

### DEERSKIN

by Robin McKinley Ace Books, c1993, \$17.95 ISBN 0-441-14226-5, Cover by Dawn Wilson

I've come to expect good reading from Robin McKinley and her latest is no exception. It may ruffle those who forget fairytales were NOT designed for children in the first place. They were stories full of adult (read lust, greed and the other deadly sins) passions wrapped up in the trappings of wealth and grandeur. Over the centuries they were tempered for the young - or for the adults sharing them with the young who forget the majority of children (especially young adults) do not see the world through rose-tinted glasses. Sometime try a few of the old originals some unexpurgated Grimm, early Italian tales or even the original "Little Red Ridinghood" - and you will find a rich lode for horror authors, among others! This is the first of Robin's books to be classified as "adult" fiction, so you may need to ask your librarian as to its location.

DEERSKIN expands an old tale; variants are 'Catskin', 'Gulaida', and the original 'Donkeyskin' which Robin cites as her source. Shared plottines include: dving Queen makes her husband promise not to rewed until he finds another as fair; their daughter reaches sexual maturity and he sees she is as fair and announces their wedding; daughter flees her father's kingdom and tries to survive elsewhere. Some additional plotlines include the daughter setting three tests and taking the resultant items with her, her dancing at three balls in disguise and the Prince/Lord of her new home penetrates the disguise and marries her. What is not usually included is the graphic physical reality of incest and its effects on the heroine.

Princess Lissla Lissar is ignored by her parents and their court from the moment of

birth, left in a tower with a half-mad nurse. It is not until after her mother's funeral that she receives the first gift ever meant for her, a puppy from a young prince she has never met. Because of Ash she asks for things for the first time (a room, which opens on an enclosed garden) and notices things (growing plants) which in turn leads her to meet people who see her for herself. Those two years are the happiest of her life, but on her seventeenth birthday her father gives a ball. She had been uncomfortably aware of something different in his gaze, but she had no expected him to announce their wedding! That night and the next he attempts her bedroom door - the third night he breaks in through the garden, severely injures the protective Ash and brutally rapes his daughter, leaving them both for dead. When she regains consciousness she attempts to care for Ash and get them both away to safety. An almost impossible task for one so severly wounded in body, mind and soul.

The majority of the book deals with the person Lissar becomes after the attack. When she finally finds a hut in which to winter (a winter the reader comes to understand lasted five years) she learns to conquer the daily chores of living and is finally strong enough to return to the real world. But it takes the intervention of a Being to heal her damaged body and guide her to the path that leads to that giving Prince. A Prince who is regarded as very odd indeed, who gives her a job with his dogs. Her talents make her an important person in the small kingdom, but she flees the night the Prince proposes. She returns just in time to save his sister from marrying her father...and although she then accepts his second proposal, "happily ever after" is not taken for granted.

The author has taken the elements of a known story and used them to limn how lives can be changed by selfishness and betrayal and created a world where the expected softness of the fairytale's medieval setting sets off the harsh reality of the heroine's plight. The characters' growth shows up even more against a cast

including fairytale stereotypes. It is also nice to see dogs getting equal time, for the dogs are contributing characters. This is a solid tale of pain and healing, fury and understanding, betrayal and hate vs. trust and love. Good does triumph, but the victory is not an easy one. Highly recommended!

(Trivia: Ms. McKinley is married to Peter Dickinson according to the jacket. When they are both writing they must have to tie the roof down! And I'd love to browse their research collection.)

### **DINOSAUR FANTASTIC**

edited by Mike Resnick and Martin H. Greenberg. DAW, 1993, \$4.99 ISBN 0-88677-566-3 Cover art by Jim Warren (Love the button!)

Released just in time to catch the summer's hot trend, this contains 25 new original tales by some well-known and no-so-well known authors. They include Judith Tarr, Misty Lacky and her husband Larry Dixon, Laura Resnick, David Gerrold, etc. and it seems the fantasy authors out-number those who write science fiction. The stories usually have a twist; the serial killer who is sent to live his final hours in a T. Rex, the animal activists who try to free some lab animals without enough research of their own, a storyteller with a difference, even one that starts "it was a dark and stormy night". I enjoyed the whole set - and it should be a sure-fire hit with the younger readers as well.

