Ned Brooks - Ct me: If you use a double-pace as the unit then 1000 of my paces would be somewhat akin to 5300-5400 feet ((I've measured my pace on the golf course so I can use that as a rough guide to distances and I run about 10% shy of a yard with each step)) so a pretty good measure of a mile. Jeff Copeland - Ct Dengrove: In thinking about it, the last two Democratic nominees have, as you said, had "gravitas" and lost to Bush who has - I guess I'd have to call it - "the common touch". Note that Clinton beat two Republicans who, arguably, had more gravitas than he did. To put it another way, the winning candidacy (and we'll leave the argument about who won in 2000 alone) seems to revolve more on personality/people smarts than on policy know-how.

Ct me: No argument from me that saying objecting to all or part of the Patriotic Act is unpatriotic is stupid. In fact, I'd argue that that position was what was unpatriotic. // I'd say that a bart mitzvah was either a) A good deed done by Brett's brother or b) a good deed done on the subway in SF.
