But then the ratings system raised its ugly head And Nielsen's thousand meters hissed, "The Enterprise is dead!" The fans all started writing, and—a lovely sight to see—A tidal wave of mail came in and covered NBC.

The second year the Enterprise went boldly forth once more, With Nomad and Spock's parents and tribbles by the score. Again the ratings threatened, "Your ship no more will sail!" And once again the answer was tons and tons of mail.

The show was saved--but not for long. For Friday nights at ten Is not the best of schedules for our Enterprising men; But fans around the country are taking pen in hand And the sound of typing echoes in homes throughout the land.

There is a man in Hollywood beset by Klingon plots—
The close-watched Nielsen ratings and the barely-watched time slots.
It's up to all of us to keep the E upon the screen,
So sock it to the network! For Star Trek, and for Gene!

Synopsis: As you remember from our last thrilling episode, ST was renewed for only 16 shows instead of a full season's 26. Good News: NBC has doled out the approval for 2 more--18 in all. Bad News: ST placed 75th in early ratings. The CBS Friday movie was in the Top 20. Ratings like that plus assurance of only 18 shows could equal cancellation in January. Crucial Period when letters can help ST is October through January Recommendations: Write to Mr. Mort Werner, Program Director, NBC-TV, 30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, New York 10020. Write Mr. Julian Goodman, President of NBC. Let

them know ST has an audience which is intelligent and loyal (and affluent enough to buy their advertisers' products). Let them know that we're out here, like the show and want it continued. ST's fate is in the hands of these K///gor's network executives; write them now, while it counts.

It might also be helpful to write to sponsors. A partial list follows: AC oil filters, American Motors, Anacin, Brylcreem, Buick, Certs, Cold Power, Delco, Dentyne, Diet Delight fruit, Diet Rite Cola, Ford, Hai Karate, Jergens, Kent cigarettes, Lipton soup and tea, Listerine, Macleans toothpaste, RCA, Remington shavers, Singer, Sunsweet, Visine, Volkswagen, and Florists' Transworld Delivery. In most cases the address is on the product. Reinforce sponsors' intelligent behavior in sponsoring ST-reward them with mail.

Write local newspapers' TV columns; write TV GUIDE and other magazines; write your congressman about the ratings system; write your local TV station; write sponsors; but most important, write NBC. Remember that unprecedented on-the-air announcement of renewal at the end of last season? Let's do it again!

BAYCON ST NEWS

The 1968 World Science Fiction Convention was held Aug. 29 - Sept. 2 at the Claremont Hotel in beautiful downtown Oakland/Berkeley, California.

ST people attending were Gene Roddenberry.
Rick Carter, Sheri Greenawalt (Carter now),
Majel Barrett, Mark Lenard, and costume designer
Bill Theiss. Also attending was Mike Minor,
an artist whose paintings are being used on
the show. (Lovely things—some of his draw—
ings were for sale in the art room, and I
was among the people snapping them up.)

ST episodes "Where No Man Has Gone Before",
"Balance of Terror", and "The City On the
Edge of Forever" were shown, as were the
hilarious "blooper" films. The episodes
had apparently been borrowed from a TV station,
for they had cuts and commercials. Seeing
these first—season episodes again was most
interesting. "Where No Man...", the pilot
that sold, is "not III ST as we know it"
because of all the changes that were made
later. "City" was better than remembered,
and deserved the Hugo it received as best
dramatic presentation of the year. "Balance
of Terror" had a fascinating side effect from
Mark Lenard's later appearance in "Journey to
Babel". Remember the scene where the Enterprise

crew got their first sight of the Romulans? The Romulan Commander played by Mark Lenard is seen on the screen, followed by a camera close-up of Spock. But now instead of "Romulans look like Vulcans!" his shocked look seems to say, "Sarek has defected to the Romulans!"

There was a display of ST props in the pro art room, including Nomad. The Leonard Nimoy National Association of Fans had a display of pictures and chapter publications, etc., and played Nimoy records. Spock ears, scripts and other ST items were sold at the auctions. (I missed the auctions—anybody willing to sell or trade me an ear?) A few Enterprise costumes, not many, were seen at the Costume Parade (which took place in a roomful of pillars along with a light show and rock bands).

Gene Roddenberry gave a talk titled "...To Boldly Go Where No Man Has Gone Before". He also attended the banquet and accepted a special award for producing ST. The Hugo for "The City on the Edge of Forever" was presented to Harlan Ellison.

