WORLDS OF THE UNIVERSE, subtitled "Fantasy & Science Fiction Stories" with "science fiction" on spine,& "fantasy fiction" at the foot of the cover column, is the newestin British mags. First issue appeared late October, Vol. 1, No. 1, & undated. 102 pp, 5x7%", with the very familiar off-centre coverpic and one colour two-side border. A credit for cover art, and interior art, is given to Marcus. Not work, at that, even if he is apt to overpopulate the sky with odd planets. Cover and contents page credits yarns to Marc Denholm (it is Mark inside), Manning Stern(he gets renamed Thomas W. Wade in the story head, which sounds much more probable), and John Sylvassey (Sil -vassy on cover). The editor -
