


Your response to Lyn McConchie's LOC made me wonder whether Northwest cons show up well in Mindy Hunt's con calendar in the National Fantasy Fan Federation's *Fanactivity Gazette*. If not, I can smuggle you Hunt's email address so you can forward her future such listings. (No less than one Lloyd Penney sends her his Third Monday Reminders.) This weekend, we've got a double whammy in Los Angeles: The Gallifrey One *Doctor Who* con and OrcCon, a roleplaying game event. I'll be participating in both and would have volunteered at Galli were I not running two games at OrcCon – one of which is a 1985 FASA *Doctor Who* scenario. I shall wear my propeller beanie proudly on all our behalf.

((I can certainly send Mindy Hunt my list. I was moved to collect one partly because I hadn't seen the Northwest Convention League post one for 2023, which disturbed me, and partly because I plan to post such fannish information on my website, anyway.))

In terms of Penney's commentary – and Graeme Cameron's Discord agreement – on con locations, I'd be all for fan events held in church halls and Legion facilities. Smaller-scale relaxacons with less programming might lend a useful focus to more frequent gatherings. At meetings at the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society, for example, though we don't currently have a clubhouse, the programming team frequently brings in guest speakers, recently Tim Powers. People who don't often come to meetings will come to those meetings, drawn by the speaker. And there's just the one. I

could easily envision a lightweight affair that included one speaker, a reading or screening or two, a filksing—perhaps an open mic to accommodate readings, filksongs, and costuming—and a used book sales table. Add a scientific presentation of some sort, and it could be gangbusters.

((Sounds pretty sensible! We also have community centres in Vancouver, not only like the YMCA, but also meeting centres for ethnic groups. My favourites are the underused Welsh Hall and the W.I.S.E. Hall (Welsh-Irish-Scots-English), but the Croatian and Hungarian and Russian and Polish cultural centres, where meeting space is available.))

George Phillies's missive reminded me of the Mike Resnick-edited anthology *Alternate Worldcons*. That volume contains Mike Glyer's story "The Men Who Corflued Mohammed." My disinterest in attending a Worldcon in Chengdu is more pragmatic than political. I'm hard pressed to participate in local cons, much less cons overseas.

((I developed an Attitude about very big conventions, after some very naïve neofans tried to run a very big convention in a very small town where I lived. The largest conventions I have attended were Westercons, and one Norwescon, and I had to be talked into seeing them.))

As official collator of APA-L, I began recruiting fanartists to contribute covers to our distributions, a practice that had fallen out of habit. I've found that most are willing to submit something if you're open to reprinting previous work, but that some are unresponsive or rightfully focusing on paid work. Many are willing to offer artwork in service to fandom, however, and it helps to already be friends or at least active in fandom, as you are. The trick, I think, is to broaden our aperture as faneds to consider artists who might not already be on our lists of the Usual Suspects. It's good, for example, to see Jose Sanchez's work on the cover of thish. Also, you tap furry art more than I see other faneds do, which is welcome.

((It helps that Taral Wayne once sent me a boatload of illustrations from furry artists! Also I was entertained in the 1980s by fanzine illustrations by Jerry Collins, and Steven Fox, and other artists.))

I was pleased to see the N3F directorate elections amongst the "Big News and Stuph from Fanzines." I'd wager it falls under "stuph." Just today, as the former chair for 2022, I embarked on some of the work ahead for 2023: reviving the Official Round Table as a Google Group – to date, we've been using a different Group each year, which has become ungainly; now we can just change the membership – suggesting we select a new chair, and moving toward reviewing the bylaws. There ain't no fandom like fan club fandom!

((Something to belong to, something to participate in.))

Your "Fanzines Received" offers a veritable treasure trove of required reading. Why, earlier today I sent LsOC to *MT Void* and *Tightbeam*. In my missive to the Leepers, I propose that *Flesh Gordon* might be an ideal movie to watch on Valentine's Day. If you haven't seen it, seek it out. There's much more to it than I ever imagined.

2023 Aurora Award Nominations Opening March 4th

Nominations for the 2023 awards will begin on Saturday, March 4th. The Canadian SF and Fantasy Association (CSFFA) initially announced they were closing this year's Aurora Award eligibility lists on February 25th. (The deadline was subsequently extended to the 26th.) Also, due to a lack of eligible movies or TV shows, or works in the Best Fan Organizational category, CSFFA are no longer giving out an award for movies or TV shows, and works that were in the Best Fan Organizational category are now in the Best Fan Related Work category. CSFFA have redefined the Best Artist category as the Best Cover Art/Interior Illustration category. Rather than nominating an artist, CSFFA members will nominate each work that an artist has published in the past year.

Garth Spencer, of Vancouver, BC, is standing for nomination as the 2023 CUFF delegate. Nominators were Rose Wilson (BC), R. Graeme Cameron (BC), Kent Pollard (Saskatchewan), Cathy Palmer-Lister (ON), Lloyd Penney (ON), and Diane Walton (Maritimes).

Another delegate may submit an application and \$20 bond to CUFF administrator Fran Skene, by the <u>application deadline of March 10, 2023</u>.

The bond, and all donations to CUFF, may be sent by PayPal or Interac etransfer to fskene(at)shaw.ca. If you wish to pay another way, email Fran to negotiate. Applications for the Canadian Unity Fan Fund should include a short fannish bio, a statement of how you hope to make this trip beneficial for me, and for the Canadian fan community, and list three nominators each in western and eastern Canada. (The border between Ontario and Manitoba is considered to be the dividing line between the regions.)

The 2023 CUFF delegate will receive CUFF funds and AirMiles points to attend Pemmi-Con/NASFiC in Winnipeg this year.

Fran Skene's news releases tell us

"We are looking for a fan from anywhere in Canada to travel to and attend Pemmi-Con, the 15th North American Science Fiction Convention, in Winnipeg this July 20th through 23rd. A hotel room has been reserved for the delegate, and the registration is comped.

"If we have more than one applicant, voting will be open March 15 and close April 15th, in order to give the successful candidate enough time to work with Pemmi-Con programming and to schedule their visit.

"Voting, when open will be permitted by anyone who has been active in Canadian fandom for two years or more, Voters are urged to make a donation to the fund of at least \$5.00 to assist with the candidate's expenses. Votes can be sent to fskene(at)shaw.ca.

- "... the primary responsibilities of the delegate are to:
 - Attend the convention, take part in programming, and report back to your fellow fans on the event.
 - Assist in raising funds for the next year's delegate.
 - Administer (with the assistance of other Canadian fans) the process to select the next year's fan delegate.
 - Promote Canadian genre-related media and fan activities.

"The delegate is welcome to stay longer than just the convention and hang out with local fans. Also consider visiting Winnipeg's famous Royal Aviation Museum."