And there was the GRAS party. That's Gene Roddenberry Appreciation Society, a "conspiracy" started by the Cartel (also known as the editors of KEVAS AND TRILLIUM and the founders of the Mark Lenard International Fan Club). One poor fan missed the party because when asked "Are you with GRAS?" he thought he was being asked if he smoked grass, and said no... But those attending had a most enjoyable time. Roddenberry was presented with a portfolio of letters poems stories


presented with a portfolio of letters, poems, stories and other tokens of appreciation from fans. He and the others spent some time talking with and signing autographs for fans (some of whom were wearing Gene Roddenberry sweatshirts).

Besides Mike Minor's star bases and other art, some fan drawings and paintings of ST people were entered in the art show. One prize-winner was titled "The Enterprise Blows Up" (by Gordon Monson). There would have been more ST art in the show, but a suitcase of Bush pictures was lost and not located until after the con. Bush also had the most successful ST costume in the costume ball—as the green Orion slave girl, she was one of the finalists.

For this fanatic, the last week of August and the first week of September was one big Star Trek "party"-- spent much of the time before, during and after Baycon meeting and visiting with other ST fans. Next Labor Day weekend, the Worldcon will be in St. Louis-hope to see you all there!

Write NBC -- make it a Happy New Year for ST

Before Baycon, I was one of several fans who had a chance to visit the Star Trek set while "Day of the Dove" was being filmed. We saw the bits and pieces of sick bay, bridge, corridor, elevator, etc., which somehow are transformed into the spacious Enterprise (magically? No, that's illogical—there must be a scientific explanation); the new room with the plants in it; the "outdoor" set that's actually indoors; and some interesting odds and ends like the sign over the coffee urn reading, "Coffee's not ready—get back to work." ST ITEMS AVAILABLE

The biggest and best news in this department is THE MAKING OF STAR TREK, the paperback book published by Ballantine Books, Inc. Written by Stephen E. Whitfield and Gene Roddenberry, this is 414 pages of exactly what the ST trufen wanted—a good, long, close look at the whole show from earliest beginnings up to the present time. It not only tells it how it is, it shows it, with pages and pages of photographs, drawings and diagrams. If your local newsstand doesn't have it, tell them to get it! Or it can probably be ordered for \$1 from Ballantine Books, 101 Fifth Ave., New York, New York 10003. (Hank Davis points out the book's initials are TMOST—"the Most?" Yeah!)

The record outlook is bright, too. Leonard Nimoy's third Dot album, "The Way I Feel", is available, and his fourth single is out now--"Here We Go Round Again", flip side "Consilium". (If your unfriendly local record store won't order singles for you, as a nameless one here would not, write to Mr. Pete Garris, Dot Records, 1507 N. Vine, Hollywood, Calif. 90028, and perhaps the situation can be improved.) William Shatner's first Decca album, "The Transformed Man", is on sale now. The Nimoy album includes songs and narratives. The Shatner album consists of readings from Shake-speare and other classics, teamed with contemporary pieces which contrast or complement them.

The Klingon ship has joined the Enterprise model in hobby shops. Spock Halloween costumes are being sold again this year. The Sears Christmas catalog has ST pajamas for children. Department stores are still carrying the odd-looking toys (guns, the "movie viewer", the game, etc.) with the ST name on them.

Some new items have turned up, too. There are ST paint-by-number and colored pencil sets, and an ST "chalk and play activity board". (Thanx, Beth Moore) (Beth says the activity board is obviously designed for pre-school children and NBC execs.) There's a View-Master reel on the ST episode, "The Omega Glory" (thanx, Joanne Swenski)--I haven't seen the reel in this area yet. Anybody got one to sell or trade? Wish they'd come out with reels on "Naked Time", "Operation: Annihilate",

"This Side of Paradise", "Amok Time", etc. some of these days. And would you believe a Mr. Spock kit? John Mansfield sends word from the latest issue of THE COMIC READER, "Out sometime this fall, from Aurora Model Kits, will be a kit of Mr. Spock. A proposed model of Captain Kirk has been held back pending the sales report on the Spock figure." (Thanx, John)

And of course, there's the main source of ST goodies, Star Trek Enterprises. Want a script of a recent show? A packet of film clips of your favorite ST character? A "Spock It To Me" bumper sticker? 
NOTES ON BUILDING THE NEW MODEL OF THE ENTERPRISE - by Rick Norwood

