



Movie Review—X-Men

X -Men Excitement

Something you may or may not have heard, the new *X-Men* movie presented something of a dilemma for the producers. Spend the limited money on a big name star or special effects. After much debate (and very likely pressure from the large fan base) they opted for the natural choice. Tookis-kicking special effects, and previously unknown actors, (although Patrick Steward of Star Trek Next Generation fame, and the guy who played Darth Mal was there too.) And the result? Well, my roomie was impressed, which isn't something just any movie can do. As for myself, I thoroughly enjoyed it, but then I liked *The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle* as well, so you kinda know where my standards are.

Long time fans (like myself) of the *ahem* comic book will undoubtedly find certain changes to the plot, romantic relations, and accents hard to palate, but for those of you with only a passing acquaintance to the series will find this a very well written stand alone movie. (Although the ending leaves no doubt that there will be a sequel. What I mean to say is, the ending just screamed *X-Men 2*:

Magnetos Revenge.) Although there were changes (Wolverine and Rogue's relationship, the absence of the Beast) which I didn't like too much, overall I was impressed with the number of things that staid the same. Ready for a very brief outline of the plot? I promise not to give anything away.

Open in Poland 1944, witness Jewish families being torn apart by Nazis, learn that even then there were people with 'mutant' abilities. Cut to the 'not too distant future', and we are introduced to the character of Rogue. (I do have a complaint about this part, what sort of accent is she using? It's not a southern accent, I lived in the south for 5 years, I know a southern accent when I hear one.) She accidentally drains the giver of her first kiss, then runs away, into Alberta, Canada, where she meets Wolverine, who's making his money by taking money from anyone stupid enough to take him on in the ring. Things pick up from there, there's an accident, a fight, a presidential candidate kidnapped, Magneto reveals his plan, an almost death, an almost running away, another fight, another kidnapping, more cool special effects, more fighting with some really nice special effects, and *viola*, the world is saved... for now.

While the plot was a little weak, (fight and save the world, using special effects), the dialog was bitingly clever at times, although the dialog people sorta dropped the ball with Storm's lines during the last fight. I also must admit that the costume change impressed me after I go over my initial resentment. Guess it just goes to show that not only do good guys wear black, it's black leather.

My rating of the movie? On a scale of one to three mutants(three being the best), it's a 2 and 8/9 mutants. But don't take my word for it, go see the movie yourself!

MOVIE REVIEW-Titan A.E.

This movie is something of an experiment, combining CGI animation with standard animation. Much of each image, especially the backgrounds are done in CGI (It looks a lot like *Toy Story*) while the actual characters are drawn in standard animation. It looks unusual at first, but one soon does not notice the difference unless one looks for it.

Unfortunately, the plot is old, to say the least. The Draj, energy beings (?) are afraid of humanity (just why is rather unclear) and launch a pre-emptive strike and destroy the Earth (A.E. After Earth). The only escapees are a few remnants of the human race and a giant ship called the *Titan*. Years later, a boy, whose father was involved in the *Titan*, is contacted and is told that he holds the key to the hiding place of the *Titan*. Somehow the *Titan* can re-create Earth, so he and some others go on a quest to find the ship, followed by the Draj.

The makers of this film seemed to be too enamored of their new process to pay any attention to the plot of this movie. The plot holes are enormous. (For example: if the Draj are willing and able to destroy the Earth, why would they fail to destroy a new Earth?) There is nothing inherently wrong with an old plot, but one must bring something new to it. There were lots of writers involved according to the credits. This often indicates problems with the script. Don Bluth & company need to pay more attention to the whole film, not just their technology.

AT POWELL'S IN AUGUST

John Shirley

Thursday the 10th, 7:30 pm Powell's City of Books Originally published in 1985, Eclipse reveals the remarkably current and prophetic vision of John Shirley (screenwriter of The Crow). Mixing politics, pop culture, passion, paranoia, powerful imagery and vivid characters, Eclipse possesses a visceral intensity as well as being a thought-provoking assault on the intellect. A nearfuture Europe devastated by limited nuclear war is in the hands of the Second Alliance, a right-wing, fundamentalist, supposedly neutral, international security corporation which is actually intent on controlling the world. Only the New Resistance offers any hope of defeating an impending fascist world government. Not that the NR has much going for it – a ragtag band of freedom fighters with few resources – misfits, drop-outs, outsiders, patriots, and partisans with nothing to hold them together except a determination to defeat the SA. This cyberpunk trilogy continues with the reissue of Eclipse Penumbra, and concludes later this year with Eclipse Corona.

