

Another "supernatural killer on the revenge-kick" flick. This one's average, adding nothing new of significance while missing few traditional shock opportunities. Producer Sean Cunningham (DEEPSTAR SIX, FRIDAY THE 13TH) hasn't progressed

much in his comprehension of the craft of filmmaking.

The special effects overshadow what little acting ability the cast can muster and that's not saying much. Favorite line: "It's just a figure of speech, like all the other phrases you've heard tonight that don't make sense."

REVIEWS

JEKYLL AND HYDE ABC

On January 21st, ABC unleashed it's new, improved & updated version of a recognized Horror classic. The result, JEKYLL AND THE AMAZING INFLATABLE BLADDER FACIAL DEVICE, is best summarized as 60% Lurid Tabloid Sensationalism, 20 % FX Gimcrackery, 20 % Inert Material and 2 % Robert Louis Stevenson.

Instead of Stevenson's chilling story of a man's battle with the dual sides of his nature, we were subjected to an interminable 2 hours of inept Eliza Doolittle impressions (As God is my witness, I actually heard, "AAAOOWWW... Ahm a good girl ah am!"), a daughter cast out into the storm by her disgraced father ("Adultress!!", he screamed, pointing to the door.), a sleazeball investigative reporter and a misguided scientist striving to create a "new breed of man."

This film actually ended with a freeze frame close up of a child wearing a mini-version of the Jekyll makeup. Apparently the director thought that blaring trumpets and THE END? superimposed on the child's face might be just a bit too much. COULD THERE BE A POSSIBLE SEQUEL IN THE WORKS?

That spinning sound is Robert Louis Stevenson doing his impression of the Tasmanian Devil.

If you want to see a faithful and extremely effective adaptation of a classic work of horror, I highly recommend that you that you catch THE YELLOW WALLPAPER on PBS's MASTERPIECE THEATER, if, and when, PBS repeats it.

TEKWAR - William Shatner

Talk about a "Tempest in a Teapot."...

What we have here is a fairly nondescript "noir" formula mystery (Framed, substance abusing, hard-boiled cop is mysteriously released from "The Cooler" and given an opportunity to track down those who put him away) with science fiction buzz words stapled to it. Pretty humdrum stuff. Mind Candy. Fluff.

The problem here is that the author is William Shatner; a man who's spent the past 2 decades portraying a science fiction icon. As a result, cheap-shot critics and crazed Trekkies have been having a field day with their own mutant version of "Tastes Great!" "Less Filling!"

Chill out, everyone! This is just a simple little pot-boiler that's mildly satisfying but easily forgettable. It's not good science fiction, but I've read worse. It certainly doesn't deserve Best Seller status but there's no need for the author to be pilloried while his book is used to toast marshmallows.

Terry Thomas . Comic Actor Terry-Thomas died January 8th, ending a 15 year battle against the debilitating effects of Parkinson's Disease. Among the genre films in which he played the "quintessential blackhearted rotter" were: tom thumb: The Wonderful World of The Brothers Grimm; The Mouse On The Moon; Munster, Go Home; Kiss The Girls And Make Them Die; Dorellek; Danger: Diabolik: Those Fantastic Flying Fools; 2000 Years Later; The Abominable Dr Phibes; Dr Phibes Rises Again; I Love A Mystery (TVM): Vault Of Horror & Hound Of The Baskervilles (1978).

Alan Hale Jr Best known as Jonas Grumby, the skipper on Gilligan's Island, Alan Hale Jr died of cancer on January 16th.

Genre films included: It Happens Every Spring; The Crawling Hand and The Giant Spider Invasion.

Genre television appearances include: Wild Wild West, Land Of The Giants and four appearances on Fantasy Island.

Barbara Stanwyck The prototype for Kathleen Turner (rent Body Heat and Double Indemnity from your local video emporium and watch them back-to-back), Stanwyck was best known for portraying sultry women who were, at least, as capable as, if not better than, any man.

Genre appearances included: Flesh And Fantasy; The Two Mrs Carrolls; The Night Walker; The House That Wouldn't Die (TVM) and A Taste Of Evil (TVM).

My wife would never forgive me if I didn't also mention The Thorn Birds.

Ava Gardner One of the screen's great noir femme fatales, Ms Gardner died of pneumonia on January 25th.

Genre films include: Ghosts On The Loose; One Touch of Venus; Pandora And The Flying Dutchmen; Knights Of The Round Table; On The Beach; Seven Days In May; The Devil's Widow; Earthquake; The Blue Bird (1976); The Sentinel and The Kidnapping Of The President.

Robert Adams The author of the popular "Horseclans" series died on January 4th, at a Florida Hospice, as a result of a prolonged and debilitating illness.

Besides the Horseclans novels, Adams co-edited numerous anthologies, including one with Andre Norton, and was working on a new series; "The Castaways In Time".

His panel appearance with Poul Anderson was a highlight of TROPICON VII.