The white plastic picks up fingerprints very easily; wash hands frequently. The new clear yellow plastic dome should, of course, be painted white around the base, but white paint is translucent. To avoid a yellowish light shining through, coat the area to be painted with black paint, inside and out, except the area to be glued. When this dries, cover it with a thick coat of white paint. The picture on the front of THE MAKING OF STAR TREK is a good guide in printing your model. If the small piece that holds the supporting arms in place is forced, the plastic will crack. Push it until it is snug and then glue it to the inside hull. Do not leave batteries in the model when it is put

away. Even twisted to off, there is a good chance that a circuit will be made, burning out both batteries and bulbs in a few hours. For perfectionists: decals yellow in a few months and flake off within a year or so. If you want a permanent model, use paint, not decals. One way to do this is to put the decal in place in the usual way and, when it dries, cut out the letters with a razor blade. Then using the decal as a stencil, carefully paint in the letters. When paint has dried, wash, peel, and scrape the excess decal away. Then scrape away any excess paint that has run under the decal. When more than one color is involved, do this in two steps, being very careful where the colors meet. This is time-consuming and takes great care, but the end result is much brighter and sharper, as

well as more permanent.



In recent months, Leonard Nimoy has appeared on the following TV shows:
Boss City, Alan Burke Show, College Talent, Joe Franklin Show, The Lohman-Barkley Retort, Personality, The Tonight Show, Hollywood Palace, and The Beautiful Phyllis Diller Show. Some of these were local California programs. On most of the shows he did selections from his Dot album, "The Way I Feel", and on the Diller and Hollywood Palace shows he was also in comedy skits. On other local TV, two Seattle channels showed interviews with him which were filmed when he visited the area in July. (Thanx, Teresa Victor, Kay Anderson, Vera Heminger, Chris Schmidt, and Anon.)

William Shatner appeared on Hollywood Squares, The Tonight Show, and The Donald O'Conner Show. He did selections from his Decca album, "The Transformed Man" and demonstrated his skill at archery. He also appeared on a Cincinnati TV show, Bob Braun's 50-50 Club. (Thanx, Jane Bowers)

James Doohan appeared on <u>Happening '68</u>. (Thanx, Elaine Cooke) Jill Ireland was in the Oct. 19 <u>Mannix</u> episode. Mark Lenard is, of course, appearing in Here Come the Brides, which is reported to be doing quite well.

In reruns--Leonard Nimoy as Harry Welles in a Highway Patrol episode involving radioactive isotopes (thanx, Kay Anderson); as Indio Amiris in a Sea Hunt about the rescue of an exiled Latin American president (thanx, Allene Nims); and in "The Firemakers" episode of M Squad as Ben Blacker, an arsonist (thanx, Ruth Berman). William Shatner as a doctor in a Dr. Kildare episode, "Admitting Service"; as an assistant district attorney in Defenders episode, "The Invisible Badge" (thanx, Ruth); and as John Crane, a murderer in an Alfred Hitchcock, "Mother May I Go Out To Swim" (thanx, Ruth). On Explorer 10, the Enterprise was shown (topic of program was trends in science fiction) (thanx, Sara Fensterer). Celia Lovsky as a rich woman in Alfred Hitchcock episode, "The Kind Waitress"; as a landlady in a One Step Beyond, "Message From Clara" (thanx, Jane Bowers); and in

an episode of Arrest and Trial (thanx, Barbi Marczak). DeForest Kelley in a Bat Masterson segment (thanx, Barbi). Mark Lenard as the Magi, Balthazar, in The Greatest Story Ever Told. William Shatner as a soldier on a "Song of the Ages" sermonette (thanx, Maggie Rose)

Gene Roddenberry was interviewed on Today by Barbara Walters on October 11. He talked about his earlier career as a policeman, which included a time when he walked a beat alone in a tough neighborhood ("It was eight hours of acting"); talked about ST and how its stories can make a comment on present times and conditions; and expressed the view that the world will have a rough time getting through the next 20 years, let alone the 200-year span to ST's optimistic future. While we're looking over our shoulders at the bomb, we'll blunder into something else. He added that ST tries to point out some of the pitfalls that have to be avoided and problems that have to be solved.

Other recent TV sightings—Leonard Nimoy was introduced on the Sept. 22 Diller show (the week before the show in which he took part). William Shatner appeared on the John Gary Show and recited "Impossible Dream" from his album. He also said he had been to Cape Kennedy and been in the astronaut training capsule. (Thanx, Kathy Bushman) On a Rockford, Illinois NBC station, WTVO—TV, Sept. 11, the news broadcast mentioned that the station would continue to carry ST, due to the volume of phone calls and letters received when they considered dropping it. (Thanx, fingleder Kim Kowalewski) And on the Sept. 27 Jackie Gleason show, a woman wearing curlers was described as looking "like the third engineer on Star Trek." (Thanx, Kim)

Radio activity - in late July a CBS newscast said that violent scenes were being excised from various shows, and named ST as one of the shows. (???) (Thank, Hank Davis)


