

Dear Don & Fran,

I'm a bit late responding to your August SHUTTLE. Blame a mixture of old age, hot weather, and apa obligations.

"Samurai Lost" seems to be a case of written fiction influenced by filmed fiction. The emphasis on violent action and rapidfire course of events are what I'd expect to experience if I went to a theater where action films were featured. But the story is pretty well told and it has a real plot, something that rarely appears in fanzine stories of this length which tend to be episodes rather than full-fledged stories.

It's a shame about the smoke bomb at OKon. I hope it doesn't have anything to do with the decision to terminate this series of cons. But it won't help fandom's reputation with the hotel and motel industry in the United States which has already suffered from similar senseless misbehavior.

The epidemic of movies and novels about vampires in the past decade could create a mistaken belief that this theme is peculiar to the late 20th century. Publication of DRACULA'S BROOD which you review in this issue should be a good reminder that vampires are a quite elderly topic for fantasy fiction and just experienced a recent revival of interest. I've read THE VOR GAME and enjoyed it quite a lot. Unlike most of your club members, I'm old enough to have thought about the old PLANET STORIES type of science fiction while reading Lois Bujold's novel, which is somewhat more sophisti- cated than the stories in that old pulp but still possesses much of the same general atmosphere. Like Chet Williamson, I am fond of theaters and Hagerstown has one that is haunted, much like the setting of REIGN. The Maryland Theater here was built in the 1910s as a vaudeville house, became mainly a movie theater when sound became popular, gradually lost patronage when television eventually closed down, then was the scene of a disastrous fire. The lobby and upper stories of the building were destroyed but the theater itself was salvaged, renovated, and has been serving in recent years mainly for musical events. appearances comedians, and other live performances. Several of its managers have confirmed the existence of the ghost, who has been tentatively identified (by his son) as the Warner Brothers district manager who had his headquarters in the Maryland during his many years in that capacity. The ghost can be heard, whistling, walking up and down stairs, and closing distant doors late at night when audiences have departed and nobody is left in the building but one or two staff members.

WOLF IN THE FOLD by Simon R. Green Ace; 1991; \$3.95

If you haven't yet discovered this series (this is number 4), you are missing a mystery/horror/fantasy romp that does not mislead when claiming to be action packed. The author is having a great time taking various favorite themes, adding his own twists and providing the reader with a ride straight out of a fun house! The first book was a locked room murder involving sorcerers and were-wolves; since then the protagonists have been involved with every form of crime plus varpires, warring gods and magic gone wrong, worse and worst.

Ignore the handsome couple on the covers. Hawke swings a mean axe and is married to Fisher, who prefers sword and dagger. (Wonder what the shiny steel ball at the end of her braid is really for...) As captains in the city guard they patrol the (totally mis-named) city of Haven. A chorus of "a policeman's lot is not a happy one" seems appropriate here, nor is it a wealthy one since they are reasonably honest and Hawk is always paying for the last damaged uniform cape. Their attitude is that of survivors who've seen about everything and what they haven't seen is now being tossed at them as quickly as possible. The current story involves going undercover (punishable by death if detected), treason, a long-lived family curse and a very funny seance. Book 5 is due in December and I will be ordering it for my library branch.

by James White Ballentine; 1991; \$5.99

There are a few authors whose work is automatically purchased as soon as it is spotted; James White is at the end of my short list. His aliens are fascinating, his sense of humor tickles mine and I generally just plain enjoy his books. Just so you know I was prepared to enjoy this...

Welcome to an earth where the major force of western civilization is Irish. The kingdom of Hibernia is Ireland and an America with Amerindian cultures intact. With help from its friends, the kingdom is

just about ready to launch the first interstellar ship. The narrator has a talent for inserting foot in mouth and then talking his way out of the resulting situation. He is non-believer (i.e. non-Christus also a follower) and a male in the traditionally female (in his culture) profession of healer. All of which has prepared him to think for himself and to persevere despite obstacles. The odds against him increase when he offends the priest who is second in command of the ship and in charge of the new colony. The priest, who is supposedly acting from the best of intentions, is blindly bigoted and narrow-(not He gutter-)minded. unfortunately is powerful enough to get away with his vindictive behavior (Gnashing of my teeth accompanied fair portion 8 appearances!).

Within 441 pages there is a carefully developed alternate world, some historical tales, two different survival stories, a romance against uphill odds, a terrific first-contact story and a twist at the end. What more could you ask? Buy this book and enjoy.


