I HAVEN'T SEEN THEIR PUBLICITY, BUT KAREN ANDERSON TELLS ME THAT THEY ARE ONLY PLAYING ON SATURDAYS. IF THIS IS TRUE, I WILL PROBABLY GO ON THE 24" & SHOW UP LATE AT THE LITTLE MEN HOLLOW'EEN PARTY. (WALNUT CREEK IS ONLY A FEW MILES FROM ORINDA AND IS ON THE ROAD FROM LIVERMORE). IF THEY DO IT ON FRIDAYS TOO, I'LL GO THE PREVIOUS DAY. I DO WANT TO SEE RUDDYGORE AGAIN AND MIGHT GO THE 30TH, IF I CAN AFFORD THE TIME.

THE LAMPLIGHTERS ARE OPENING THE MIKADO ON NOVEMBER 7TH, BUT THE FAN PARTY WILL BE ONE WEEK LATER IN ORDER TO MAKE IT ON A GGFS NIGHT. AND I JUST HEARD RUMERS OF AN AMATEUR GROUP IN BERKELEY PUTTING ON SOME UNSPECIFIED G&S PRODUCTION IN THE NEAR FUTURE AND WILL HAVE TO GET MORE DETAILS.

WITH ALL THIS ACTIVITY AROUND HERE, I AM REALLY SURPRIZED THAT THERE IS NO LOCAL CHAPTER OF THE GILBERT & SULLIVAN SOCIETY...THERE SURE IS ENOUGH INTEREST. AND IF I UNDERSTAND CONVERSATIONS BETWEEN BRUCE & THE SQUIRREL THAT I OVERHEARD, THERE ARE TWO ORGANIZATIONS IN LA.

This is also Opera season in San F"ancisco. They have quite a few interesting things which I would liked to have seen, such as "Frau Ohne Schatten," "Carmen," "Nabucco," "Bartered Bride," and "Parsifal" I got tickets to only two...a double bill of "Gianni Schicchi" and "Carmina Burana" and the American premierre of Shostakovich's "Katerina Ismailova(Lady Macbeth of Mtsensk)". The combination of too many other things to do and a cost of \$20-23 per pair of good seats discouraged me. I think I'll concentrate on the Spring Opera Season, when good seats cost only \$4 each.

I FIRST HEARD IT ON THE RADIO SEVERAL MONTHS AGO AND THE HUMOR COMES THRU SO WELL THAT EVEN THO IT WAS SUNG IN ITALIAN WHICH I DON'T IN THE LEAST UNDERSTAND IT COMPLETE-LY BROKE ME UP. I EXPECT TO HAVE MY OWN PHONOGRAPH OUT HERE IN A FEW

BUT MALL WANT BUOSO'S HOME, SAWMILLS, & MULE. AFTER MUCH WRANGLING THEY FINALLY DECIDE TO LEAVE IT TO GIAN-NI. AS THEY HELP HIM WITH THE BEDCLOTHES EACH WHISPERS A BRIBE IF ONLY HE WOULD LEAVE THEM TO HIM/HER. HE SAYS YES TO EACH, AND THEY SING A CHILDREN'S LULABY AS THEY SEND, HIM INTO THE BED. THE NOTARY AND TWO WITNESSES ARRIVE, AND HE EXPLAINS THAT HIS HAND IS SHAKING TOO MUCH FOR HIM TO BE ABLE TO WRITE THE WILL HIMSELF. NOW GIANNI REMIND-ED THE RELATIVES JUST BEFORE THE NOTARY ARRIVED THAT IF THEY ARE CAUGHT FORGING A WILL THEY ARE ALL LIABLE TO HAVING THEIR RIGHT ARMS LOPPED OFF AND BEING PERMANENTLY EXILED FROM FLORENCE, SO THEY MUST BE VERY VAREFUL.

THEY SIT DOWN AGAIN, GRUMBLING.

A FEW MINUTES LATER HE RETURNS TO THE STAGE CARRYING A GREAT LOAD OF RETRIEVED GOODS, OBSERVES THE LOVERS, AND ADDRESSES THE AUDIE-NCE DIRECTLY, ASKING WHETHER OR NOT HE WAS JUSTIFIED IN DOING WHAT HE DID FOR ALL WOULD EVENTUALLY GO TO THE LOVERS AND MAKE THEM HAPPY.

EVERYTHING WAS PERFECT...THE LIBRETTO BY FORZANO, THE MUSIC BY PUCCINI AND THE PRODUCTION, SINGING AND ACTING. I HOPE TO SEE THIS OPERA AGAIN AND AGAIN AND AGAIN...AND I WOULD ESPECIALLY LOVE TO SEE IT IN ENGLISH SOME DAY. IF IT IS SO MARVELOUS IN THE ORIGINAL, HOW MUCH BETTER IT MUST BE WHEN YOU CAN UNDERSTAND EACH WORD!

GRANIA DAVIDSON & AI HAD BEEN LOOKING OVER THE UPCOMING OPERA SCHEDULE A COUPLE OF MONTHS AGO. WHILE I HAD BEEN VERY GOSH-WOW ABOUT SCHICCHI & KNEW NOTHING OF CARMINA BURANA, SHE WAS VERY GOSH-WOW ABOUT THE LATTER & KNEW NOTHING OF THE FORMER, SO WE DECIDED TO GO TOGETHER. I LISTENED TO A RECORDING A FEW WEEKS BEFORE SEEING IT, FOUND IT INTER-ESTING, BUT NOT OVERWHELMINGLY EXCITING. BUT THE SECOND EXPOSURE OF SEEING IT CONVERTED ME... LOVED IT.

This consists of a number of 13th century secular songs in late Latin and early German, rediscovered about a century ago and set to modern music by Karl Orff in the 30's. About 200 were found, and Orff selected some two dozen of these. I know little of the vocabulary of music and am at a loss for words on how to describe this. The music was powerful and physically moving the way Stravinsky's "Rite of Spring" is. There are parts sung solo, and parts by small or large choruses. The staging, backdrops, etc., and ballet were just stunning: I left the opera house completely dazed.

THIS IS SUPPOSED TO BE PARTIC-ULARLY EVIDENT IN THE CHOISE OF THE SECOND SONG, WHICH TRANSLATES AS "I LAMENT FORTUNE'S BLOWS WITH WEEPING EYES,/FOR SHE EXTORTS FROM ME HER GIFTS,/NOW PREGNANT AND PRODIGAL,/NOW LEAN AND SEAR./ONCE I WAS WEATED ON FORTUNE'S THRONE,/CROWNED WITH A GARLAND OF PROSPERITY./IN THE BLOOM OF MY FELICITY/I WAS STRUCK DOWN AND ROBBED OF ALL MY GLORY./ AT THE TURN OF FORTUNE'S WHEEL,/ONE IS DEPOSED,/ANOTHER IS LIFTED ON HIGH TO ENJOY A BRIEF FELICITY/UNEASY SITS THE KING, LET HIM BEWARE HIS RUIN,/FOR BENEATH THE AXLE OF THE WHEEL/WE READ THE NAME OF HECUBA."
