The late Clark Ashton Smith, whose stories usually show a bread vocabulary and meticulous scholarship, came a cropper with the title to "The Seven Geases". A geas is an insuperable compulsion to perform some action; the term comes from Keltic mythology. The proper plural of geas is geis, rhyming with "mice".

The conversion of nouns into verbs is one of the grammatical peculiarities of the continuing development of the English Language. American Negro dialect extends this process to the conversion of adjectives into verbs. Two of the most interesting of these changes are the use of "nonshalant" and "late" as verbs. "She came nonchalanting down the street" carries a richness of expression that no other choice of words could convey. "Late" in the sense "recently deceased" was converted into a past participle by a New York City teen-ager, according to Jano Whelan. This youth said, of street gang fights, "I don't want to be lated", meaning, "I don't want them to put 'late' in front of my name."

The first three terms on the right hand side of (6) depend upon the three arbitrary constants of the motion which give the values of position, velocity and accoleration at t = 0. But the coef-ficient of t2 in equation (6) is independent of the magnitude of the constant force mg Thus a contradiction exists between the Newtonian and "fourth law" equations of motion, not only in the t term where such a contradiction might reasonably be expected, but also in the to term. On the basis of equation (2), Davis seems to be saying that, even for a system which responds instantaneously to an impulse, the acceleration may be given an arbitrary value which will not change so long as the force is constant, and which does not depend upon that force.

"The Dragon Masters", Jack Vance's novel in the August 1962 Dalaxy, will probably cause more comment in fandem than any science-fiction story since Heinlein's notorious "Starship Soldier". The story concerns a conflict between two intelligent races, men and the man-sized, insect-like grophs. Each race has bred its primare somers, making genetic modifications in them and developing several specialized strains. The prisoners of each race are completely subservient to the other, and are used by them as fighters, steeds, or servants.

Both the mechanics and the othics of such genetic engineering will probably be argued at great length in science-fiction fanzines and gatherings. "The Dragon Masters" stands as a landmark in the shift of s-f emphasis from the physical to the biological and social

aciences.

The planet on which the story takes place is occupied by several feuding human clans, which use various breeds of genetically modified grephs, or "dragons", in their intermedine wars. In addition, another group of men, the "sacerdotes", inhabit a great network of caves under the mountains. The sacerdotes practice a completely passive and mystical brand of pacifism - not a technique to be used in the attainment of a goal, as Ghandi used it, but an end in itself. Vance shows how this attitude of withedrawal leads to denial of responsibility towards fellow men, and a self-centered insanity.

The human slaves of the grephs have also had their outlooks warped, by their masters. The story includes two cleverly constructed dialogs between a human clan chief and a human slave of the grephs who tries to justify his slavery as part of the normal order

of the universe.

The illustrations by Gaughan of the various genetic modifications of men and graphs are executed with great imagination and vigor.

A number of more leisurely and detailed studies are now being made of that network of reactionaries variously described as "conservatives", the "radical right", and the "ultras". The June 30 issue of the Nation is completely devoted to a study by Fred J. Cock entitled "The Ultras: Aims. Affiliations and Finances of the Radical Right". Cook shows that conservatism cannot be dismissed as "ludicrous" — Attorney-General Kennedy's words — but is a serious attempt to repeal the social legislation of the last thirty years, revoke the progress being made towards equal rights for all radial and religious groups, and end all attempts to come to an understanding with the USSR on international issues.

Some northern conservatives pretend to look with disfavor on the pro-segregation stand of their southern collegues. But, in the conservative magazine National Review, they show their support of the master-race views of the conservatives of the South. On page 62 of the 10 April 1962 issue of this influential conservative journal appears the following assessment of integration:

"For eight years Brown vs. Board of Education" (the Supreme Court decision which outlawed segregation in public schools) "has stood as the prime symbol of the drive towards a centralized, despotic mass state that has been proceeding under the direction of a

united front of the federal executive and judiciary.

LATEST NON-VIOLENT

STRATEGY AGAINST SEGREGATION:

"DIE - INS"

Lynchboro, West Carolina (URRP) - June 20, 1962, Today it was revealed that Negro opponents of racial segregation have attacked another phase of this practice by non-violent action. In addition to the sit-ins, stand-ins, kneel-ins, and jail-ins, southern segregationists are now faced with die-ins.

Ever since the earliest days of the South, cemetaries have been racially segregated. This was true of the Santa Chocha Cemetary in Lynchboro, which was founded during the Seven Years war by the Spanish during their 12-day occupation of West Carolins in 1762. This Spanish occupation was followed by the English for 8 days, the French for 11 days, the Gammahoochee Indians for 5 days, and Anne Bunney's pirates for 32 hours. Consequently, at the end of the war Santa Chocka was the largest cemetary in the New 1714.

