Southerner – Re rule # 4. Are you implying that some of us have gotten your goat? Or vice versa?

Sheila Strickland – I've been to more than one museum where the fare offered in the cafeteria resembled what you describe for the Space Center. Although my recollection is that the museums we've hit in San Francisco had rather more expansive (if also more expensive) menus. On the other hand, how fancy a menu would you trust at such an establishment? // Ct Norm: Hmmm. If scrolling text would qualify to make a movie SF, one wonders if the Star Wars films are at least partially SF. // Ct me: Well Jimmie's death was certainly a surprise but wasn't as hard on Kay on one might have thought. Still she did have difficulties dealing with his affairs and cleaning out his apartment. And I think we've had enough of that sort of thing for a while now. // I have a clear view of the process. Off course you'd still need to keep some things in memory to be able to do that sort of thinking. // I'm going to go out on a limb and presume that the NPR report said that there was a 28% greater chance of women on HRT getting breast cancer rather than "a 28% chance" as the latter is an outright lie. The shift was from 0.3% rate to a 0.38% rate. The problem with decrying it as alarmist is that, when you're talking about something with a low incidence rate it doesn't take much of an absolute difference to be a bit %age difference. And there are accepted ways to analyze the data to see if the difference is within the limits one would expect from chance. Seems to me that, except for certain privileges/responsibilities (like voting), they should generally have the same rights, responsibilities and protections as a citizen would.

Yngvi is a TKFWR - On taxes, boy is your math off. Income tax is a percent of your income, but all the other taxes you mention aren't keyed off of that figure. To add 25% income tax + 8% sales tax + whatever % gas tax + property tax to get 70% tax like saying having three .333 hitters in a row means one will always get a hit. Oh, and the 15% social security tax is included in the income tax portion so adding it in again is double counting. // Re Terry's ct on Elian: So your view is that all 6-year olds in custody battles should be given their choice? Even when the battle is between a fit parent and more distant relatives? // "It's hard to see why not to have a "hard-on" against Castro." Because he seems to be the only Communist/totalitarian leader in the world with whom we have that level of a hard-on for in something like 30 years. Yes there is a line that would have to be fiddled with there. And there can certainly be related criminal actions even if the porn standard isn't met.

<u>Rich Lynch</u> – Your ct Eve about D.C. not being a dangerous city echoes a bit eerily here in mid-October.

Norm Metcalf – Ct me: Aha. This reference to mystery finally has me going the right direction to figure our your position. It's not that science fiction, per se, has to be written, it's that the use of the term "fiction" defines a literary work and thus a written form (per both my dictionaries). The problem that I see with that is that none of the other genres incorporate the term "fiction" within the name (i.e. "mystery", "romance", "western", etc) and thus the addenda of the term "fiction" could legitimately delineate the form. For SF that doesn't work as well. Or, to put it another way, it's just a case of the dictionary not catching up with the usage.

Richard Dengrove - Ct Ned: I don't think Free Will implies we need to lock up people who claim not be able to control their actions. But it does imply that there has to be some clear out-of-their hands issue. Being drunk/high, for example, is a conscious action – addiction or no. For that matter, not taking meds to control one's diagnosed condition would seem to fall in that category as well. // Ct Norm: My recollection is that there is virtually no evidence of AIDS transmission by saliva (my memory isn't good enough to be sure that there is no possibility out there). Part of that may be the digestive enzymes in saliva that wouldn't be too good for a fairly delicate virus like HIV. // Ct me: I know several people who have mentioned that they have some degree of sciatic pain or other. Those with less often don't get treatment (or have given up on getting relief after trying several things). One of my other coworkers, tho, finally convinced her orthopedist that she really DID need to have her hip(s) replaced. She'll be getting the first one done about 10 days after I'm writing this. // As the person who needed a repeat circumcision said, "Curses! Moheled again." // It's a tough row for Israel to hoe. How do you seriously go after terrorist gps that are living among the civilian population without harming innocents? To not affect the innocents at all seems nearly impossible. Unless you use targeted assassinations - which got everyone ticked off too.

Guy Lillian III – Shouldn't that be cover art for Challenger? // Ct Toni: Makes sense to me that, if Nat'l Guard (or any such gp) has street patrol / law enforcement duties to perform then they should be allowed to go armed (provided they are properly trained). I'd rather they were feeling "comfortable" about their ability to protect themselves than in a more panicky mode. // Need it also be pointed out that we would probably scream bloody murder if we found out that American citizens were being held in foreign jails on a "no contact with the embassy / outside world" basis? I have no specific complaints about fully enforcing rules re visa violations or other illegal acts by visitors – but that shouldn't involve violation of their rights under U.S. law unless there were truly exigent circumstances that could withstand scrutiny. // Ct Don: I'm not watching Sesame Street these days, but it seems that the HIV status of that character would have to wander across the plot or dialogue from time to time to make the fact known. As long as it's not hammered at. // Ct Arthur: I think the point is that, if this had been Clinton's watch, the outcry from his detractors about his failure would have been deafening. And a stance on Iraq like Bush has taken would have brought howls of protest about how he was trying to distract people from other issues.