Wednesday the 23rd, 7:30 pm Powell's Books on Hawthorne We've seen it before: children of famous writers coming of age and following in the footsteps of their best-selling parents. And we've heard it before: the son (or daughter) really can write after all. Christopher Rice has written a novel, and he really can write. A Density of Souls, the debut of Anne and Stan Rice's son, is an incredibly compelling read that weaves the story of four characters through childhood, to adolescence and young adulthood. New Orleans is brought to vivid life within the pages. There's the cemetery where we first meet the four children playing hide-and-seek and where tragedy will ultimately unfold; the gay community where one of the four finally meets his match, only to lose him in a terrorist-like

blast; and the mysterious countryside surrounding the city, where a mother violently confronts her tormented and angry son. Rice's emotional page-turner reflects on the struggle toward adulthood when one is haunted by generations of mistrust, jealousy, and misunderstanding.



(In the "In Case Anyone Still Watches" Category ◎) Voyager Premiere Set

Star Trek: Voyager kicks off its seventh and final season Oct. 4 at 9 p.m. on UPN, the network announced. The season premiere, "Unimatrix Zero, Part II," will resolve last season's cliffhanger. (A repeat of that episode, "Unimatrix Zero, Part I," will air at 8 p.m. that day.)

In the final season, storylines will see B'Elanna Torres and Tom Paris take their relationship a step further; force Seven of Nine to confront the possibility of her own death; pit the Doctor against a bizarre HMO-type medical bureaucracy; and see the Maquis re-emerge in an unexpected way, according to the official *Star Trek* Web site. In addition, the season will resolve the question whether the *U.S.S. Voyager* will ever make it home.

The U.S. Postal Service will issue a stamp to commemorate Chicon, the World Science Fiction Convention, in Chicago on Aug. 31. The service will also issue a special cancellation for Chicon 2000, using the convention's "rocket" logo.

Briefly Noted

The DVD of 1985's *Vampire Hunter D* anime will come out Oct. 17, not Oct. 3 as originally planned. The later release date will allow for the completion of bonus features and will coincide with the release of a *Vampire Hunter D* game for PlayStation.

Bela Lugosi, the son of the late actor of the same name who gained fame as Dracula, signed a deal with Universal Studios' consumer products division to produce merchandise based on his father's likeness, *Variety* reported. The deal puts to rest years of dispute between the Lugosi family and Universal.

UPN, home to *Star Trek: Voyager*, will become the Paramount Network on Jan. 1, the Hollywood trade papers reported. The new moniker comes on the heels of the breakup of United Paramount Network partners Paramount and the Chris-Craft/United Television Group.

Trek I To Be Re-Cut For DVD

Paramount will enhance and re-edit *Star Trek: The Motion Picture* for its upcoming release on DVD, according to the official *Star Trek* Web site. Filmmakers will also overhaul the 1979 movie's visual effects. Director Robert Wise will re-edit the film and include scenes that were cut out of the theatrical release. The DVD will appear in 2001 and will be the last *Star*

QUEEN OF OUTER SPACE (1958) A group of astronauts, ferrying a famous scientist to a space station, are forced to land on Venus which is inhabited exclusively by scantily clad female warriors, including a heavily accented Zsa Zsa Gabor. What originally started out as a "serious" science fiction film was changed mid-production into a comedy spoof. Not rated. Nightly at 6:10pm, plus Sat/Sun at 2:10pm.

BARBARELLA (1968) Based on a popular French comic book, this cult classic follows space pin-up girl Jane Fonda through a series of encounters with strange space creatures and wicked villains. Directed by Jane Fonda's then love interest, the late Roger Vadim. Rated PG. Nightly at 8:10pm, plus Sat/Sun matinees at 4:10pm.

VILLAGE OF THE DAMNED (1960) A mysterious force causes all the residents of a small English village to fall asleep at once.