On April 1, 1962, it was discovered that a Megro had been secretly buried in Santa Chocha during the previous night. The first participant in the discins was Peleg Pegleg, 116, who was remembered in the town's Negro community for his vivid tales of his like as a slave. Fegleg's most vivid tale was his denunciation as forged a birth certificate in the local courthouse which showed him to have been born in 1871.

Further die ins occurred in subsequent weeks during moonless nights. These violations of cemetary segregation continued despite the prompt arrest of every participant by Shariff Robert Rely. Observers here feel that Lynchorous Regroes are determined to continue the die-ins until cemetary segregation is completely ended. However, no information on this subject has been obtained from those Negroes already in custody.

Dr. Arno von Wilpert of Augsburg, Germany, has devised a variation of chess which is catching on in Europe to the extent that clubs are now conducting correspondence and over-the-board Wolf Chess utilizes the three new pieces which find tournaments the most favor in fairy-chess problems: the Wolf (also called "Empress") which combines the powers of the Queen and the Knight; the Fox (also called "Princess") which combines the powers of the Bishop and the Knight; and the Nightrider, which has the same basic move as the Knight but which may continue that move in the same direction as far as the squares are clear, (A Nightrider on KI may move to Q3, QB5, or QN7 if the direction is not blocked. If Q3 is clear and there is an opposing place on QB5, the Nightrider may capture on QB5, but may not move to QN7 on the same move.) A fourth new piece is Dr. von Wilpert's own contribution to non-orthodox chess, the Sergeant. It is a "super-pawn" which may move to or capture upon any one of the three aquares adjacently in front of it, lake a Pawn, a Sergeant has the option of moving one or two squares straight forward upon its first move. It may be taken en passant by a Pawn, but cannot take en passant. Either a Sergeant or a Pawn may be promoted to any of the initial pieces on the last rank. In addition, a Pawn may be promoted to an Elephant, a piece which combines the powers of the Queens and the Nightrider,

The game is played on a board of 8 files and 10 ranks.

initial locations of the pieces are:

lat rank, left to right: King (K), Nightrider (N), two Rishops (B), Rook (R), Fox (F), Wolf (W), Queen (Q). Sergeants (S) stand before the N, the leftmost B, the F, and the W. Pawns (F) stand in front of the K, the other B, the R, the Q, and

The White and Black pieces are anti-symmetric to each other, so that each Q is opposite the enemy Ko Naturally opening strategy is principally an attempt to open the Q-file, and to keep one's own Refile closed. This is a substantial departure from the strategy of traditional shess. There is no castling. The algebraic notation of European chass is preferable to the description notation in use in the English-speaking countries in the description of games and stragegyo

RECIPE COLUMN

Kangaroo-tail Soup: Skin a medium-sized kangaroo tail. Leave in sinews for extra flavor and slit into joints similar to extail preparation. Place in a pot with three pints of water and two teaspoons of table salt. Cover and cook with the meat simmers. Allow it to simmer until the meat is tender and white. Then skin off the fat, add two chopped onions, carrots, parsley, two tables spoons of vinegar, and two bay leaves. Simmer for 30 minutes.

Southern liberals who want to cast an effective vote against racial segregation are often faced with the spectacle of two or more candidates who cutdo each other in bragging about their love for the principle of white supremacy. In such an event, there is still a way to help the cause of desegregation.

To Democratic Primary Elections for Members of Congress. In almost every part of the South, victory in the Democratic primary is tantamount to election. Integrationists should therefore vote for the opponent of the incumbent who is most likely to win. A new man may be no better on the question of integration, but at least he will not have the seniority which enables southern Democratic segregationists to control congressional committees and exert influence against desegregation bills.

II. General Elections for Members of Congress.

If there is no difference between the two candidates on the integration issue, vote Republican. The Republicans will be the minoralty party in Congress for the foreseeable future, and minority members of committees will exert less influence than majority members.

III. Primary and General Elections for Governors and Other

State Officials.

Among a number of pro-segregation candidates for state office, vote for the most rabid segregationist, particularly if he is also an anti-Semite. Such men, in office, will be most likely to provoke the federal government into taking firm and inexorable action to suppress state resistance to integration. School integration is far more advanced in Arkansas, where the governor attempted by force to keep schools entirely segregated, than it is in North Carolina, where "token" integration of a few schools has induced the federal government to ignore the segregation of the others.

Frank Rewalski (Demo, Conno): Representative—at—large Kowalski is facing an uphill fight in the state convention and primary election against Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare Abraham Ribicoff, former governor of Connecticut. His contribution to the femous Liberal Papers urges the establishment of a neutral zone in Central Europe, encompassing Germany, Poland, and other countries. A Democrat, he is running as an independent against those shining nonentities Edward Kennedy, Edward McCormack, and George Lodge. He coposes nuclear testing, and favors disarmament.
