CALKINS SWAMPS WHITE; EVANS & ENEY PULL COME FROM BEHIND DRIVES TO WIN

Lawton, Okla. (Sept. 15th) The monthlong FAPA election ended to-day and Official Teller Dan McPhail announced that the 1962-63 administration will be headed by F.M. and Elinor Busby, who defeated Lee Jacobs by a vote of 28 to 14.

The others elected are:

Vice-President: W. Gregg Calkins Secty-Treasurer: Wm. H. Evans Official Editor: Richard H. Eney

McPhail announced that 42 members cast votes, and one ballot arrived after the deadline. Over half of the ballots, 22. were cast the first week.

In the key race, Lee Jacobs led the first three days as a result of "block" voting by Californians, which had jumped him four votes ahead. However, by the end of the week, the popular editors of Sercon's Bane and Salud had built up a 13-9 lead, which was increased to 17-10 at midpoint. The third week showed no chambut the final week brought an eight to or deluge & victory for the Seattle course.

The race for Veep was no race at all as Gregg Calkins won a landslide 32-10 victory over Ted White. White, who had polled 24 votes in 1957 to become president, was left at the post as his exmarine rival rocketed ahead. The first week he trailed by 14 votes, and this

Bruce Pelz hustled into an 8-2 lead on the first day, in his bid against veteran Bill Evans for the post of Secretary-Treasurer, but the latter moved ahead at weeks end, 14-8. A Pelz rally in the 3rd week cut the lead to seven, but a surge of votes for his Maryland opponent at the end settled the issue in Evans' favor.

A real Domnybrook developed in the fight for Official Editor, which saw Ed Cox, former vice-president (1955-56) face Dick Eney, an OE in two former administrations. Cox proved the strongest canidate of the west coast slate, as he led all the way until the final five days of the contest. However, at no time did he have more than a three vote advantage & the tide turned dramatically the last week when the Virginian blanked him by garnering all the nine votes cast. Cox was out front, 13-9 the initial week, held a thin lh-13 margin at mid-point, and had edged that up to 18-15 the third week.
