November, 1967, at the age of 41. Mrs. Grown was the author of a collection of science fiction from Ballantine, A Handful of Time, Sibyl Sue Blue (Doubleday, Berkley) and collaborated with Keith Laumer on Earthblood (If, Doubleday.)

Ron Ellik was killed in an automobile accident in Wisconsin on Jan. 27. Ron had won a: 1959 Hugo for his newsletter Fanac, published with Terry Carr, won the 1962 Taff balloting, and had written The Universes of E. E. Smith with Bill Evans (Advent) and The Man: From UNCLE #14: The Cross of Gold Affair with Steve Tolliver (Ace) under the name of Fredric Davis.

Lee Jacobs died the 15th of February, after slipping in his bathtub and striking his head. Lee was been a member of science fiction fandom for about twenty years. He was a member of many amateur press associations, FAPA, SFPA, and SAPS. I know him through my membership in SFPA, and meet him at the Nycon 3 -- I feel particularly saddened by the news of his death.

Coulson Publications have been extant in fandom for some fifteen years. This month I want to list some of them that are current or at least still available. All may be had

YANDRO is one of the oldest fanzines still around, and is the only genzine that comes out with almost monthly regularity. Yandro always contains an interesting mixture of articles, reviews, and letters. #137 begins with the usual friendly Coulson editorials: Juanita explains her problems in producing Yandro and Buck tells about the ceiling of the drafting department where he works falling in. Literally. Ted White contributes a column in which he previews a book of criticism on SF by Alexel Panshin. Ted praises the book, and then unleashes a scathing attack on Sam Moskowitz. There are the regular features — complete and caroful reviews of the SF magazines by Rick Norwood, book and fanzine reviews by Buck; and a shorter letter column than usual.

#177 In Juanite's Ramblings, she discusses The Avengers and female heroines; Buck's Rumblings earns its name with a few doses of his cynicism. An interesting effect is achieved by placing two reviews of Lord of Light next to one another. Richard Delap's harsh criticism contrasts well with Buck's review. Rich Norwood again contributes magazine reviews. The letter column is back to normal with a long loc from John Brunner. And Buck does more fanzine reviews.

#178 It is hard to realize that the cover on this issue is hand stencilled. The job on this handsome piece of Cawthorn artwork is more proof that Juanita is the best stencillor in fandom. This cover and twelve extra pages mark the Annish. Alexis Gilliland takes snipes (humourously) at the New Left. Dennis Lien takes snipes (deservedly) at a cheap horror movie.

L. Sprague De Camp contributes a s&s poem. Most interesting thing is the letter column in which Bob Tucker, Ted White and others write interesting letters on an amazing variety of subjects.

ST-PHILE#1 I liked this. For some reason, the Star Trek zines all seem to be enjoyable and well-produced, and this is one of the best of them. Juanita has done a beautiful job with the artwork and mimeographing. Among the contributors are most of fandom's Star Trek people: The Trimbles, Ruth Berman, Shirley Meech, Bob Vardeman, Kay Anderson. They present a varied and sometimes humorous view of the program. JACK VANCE: SCIENCE FICTION STYLIST by Richard Tiedman A great deal of time and work obviously went into this well-researched study. It is difficult to analyze the work of a particular author; though the aim of this work is limited, it is still an ambitious project. The writer makes a number of cogent and worthwhile comments on Vance's work; he attempts to somewhat deliniate the place of Jack Vance in SF by comparisons with other authors, and provides a good over-all view of his

works. If you are familiar with Vance's works, this is interesting. If not, you'll find it boring.

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ARGH! No fanzine has ever been more appropriately named. Argh! contains some of the best/worst bad humor to appear in a long time. Riddled with puns, recounting laughably pointless dialogues, and containing a beautifully devastivating parody of a certain contest between two cities for a certain Worldcon, Argh is a funny fanzine, a very funny fanzine. Recommended.

ALGCL #13 There are a number of miner complaints that could be made about Algol; you could say ditto and mimeo in the same fanzine looks bad, you could gripe about the artwork. However, it could only amount to praising with faint damns, because Algol is an excellent fanzine. Andy maintains a constantly high quality of material. Possibly because I haven't seen too many really sercon articles in fanzines, I enjoyed the article by Banks Mebane on Roger Zelazny's prose; a most worthwhile analysis of the subject. Sam Delany contributed a piece of fiction and some thoughts on his writing The Fall of the Towers trilogy. Dick Lupoff reviews both obscure and better-known books. Ted White has reprinted a former column of his, while Robin White writes on the topic "Are Femmo Fans Human?" Parter.

THE PULP ERA #68 Lynn Hickman has purchased some new printing equipment, and he shows it off by printing two Prosser paintings as covers. The front particularly impressed me at the Tricon; it is done from the Color Out of Space by Lovecraft, and survives the transition to black & white quite well. The first draft of the 1968-69 NBC schedule calls for Star Trek to be shown at 7:30 Monday. There is also a possibility of it being placed in the 7:30 Saturday slot -- Variety says that the letter campaign was the main factor in keeping it on the air.



The Avengers may get the 8:30 Friday slot. Something called Tales of the Unknown is scheduled for 9:30 Thursday on ABC. No Lost in Space or Voyage to the Bottom in sight. An L.A group including Theodore Sturgeon, Richard Matheson, George Clayton Johnson, John Tomerlin; Dennis Etchison and William F. Nolan have banded together, hopefull to produce a TV series called A Touch of Strange. Bing Crosby Enterprises is "interested" in sponsoring a pilot.

Ray Bradbury's Illustrated Man is to be made into a movie starring Rod Steiger and Claire Bloom, consisting of 4 segments from the collection, "The Fire Ballons," "The Veldt" and "The Last Night of the World." Bradbury's "Picasso Summer" has been filmed with Yvette Mimieux and Albert Finney -- and Picasso. A stage version of Bradbury's The Martian Chronicles is scheduled to open in February in Paris.

The International Festival of Science Fiction Films has been set for July 6-13 in Trieste.
