#### **May SFSFS Meetings**

The General SFSFS Meeting was Library held at the Main of Nova/Southeastern University. A Comics Roundtable was held in which Peter Rawlik (ver. 2.0) and Adam-Troy Castro, SFSFS Author-in-Residence, held forth on their favorite comics and graphic novels from both past and present, assisted / hindered by much kibitzing from the audience. Despite a small turnout a good time was had by all.

After the meeting, several of us met for dinner at "The Field," a nice Irish Pub type place on Griffin Road.

In the evening, the May Book Discussion was held at the residence for Bill Wilson and Cindy Warmuth. The books under discussion were, <u>Ship of</u> <u>Fools</u> by Richard Paul Russo, <u>The Dragon</u> <u>de la Sangre</u> by Alan Troop, a new Florida writer. The general consensus was that both books were well worth reading.

#### **June SFSFS Meetings**

The General SFSFS Meeting was held at the West Atlantic Ave. Branch of the Palm Beach Public Library, in Delray Beach. The program was our annual Hugo Award Nominee Panel. The panelists were Peter (Mal) Barker, Computer Genius, our favorite Lovecraftian Horror, Peter Rawlik, Writer-Guy Adam-Troy Castro, and SFSFS' Mightly Leader, George Peterson. Although we again had a small turnout, it didn't stop our unstoppable panelists from pontificating at length. The general consensus seemed to be that, overall, the nominees were somewhat better than last year. Among the novels, China Mieville's Perdido Street Station was thought to be the hands down, over the top best book, but was likely to win only if the fans of Lois Bujold, Neil Gaiman, and Connie Willis cancelled each other out.

Afterwards, dinner was held at a local Appleby's, where, as usual, Petey Rawlik the Younger was the star of the show.

In the evening, a Board Meeting was held at Cindy's. Topics of discussion included price increase on the storage unit, plans to sell off the Library, and the upcoming meeting schedule.

# UPDATED SFSFS BOOK DIVISION ORDERING POLICY

(Editor's Note: It's always a good idea to repeat important information – so here in it's entirety are the instructions on how to order books through SFSFS.)

The preferred method of ordering books is by sending an e-mail to <u>bookorder@sfsfs.org</u> giving the following information: ISB<sup>\*\*</sup> the, author, list price (range or approximate value OK), and quantity. You sho ald also include contact information: your full name (not always obvious from e-mail address), day, evening, and weekend phone numbers, etc.

You can also order books by contacting the book division by phone (currently, Ned Bush -- 954-584-2140) or at regular SFSFS meetings.

Note: We are not limited to science fiction and fantasy. We can get most books that are available in regular books stores as well as some other items (calendars, audio books, etc.) as long as they have an ISBN.

For most books, SFSFS gets a 40% discount from our supplier and gives a 30% discount to members (using the 10% to pay for shipping and keeping any left over as a profit for the club). Occasionally there are items which do not get the full discount. For these, we offer a discount of 10% less than the discount Ingram gives us -- 5% of list if they give us 15%, etc. You will be contacted to confirm that you still want such items, even though we can't give the normal 30% discount.

We do have to charge Florida sales tax -- 6%.

Example: You order one hardback

at \$25.95 list price. 70% of that (rounded up to the nearest penny) is \$18.17. Add in  $6^{\circ}$  sales tax and you pay \$19.27.

For 's entirety large orders (more than \$50 estimated price), you must pay at least half in advance (by sending a check to the SFSFS PO box, etc.). The remainder is due when you pick up your order. For smaller orders, you just need to pay the full amount due before picking up your order.

Once an order arrives, you can either pick the books up from Becky Peters at the Imperial Point library or you can pick them up at the next SFSFS meeting.

If you cannot pick the books up on or before the next meeting for some reason, we ask that you send a check for the balance due to the SFSFS PO box and let us know when you do expect to be able to pick them up.

Note: There is no minimum order for an individual member, but due to shipping costs we need a certain minimum total number of items ordered by all SFSFS members to justify an order. If an order is delayed, you will be contacted before it is actually sent to confirm that you still want old items.

Generally, we will try to send one order a month, timed to arrive a week or so before the next SFSFS general meeting. Ned Bush <<u>nedbush@mediaone.net</u>>

Starting in 1972 with his audaciously imaginative first novel, T ENTROPY MEANS TO ME, Effinger was nominated many times for both awards before his novelette "Schrodinger's Kitten" won a 1988 Hugo and Nebula each. It's been a bad month for writers of speculative fiction: R.A. Lafferty, Henry Slesar, Damon Knight, and now Effinger

John Nathan Turner. Doctor Who's longest-serving producer, responsible for casting three of the Timelords, has died at the age of 54.

John Nathan-Turner, known to his fans as JNT led the BBC show for 130 episodes between 1980 and 1989.

# AUDITION

The damnedest Japanese film is now available on DVD. A lonely and repressed movie executive, widower for seven years, is asked by his teenage son if he's ever gonna remarry. The fellow, who has probably given no thought to women since then, decides his son has a point. It's time. But clueless, and long out of the dating market, he follows a producer friend's suggestion, and holds auditions for a female supporting role in a nonexistent movie, thus meeting a large number of young and beautiful women in the hopes that he'll find one out of all those dozens who he'll want to know better.

It's a version of the casting couch, all right, but there's no real lust involved - the guy's just hapless, embarrassed by his deceptions, and childishly excited at the cast to meet a nice girl. And after a while it seems like he has; among the many wannabe actresses, there's one pretty, soft-spoken, and vulnerable young lady whose gentle and self-effacing nature charms him utterly.

The movie is two hours long, and for the first hour it's a well-nuanced relationship movie, with subtle acting, and sensitive performances. With very little rewriting it could continue from the point to become a somewhat off-kilter love story (though even that would require a scene depicting the lady's ultimate reaction to being deceived about the auditions).

But then, at about the one-hour mark, we start getting indications that the lady has a past.

And then we get some indications that her past isn't very nice.

And then it becomes a bloody and brutal horror movie, and for the last twenty minutes or so becomes damn near impossible to sit through without squirming.

I knew the twist was coming. I had heard enough of the film to know that. Indeed, that was one reason I wanted to check it out. I did not expect the disparity between the sensitively written and performed first hour, and the thoroughgoing sadism of the past twenty minutes, to be as great as it was. Even with the half-hour transition between those two sections, to nuance the tone shift, the result is literally like watching WHEN HARRY MET SALLY change horses midstream to suddenly become THE TEXAS CHAINSAW MASSACRE.

It doesn't quite work, alas; the first hour is just a little too sedate, and the last twenty minutes a little too hallucinogenic. But neither is this a cheapjack exploitation film. I can't really recommend it, but it's still audacious and in its own way, astounding.
