APRIL MEETING The next meeting of the South Florida Science Fiction Society will be held on Sunday, April 16th, starting at 2 pm. Local bookseller Robert Hittel will give a slide presentation on the subject of "Turn of the Century Fantasy Illustrators."

Location: Broward County Library West Regional, in Plantation. The address is 8601 W Broward Blvd, though it's not where you might expect. Go west on Broward, <u>past</u> the 2nd traffic light beyond University Drive. Get in the right "must turn only" lane and turn north onto Park Center Ct (aka NW 84 Avenue). Make the next left (almost two tenths of a mile north), then left again, and you'll be in the Library's parking lot.

FEBRUARY PROGRAM REVISITED Becky Peters presented a program on Mythology and Science Fiction. The purpose of mythology is to explain things pre-scientifically. Old Gods, dragons, the sunken city of Atlantis, and "people who dwell in the woods" are typical elements of Mythology. There are literally thousands of books on Atlantis. Exemplary works of mythology from Thomas Swan's work were presented, along with Poul Anderson's THERE WILL BE TIME, Delany's HINDSIGHT INTERCEPTION, and many others. A bibliography was and may still be available from Becky.

MARCH PROGRAM REVISITED OMNI Magazine's fiction editor Ellen Datlow was our special guest speaker. She gave personal views of a number of writers with present & future potential, and discussed her methods of editing and experience in the field.

Ms. Datlow majored in English literature at New York's State University in Albany, because she liked reading. Her first editing job was as a slush pile reader, where she evaluated manuscripts from unpublished writers, or those not submitted thru an agent. Working her way through several companies publishing mainstream works, she was hired by OMNI's Ben Bova, about 1978, to read fiction submissions. Gradually, her job matured to associate, and then fiction editor.

Ms. Datlow's personal tastes lean toward well written, hard hitting, sophisticated science fiction. Good plotting and characterization are extremely important. As an editor, she follows up on submissions that interest her, usually dealing directly with writers. Sometimes changes are suggested in the stories. Points she looks out for are inconclusive endings, problems in timing or structure, or inconsistencies of characters. She sees a part of her job as determining if "the author is expressing what he means to express."

OMNI Writer's Guidelines for Fiction were distributed at the meeting. Copies should be available thru our SFSFS Writer's Workshop (see Terri Wells). Lead time on OMNI publications is about 3 months, and it may even take over a year to see print once a story is bought.

TENTH ANNIVERSARY CONFERENCE ON THE FANTASTIC IN THE ARTS was held in Ft. Lauderdale March 15 - 19. Guest of Honor was British novelist Doris Lessing. She is noted for her Children of Violence and Canopus in Argos: Archives series, and other works. Guest Scholar was C. N. Manlove. Guest Artist was Suzanne Benton. Attending authors, editors & scholars included Brian Aldiss, Orson Scott Car, Joe Haldeman, Ellen Datlow, Tom Maddox, Robert Silverberg, Stephen Dolandson, F. M. Busby & many others. Academic papers on an enormous variety of genre subjects were presented. Capping the activities were the Tenth Annual IAFA Awards Banquet with Toastmaster (& IAFA President) Marshall Tymn. The Conference was held at the Ft. Lauderdale Airport Hilton.

Bruzzfuzzel News, 8-9/88,10-11/88,12/88-1/89- Newsletter of the Baton Rouge Science Fiction League. Three issues all at once, with local news & con review, articles, and letter of comment packed into 6 to 10 pages, each of small type.

Robots and Roadrunner, 12/88- publication of Ursa Major, The Literary S.F. & F. Society of Bexar County. This zine includes some fiction among the more usual staples (not just the metal ones). There is also the briefest of reviews of the SFSFS Shuttle #43. To quote its entirety, "same as always."

OASFiS Event Horizon, 12/88- clubzine of the Orlando SF Society. What can I say; same as always.

Westwind #136, 12/88- the usual fine clubzine of the North West S.F. Society. This issue mentions the SFSFS Shuttle and includes the Green Book- A partial directory of the Northwest S.F. Society's Membership.

The NASFA Shuttle, 12/88- newsletter of the North Alabama S.F. Association, with more locs than news this issue.

DASFAX, 1/89- newsletter of the Denver Area S.F. Association. More discussion than usual of Milehicon and election of officers.

<u>Instant Message</u> #453, 2/5/89- newsletter of the New England S.F. Association. Much discussion of Boskone, including an 8 page Boskone 26 debriefing dated 2/4/89.

The Insider #147, 2/89- Newsletter of the St. Louis S.F. Society. This issue actually has club meeting minutes and election campaign articles. Previous issues hardly mentioned such administrivia.

The Intergalactic Reporter, 2/89- Newsletter of the New Jersey S.F. Society. Among the usual reviews & news is a filk to the tune of "Banned from Argo" that almost scans. As for the filk's subject matter: I guess you had to be there.

The NASFA Shuttle, 2/89- Newsletter of the North Alabama S.F. Association. This was a short but very thought provoking issue, padded by the inclusion of a Hugo nomination ballot.

Westwind #137, 1/89- Newsletter of the North West S.F. Society. This issue doubles as a Norwescon 11 Progress Report and features an interview with their upcoming Fan Guest of Honor, Mike Glyer.

<u>ConNews</u>, 3/1/89- billed as "The New SF & F Convention Newspaper" this publication out of Westminster, Colorado continues to stick to its unfannishly regular schedule. It is an experiment that will be interesting to watch.

<u>Last of the Writers of the Purple Page</u>- A spirit duplicator (i.e. ditto) produced zine of fanzine reviews that reads a bit like a personal diary from "Dr. Shack the Quack" (a.k.a. Harry Andruschak). This came with a brief note to SFSFS.

Transmissions #275/276, 2/27/89- Newsletter of Nova Odysseus, United Gulf Coast Fandom. Congratulations are in order for the Ciccarelli's on the birth of their daughter.

Stone Hill Launch Times, 2/12/89- Newsletter of the Stone Hill group in the Tampa, FL area. This issue again has more recipes than news (some of them look good, too), and it arrived in perfect condition this time (I guess the envelope helped).

The Mad 3 Party #32, 2/89- Published by Noreascon 3 and edited by Tropicon VIII's Fan Guest of Honor, Leslie Turek. This publication bills itself as "more than you ever wanted to know about running a Worldcon." This issue is excellent as usual, except for misidentifing our Smofcon 7 proposal for Ft. Lauderdale as being an "Orlando" proposal