### AOUAMANCER

by Don Callander Ace Books, c1993, \$4.99 ISBN 0-441-02816-0 Cover art by Daniel R. Horne

This is the sequel to PYROMANCER, and despite its title has relatively little to do with Myrn. Douglas Brightglade is sent on the Journey to earn his promotion and along the way encounters a wide selection of characters well known in fantasy. The most appealing of the new characters is his Familiar, Marbleheart the Sea Otter, whose bump of curiosity leads him to accompany Douglas far inland. Good triumphs (you were in doubt?) and there will probably be a sequel.

I enjoyed PYROMANCER but fear the series is heading towards cuteness. Of course it is hard to believe in the trials of anyone who has another magic trick always left up his sleeve and who sends back home to Blue Teakettle (a 1000 miles away) for hot take out. Incidentally Teakettle has companion as well, the ivory Chopsticks of Wong Tscha San who promises her to teach her to cook Choinese. (I really want to visit that kitchen!). Recommended for those who read the first book.

### **POWERS THAT BE**

This is a story of a lunger sent dirtside to die since she was unable to continue serving in space. What happens is a bit different - asked to serve as a spy in return for a few amenities. Yanaba manages to turn the tables on the powers that be. She proves that the planet's not so hidden realities and the culture created by mixing Aleutian and Celtic settlers can overcome the rule of short-sighted technocrats. I liked the hero, too.

This is the first volume of a trilogy and the epilog states that the concept arose during McCaffrey's visit to Fairbanks, where she met Scarborough who introduced her to the high points of Alaskan life (including moose spaghetti). When the favor was returned (folk music and the Irish) the story continued to grow. This is one trilogy I am looking forward to reading all the way through. The people are strong survivors with a sense of humor and song, the animals have charms of their own and I wouldn't mind visiting Petaybee - in the summer, after I saved up for a few fur coats. In some ways this is old-fashioned science fiction - the good guys are really good, the baddies are short-sighted and set on the wrong goals, and the main exploration is really that of a well-thought -out alien (but almost familiar) culture. Recommended for the hammock/poolside hour or two.

# On the Coattails of Wayne and Garth by George Peterson

I suppose it was inevitable.

It used to be that movies became to shows. Now we've come full-circle and to shows of the past are rapidly being resurrected as movies.

Coneheads, from Paramount, is the latest in series of films adapted not from whole shows, but brief comedy sketches (e.g. "Dragnet", "Great White North", "Wayne's World"). The big question is whether a ten minute sketch can be expanded to feature length. In this case the good news is that "Coneheads" succeeds about as well as can be expected.


Beldar (Dan Aykroyd) and Prymaat (Jane Curtin) are sent from the planet Remulak to conquer the Earth. Unfortunately, due to a slight miscalculation, they crash into the East River instead. Pursued by the Immigration Service (who else would be going after illegal aliens?), our coneheaded heros wind up settling into a nice, middle-class life in Paramus, NJ, to await rescue. There they experience the mundane joys and trials of life in suburbia, including a teenage daughter who, of course, falls for a blunt-skull her parental units find "Unacceptable".

Most of the humor derives from the Coneheads' bizarre appearance, physiology, and ridiculously high-tech speech. Especially when it's accompanied by reactions from the human characters, who seem amazingly willing to overlook the strangeness of their friends. Particularly good are Beldar's trip to the dentist and Prymaat giving birth. The scenes on Remulak are also good. The film has fun sending up various cliches and stock situations, such as the final chase and rescue, so typical of alien-on-earth movies.

"Coneheads" is not without problems. After a while the basic humor derived from the Coneheads themselves wears a bit thin, until the final scenes on Remulak. And from a dramatic standpoint the film runs on too even a line. There's not enough increase in tension prior to the climax, which contributes to the drag in the middle.

A more problematic issue is the cast. Not that the actors are at fault. There's only so much that can be done with the specialized characterizations in this film. "Coneheads" seems like a "Not Ready for Prime Time Players" alumni meeting. It's often amusing to see some old (or current) face pop up in a minor role. It can also be distracting.

Despite these shortfalls, "Coneheads" succeeds more often than not. It isn't a great film, but it's worth watching.


