

Robert A. Heinlein Dies

Once again, it is our sad duty to report the passing of another SF great. Robert A. Heinlein, respected and well-known author in the field of science fiction, died May 8th of heart failure in his home in Carmel, CA. He was 80 years old.

Heinlein had been a writer of science fiction novels and short stories for approximately 45 years. His works include Stranger in a Strange Land, The Past Through Tomorrow (a collection of short stories), Friday, The Cat Who Walks Through Walls, Glory Road, Starship Troopers, most recently To Sail Into the Sunset, and many others. His most famous character, Lazarus Long, is noteworthy for having an extremely long life span.

Heinlein was well known for his libertarianism and his views on the military. He was a close friend of Isaac Asimov's, a friendship which developed from their service in World War II. He also served as a Guest of Honor at several World Cons.

Heinlein's passing leaves a large gap in the field of science fiction which probably never will be filled. He will be deeply missed.

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HEINLEIN

A special obituary by Mitch Silverman

Robert Anson Heinlein died Sunday, May 8, 1988, at his home in Carmel, California, of heart failure. Heinlein's SF career started in 1939 with the short story "Lifeline," and continued through *To Sail Beyond the Sunset*, published in paperback shortly before his death. Many SF critics feel that Heinlein was the single most influential SF writer. Heinlein, along with John W. Campbell, his mentor, pioneered "hard" or technologically-oriented sf.

Heinlein won four Hugos, for his novels Double Star (1956), Starship Troopers (1960), Stranger in a Strange Land (1962), and The Moon is a Harsh Mistress (1967). Heinlein was Guest of Honor at three Worldcons, in 1941, 1961, and 1976. He was awarded a Grand Master Nebula by SFWA in 1975 for his lifetime contribution to science fiction. Mundanely, Heinlein received the Boy's Clubs of America award in 1959, an award given by the children in the organization---which would perhaps partly explain the recent marked growth of science fiction fandom.

Those are the facts of this obituary. The emotion is something that I cannot commit to paper---but if you have been influenced by Heinlein as I have, then you know what I mean.

Heinlein was a vocal advocate of blood donation, often requesting that sf fen "bleed" before he would sign copies of his books. I don't know what arrangements Virginia Heinlein (Robert Heinlein's widow) has made for a memorial, but the Gulfstream Community Blood Center has set up an account in Heinlein's name. Donations of blood or money in Heinlein's memory will be accepted at any Broward and Palm Beach county Blood Center.

OASIS Update
