ZINGARO 3 (Irwin) Slide identifications: 2b is Adrienne Martine; 18b is the Red Skull (Larry Ivie); 64 is the Musquite Kid (Wrai Ballard); and I think that the two "Fafhrd" shots (5 & 9) are actually Kar Komak, the Bowman of Lothar (Bruce Pelz). If those pix have a guy in white with black helmet, beard, axe, and bow-and-arrow, it's Kar Komak.

SPINA 4 (Thorne) Let's try this deadwood bit again. You are, I guess, within your rights to doubt that "there is a whole lot of money made by having these extra members -- the money actually creating a number of new things." However, I've been a bit closer to the problem, as the FANDBOOKS and a number of other NFFF publications were produced in L.A. It costs a certain amount to cut a stencil and ink the machine. Paper costs being constant, the cost per issue decreases with the number of copies run (assuming you don't mind the physical work of running the extras.) So, go ahead and doubt -- facts is facts. The same goes for the fact that, accepting Clay Hamlin's statement that 25¢ per member is left over after publishing costs, the more members you have, the more money you will have to operate extras with.

You are rather emphatic about what you didn't say in SPINA 2; just what did you say, then, should be done about the deadwood? Right now I

can't locate that mailing.

You are quite right that a club with no deadwood would not have to rely on publications sent to them without their participation. Are you, then, suggesting the elimination of the lub publications, and the substitution of others sent only to participants? I'd never get either TNFF or TIGHTBEAM, then, as I just do not have time for them. I have another suggestion: why don't you start another club, in which all the members would have to be active to continue being members, and leave the NFFF as a club where the deadwood can laze about happily and just pay their dues? (It would be easier than having the latter form a new club, as there are several hundred of them and only one of you.)

Just why doesn't Clay's comments on "dumping" certain members have "absolutely no bearing on the real matter"? By Clay's own admission, these certain members are the deadwood whic is cluttering up the club -- and I think he does a completely adequate job of pointing out the uses of some deadwood -- either their past activity, or their present helpfulness outside of the usual club activity. (Said helpfulness

being engendered only by a club publication or other activity.)

Lessee, you don't see anything "so great" about having a Hospitality Room at conventions, but admit that, if you were a convention-goer it would be different. It becomes a bit clearer: Your comments that the deadwood's contributions don't help much "in actual return to the individual" actually = "in actual returns to Creath Thorne." That's much clearer. On the other hand, what have you done for us? (Let alone done for the deadwood -- I haven't been deadwood in the 8 years I've been in this idiot organization, as far as I can tell.) As I mentioned in APA L, there are two sides to the Galt Oath, and quoting only one of them is not a good support for an attitude.

As I missed commenting to Arnie last time on the question of why genzines are not sent through SAPS, I might as well do the commenting here: Used to be, they were sent through SAPS. There was an issue of ABERRATION, one of WRR, and a couple others. But the attitude of the club was that these were genzines, not SAPSzines, and as a result, they were ignored in the mailing comments, thus eliminating the only incent-

ive for their inclusion. As for SAPS having large zines like other APAs, there was a time when The Great Page Count Race got out of hand and resulted in a 105pp zine, 90+ of which were mailing comments. Also, it was SAPS through which Kemp sent his SAFARI ANNUALS (#1: WHO KILLED SCIENCE FICTION?; #2: WHY IS A FAN?), though the latter also went thru FAPA and OMPA after its inclusion in SAPS. Also, I am really in favor or larger mailings that the 300pp ones we have been having -- as long as they stay under about 550, the limit of the mailing bags. The problem is simply that apas go in cycles, and right now, SAPS is in a period of smaller zines. It has also been, until the last mailing or two, in a cycle of rather poor mailings, but I think that is past.

SHALMIRANE 1 (Gilbert) The fact that EXCALIBUR is all editorially written except for the letters does not impair its classification as a genzine, as the term refers to its principal means of circulation instead of its content. G^2 and RATATOSK are genzines, tho the one is entirely editorially written and is, by content, a newszine. Now, the fact that EXCALIBUR is sent through N'APA every mailing would impair its classification as a genzine if its outside circulation were limited to thirty or forty.

I think your estimate of 30 years for the average LASFS age is a bit high. 25-26 is probably better. Of course, we would have to decide who to include in the list of those from whom the average is obtained. Most of the older members (except Fox, Whittledge, Sam Russell) are

very sporadic attendees.

RASTY 2 (McFarland) Dian has been wondering whether Rasty McFarland is

any relation to Spanky McFarland. Are you?

As for my trying to get into APA 45, hell no! I have quite enough to do right now, what with FAPA, SAPS, N'APA, OMPA, Cult, and APA L (and maybe LA APA; I dunno) in addition to MENACE OF THE LASFS, RATA-TOSK, and various Special Projects. Eventually I shall get hold of the mailings -- until then, I can wait.

I suppose many people will tell you this: Corflu is not water-soluble but acetone-soluble. Try some of your mother's nail polish remover

to reactivate the dried-up corflu.

