FANTASY: COMING OF AGE (1900-1965)

On July 15, Joe Siclari and I presented a program at the Atlantic Ave. Branch of the Palm Beach Public Library on Fantasy Literature from the first half of this century.

Since the days of the scientific romance, there have been a number of viable trends in fantastic literature. Pulp adventures and romances, lost worlds, and the like (dinosaurs alive on a mysterious island! White Goddesses that live forever! An ape man lording it over the jungle!) were immensely popular during the early part of the century. The works of A. Merritt perhaps are the culmination of this trend in fantasy.

Weird Tales provided a different kind of fantastic journey. Margaret Brundage's sensual covers no doubt provided the impetus for an entire generation of straightlaced parents to take the magazine away from their male offspring. Lovecraft and his circle gave the world a new kind of horror story - not dependent on traditional folklore. The advent of indescribable horrors, and batrachian nightmares lead through the pages of Weird Tales, and the pens of such stalwarts as August Derleth, Donald Wandrei, Frank Belknap Long, Robert Bloch and Klarkash-Ton Smith to modern horrifiers Ramsey Campbell and others. The writers of the circle did not write horror only. Mighty thewed Robert E. Howard can be credited with single handedly (against great odds?) starting the sword & sorcery school of fantasy. And of course, the most popular and prolific Weird Tales author was not Lovecraft, but Seabury Quinn.

Thorne Smith and his assortment of sensual ghosts, 900 year old amorous leprechauns, and small Egyptian gods made fantasy fun. His screwball fantasies have the unusual property of making their readers very thirsty. Hip flask at their side, characters cavort through his pages finding love and fulfillment with an engaging set of not quite usual partners

despite the too tight strictures of humdrum society. Turnabout, Topper and Night Life of the Gods have been filmed. Turnabout, in particular, has had many film and television versions. One of the first paperbacks ever produced (for the armed forces in WWII) was Night Life of the Gods.

Among Thorne Smith's inheritors can be counted Fletcher Pratt and Sprague de Camp. Of the magazines, (the great lamented) *Unknown* printed stories in this mold and created a style of its own in the minds of many readers. *Unknown* fell victim to wartime paper shortages. It's sister magazine, *Astounding Science Fiction*, survived.

In the tradition of William Morris, high fantasy was written. Taking inspiration from national epics (Northern myths, Mabinogion, etc.) such novels as Evageline Walton's Virgin and the Swine, and Poul Anderson's Broken Sword were engrossing adventures unlike anything else in the field. High fantasy reached its pinnacle of popularity with the publication by Ace, and the resulting brouhaha, of Tolkien's Lord of the Rings.

We also covered: Lord Dunsany, Mervyn Peake, Eddison, the Inklings, Henry Kuttner, Thomas Burnett Swann and others. Thomas Burnett Swann's gentle fantasy, drawing on Mediterranean mythology of all stripes (from Greek to Judaic biblical), struck a unique note in the field. Dr. Swann taught literature at Florida Atlantic University, and is dearly missed in South Florida.



Guests of Honor:

Lynn Abbey is a creative fantasy author. Her first novel, Daughter of the Bright Moon, appeared in 1979. Conquest, the second novel in her historical fantasy series (Unicorn & Dragon) was published in 1988. Other works include The Black Flame, The Guardians and stories in anthologies such as Heroes in Hell and Merovingen Nights. Lynn Abbey is also known for her part in creating the shared universe series, Thieves" World. She is co-editor of the series with her husband Robert Asprin. Lynn has worked in computers, and as a Russian translator. Her studies in history and the martial arts make her fantasy novels more realistic.

Leslie Turek has been an active SF fan for more than 20 years. She was Chairman of Noreascon II, Boston's 1980 Worldcon and has been active in national and regional conventions as well. Among other posts, she headed art show at the 1985 NASFiC in Austin, Texas, and chaired Boskone 6, in 1969. For the past several years, Leslie has edited *Mad 3 Party*, a fanzine devoted to providing information about Noreascon 3 and Worldcon running. *Mad 3* provides more (and better!) information about organizing conventions than any other publication available. In 1988, Leslie was nominated for Best Fan Writer, and *Mad 3 Party* for the Best Fanzine of the year.

Toastmaster: C. J. Cherryh received the John W. Campbell Award in 1977 for Best New Writer and, since, has garnered her share of critical acclaim as well as popularity. Carolyn has won the Hugo and Balrog awards. Her works such as Downbelow Station, Cuckoo's Egg, 40000 In Gehenna, The Pride of Chanur, and Serpent's Reach assure a devoted and growing readership. She edits the Merovingen Nights shared-universe series, and wrote a "Heroes in Hell" novel. Cyteen is a nominee for this year's Hugo award for best novel. C. J. also writes and peforms her own filksongs. She could as easily have been our filk guest or professional guest as well as toastmaster.