Ct me: At least now I understand exactly where Norm's stance on what is or isn't SF is coming from. I still disagree but knowing where he's arguing from helps. // At this point it seems a decided issue so you couldn't get a sentence of death overturned per se. But there would still be the question of whether the circumstances of a given case warranted it. // I thought I still had a copy of one of the SF porn books that I got back around the Ted Mark era but I can't find it at the moment to check the publication date. I recall the title as "Everyone Off the Planet!" (there may have been an "All Right" in front of that). // Oh I'll buy criticality and looking askance at the current administration, but the fact on the ground is that there is no course of action to take beyond kicking the GOP out of it's strength in Congress. (This is other than letters, protests, etc the point being that any more direct action would be just plain wrong.) // Ct Ned: I think LotR tried to make Sauron this brooding, hidden, almost unknowable evil rather than attempting to describe him more fully. // Ct Richard: I see Ashcroft as the inheritor of Sen. McCarthy and AG Palmer. Only the victims have been changed. // Ct George: So, as a side-note, how do you feel about LotR winning the Hugo for Dramatic Presentation? After all, it's fantasy and not SF.

Ct Gary B: Maybe someone (or several ones) DID predict the internet – but the stories were such crap that they were never published anywhere? Or in some obscure place that nobody remembers anymore? Absence of evidence is not evidence of absence. // While not exactly heroes on the level of a McGuire, I think there are teams like the A's, Twins and Angels who've just shown lots of guts and drive and have players worth respecting. But for really BIG names, after Bonds there is something of a gap. // My gut feeling is that 911 could have been stopped by those "vault-solid cockpit doors" only if accompanied by a policy of the pilots NOT opening them to come out and try and deal with disturbances. // How far up the chain have court orders for the Justice Dept to release information on detainees gone?

Jeff Copeland – One possible bit of reasoning that would make it less likely for Saddam to use a WOMD is that, given the level of response it would bring, he'd lose something pretty important to him – the power of being in charge (at least of something the size of Iraq). He might be able to maintain his personal safety but the question would be what else he might have afterwards. Still, that's not quite the deterrent that worry about his country would be. Of course, as has been pointed out, if you paint him into a corner with an invasion then the equation changes. I agree that inspections and removing any WOMD from his control are essential but this is not the time for us to be wielding our big stick. // The mistakes in the resolution are scary. 1) Implying that we are the UN enforcer and, therefore, the arbiter of which UN Resolutions get enforced. 2) Punting on the question of whether there currently IS a threat to us posed by Iraq. 3) "Restore international peace and security in the region"!!??!! Maybe just restore the Ottoman Empire? Isn't that the last time something like that state existed in the region? // And, of course, just because this is OUR policy nobody else should get the idea that it's OK to attack other countries (i.e. use preemption as an excuse for aggression). Do I hear the chords of "Hail Britannia" in the air?

Another helpful household hint is to cut bagels away from one's self. I totally ignore that advice and (knock on wood) have yet to damage myself in the process. IF they're to be armed it should be with the understanding that it's to prevent someone from breaking into the cockpit. For home defense, not law enforcement.

Let's invoke some other nasty countries as dire dangers. Even if I agree with parts of the premise I find the manipulation involved disgusting. // Whatever novel you want to use works just as well as an example. Red October is a technothriller and clearly not SF. / On the other part of the discussion I can't see any reason why Fail-Safe is any less of a technothriller than Red October (or why the latter isn't a political thriller, for that matter). The key difference seems to be in where the key points of stress are – away from the "action" in the former and at the site of action in the latter. // Next question – what mechanism gets put in place to allow people to go to someone with their voting receipt and get a redo? Better might be something like what my Credit Union has for their phone service – it repeats back your request for a transfer of funds and you have to verify that it's correct to finalize it. So maybe a receipt that would print up and allow you to say "Yes, that's right" or "No, you think I'm crazy!".

Ojeffigumi – I'd agree that, page count or not, it's nice to have Challenger included. // Nah! Why would knowing you were going be laid off at the end of a project affect the effort you put in? The fact that various people might find alternate employment and leave on the other hand... // Actually, the *next* line (after "A bris is just a bris") would be "The small fry will not cry. A mohel will get it quickly done...in the blink of an eye."

<u>Uncle Lon</u> – Excuse me, but how is it that Liz remains in 10<sup>th</sup> with an 11+ page average but her page total puts her between Steve Hughes and R. Lynch(i.e. 13<sup>th</sup>)?