As for APA 45 losing its gimmick of distinction, it pretty well has to do so -- or else kick out some Original Members in a few years. Right now, that Gimmick is the composition of Youngfans -- 19 or barely 20. But in five years, these same Youngfans will be 25, in ten years... anyway, so much for the gimmick. Either it goes, or you do.

MAYHEM HOUSE (Rolfe) As part of the audience that was so unutterably rude to the Dancing Feathers at the Pacificon, I object to your idea that those of us who didn't like it should have either (1) been quiet or (2) left quietly. I was in full costume, and without glasses. I could not sit down in this costume, and I was in attendance specifically for the Costume Ball, to which the Dancing Feathers was a prelude -- an overly long, overly dull, and insufferably longwinded prelude. If that windbag of a Chinkdian had gone on for much longer about "this little lady is the only one of her [blahblah] who is able to do the [blahblahblah] dance while at the same time rotating her [blahblabblabla]... " there might have been some more arrows on the stage. The costumed attendees were getting very annoyed, and Durk Pearson and I were figuring to take turns -- he had a gun and I a quiver of arrows. I consider the committee bungled in hiring the DF

as pre-masquerade "entertainment," and as they had done so with my money, I think I was/am entitled to complain. Masquerades are for masqueraders.

Fred mentioned it this past week (it is now 18:45 14 March) and mentioned that if I voted he might get around to voting in the SAPS election, but I am not particularly interested in blackmail this year. If I lose to a write-in candidate in SAPS by one vote, So Be It. Or something. Anyway, I'll wait and see how much participation N'APA's poll gets this year. If there is almost enough to make it valid, I'll make an effort to remember next year. But if it is full of votes for non-members again, evidence that N'APA attitudes are still the same as last year, then to hell with it.

MEOW 4 (Katz) You were right, the voters did remember that I chiseled out of eating the fanzine: I got 6 times as many votes as the character who tried to get me to eat it. Seems reasonable.

You're going to get a lot of people bugged at you for averring that N'APA can be separated from the NFFF legally, but you are, of course, quite right. You must have a very devious mind, tho, to figure out how to get by the Safeguard Clauses. Very devious. Congratulations.

What do you mean, suggesting to Tackett that it's harder to comment on your zines than to pick apart well-meaning neofen? Are you insinuating that you are not a neofan? Or just not well-meaning? For that matter, what neofan is well-meaning in N'APA?

Besides, it's unfair of you to pick on poor old Tackett -- you want we should lose our Grand Old Man from N'APA? What would we do for

Stability? Or for Prestige? Or for Status? (I dunno either.)

"The Scintillating Six" in comic characters sounds interesting. Offhand, I'd guess Captain Fanoclast = TEW; Kid Fandom = AK; Xero & Xeromaid = Lupoffs; Stylus = Steve Stiles; and Subwayman = DGV. I dunno about your guest star superhero, tho -- maybe Fagman?

By the way, some belated congratulations (about a year or more late) for the line about naming your typer. (I think it was you and not Len; otherwise, consider the remark addressed Bailes-wise.) It is too bad it didn't get into print while it was appropriate, but perhaps the name could be changed for the same reason?

KAYMAR 10 (Carlson) So, if officers tried to "finis" the NFFF, then all you would have to do is rebuild it again? No

conceit in your family, is there?

"We need someone who knows what he is doing and is strict in upholding the rules." Well, in that case, I suggest you vote for a change in the N'APA Administration next time, because a strict rule upholder Fred isn't. Dian and I left Los Angeles for Florida on 18 December, three days after the N'APA deadline -- a Friday, in fact, with the next day being the Saturday on which Fred could get to his tame Post Office to mail the mailings at cheap rates. I wanted to take the N'APA Mailing with me to read on the tedious bus trip -- but it wasn't ready yet. As a matter of fact, when we came back two weeks later, it was barely ready. And this time, with me scrambling to get this zine done by deadline, I get a phone call from Fred who wants to know about the availability of the mailing bags. In the course of the conversation, I learn that the mailing will probably be out by next Saturday (20 March.) It appears that the deadline is actually when-

ever the OE decides that (1) he has his own zine done; (2) he has enough zines in to make the mailing look good; (3) he has time to do the OO; and (4) he can get the mailings sacked and taken to the P.O. This process appears to take from three or four days to a couple weeks. Somehow, SAPS and FAPA usually get done in one day after the deadline -two at the most, but as I've never done the job as N'APA OE, perhaps it
takes much longer than either of the others (both of which I am doing these days, in case you're interested, Kaymar). Anyway, most rules have to be a bit pliable, I guess. Just how pliable is up to the membership.

The question of letting a WLer publish for the mailings in which

you have no KAYMAR is up to the OE, of course. But I would suggest that you do a cover page, with colophon stating that the zine is entered in the mailing by you (thus making it actually your zine), and let the WLer staple this cover sheet to his zine and send it in; this would probably get past any regulations made so far. What ou want to do with your mailing is up to you -- if you want to send it to the WLer, it's your affair. (Otherwise, he might not get any idea of what the reactions of the membership were to his zine.) Anyone you have in mind?

My excuse for collecting comics is that I collect all Stfantasy


ephemere; someone has to, you know.
