# View From the Floor

Up until after Friday's luncheon, my view of MagiCon was probably much the same as anyone else's -- all the hard work was paying off quite nicely. My view changed abruptly after a close encounter with a baby in a stroller. As for the accident -- you'll have to ask someone who saw it, since I did not.

What I do know is that I went over backwards, landing on my head and backside. Within mere seconds people from the Electrical Eggs table were there, immobilizing and prepping me for the arrival of the paramedics. At that point their calm efficiency was a lifeline, especially since I had not realized how much my vision depended on being able to swing my head around (I can report that if you've seen one hospital ceiling, you've seen them all. Surely there is a vast untapped market there). Reminding myself that I was too old to cry in public, I lay there trying to figure out if anything was seriously damaged, while others took care of all the details. Actually, when I was a kid I had wanted to ride in an ambulance, as an adult on a backboard in a stiff collar I discovered it is not a comfortable way to go!

Since nothing was truly damaged, and didn't even hurt as long as I didn't move, I returned to the convention center and quickly discovered that without help I was extremely limited in participation. The Electrical Eggs crew came through again and with a flip of my charge card I was on wheels. There were definite advantages to this, since access was no longer a problem and my finite energy could extend all day, rather than wiping out at 11:00 a.m. Andre Norton challenged me to a race that somehow never came off, and generally I was able to participate in more than I expected that Friday evening.


If this sounds like a plug for Electrical Eggs, it should be. They were all able, competent, friendly and prepared. Because of them I got to enjoy the convention, and was even able to meet the rest of my obligations. I did have to beat off a

wheel-swipe attempt (Dina was also able to get wheels) and it took a while to learn to maneuver (the Student Driver sign was for real!) but unlike NolaCon I did not find myself limited to one hotel.

Which brings up one odd note: When I was using the self-propelled chair at NolaCon people tended to talk above me or to anyone accompanying me. It was frustrating, embarrassing and thought provoking. When I was on three wheels this did not happen. I don't know if attitudes have improved that much or if the additional height had something to do with it, or if powered chairs convey a more in-control image. I found it interesting.

I've spent parts of two worldcons in wheel chairs -- wonder if Electrical Eggs is taking reservations for Glasgow?

# CON REPORTS

# **ØMAGICON**<a>⟨</a>

If you weren't at Magicon, you've probably already read about it so I'll just toss in a few views of my own. Arriving on Thursday, I checked in at the Quality Inn, registered, and ate, before going to the One-Shot Concert, sort of a semi-open-mike and a good way to start off a worldcon. If other cons have had them, I missed them. But I like the idea. The filksing started slow and never got very large. There were several good singers including Harold Groot. The filksings on Friday and Saturday were enjoyable too, but nothing much happened Sunday night. I suppose everyone who hadn't left were at the rendevous featuring Dave Clement, Bill Sutton, many etc. The afternoon concerts were great, although I think 2 hours each day would have been enough, since there were one-shots each day. That would have given me more time for panels, dealer's room, art shows, and visiting. My only real complaint is that there was very little attention paid to the late-night filking circles. The smokers' lounge was usually going since Leslie Fish spent a lot of time there, but the other filks I went to were small and spontaneous. I hope the next worldcon has a designted BNFilker each night for each type of filk (Bardic, chaotic, etc).

What I saw of the rest of the con looked well run. The Art Show was fabulous. In my one quick trip through, I left behind a trail of drool, seeing all the great art I couldn't afford. Unfortunately I only got to make one trip around the outside aisle of the dealers' room. Or fortunately, since that meant I only spent about \$20. That's where I spent the most time at my first few cons. Sigh. There was a huge amount of programming. In fact, I think 15 tracks is a bit much. However, the 4 panels I made it to were full plus standing room, so I could be wrong. I enjoyed Hal Clement's slide talk on how the way sf has written about Jupiter has changed as we've learned more. Also Jerry Poumelle's talk on the Clipper reusable rocket. Jerry was invited to give his views at a NASA panel. Someone forgot to provide a chair for him, so he dragged up one for himself and joined in. Just listening to his remarks, the best thing would be for 100 or 50 American companies to cough up 5 or 10 million apiece and really put us in space.

All in all a good worldcon and the busiest I ever been at one. The beds at the Quality Inn were made of concrete and it was a fair walk, especially carrying a guitar and filk books. But at a third the price, I got about what I paid for. See you at Winnipeg.

### \*NECRO\*

Necronomicon was kind to filkers this time, actually putting us on the schedule and giving us one of the program rooms. An additional bonus was the distance of the room from the dances. Their thoughtfulness was much appreciated (I rate them 4 dandelions!). The filking was fairly well attended Friday night, but Saturday was sparse. We were competing with two dances and the OASIS party (held in the Con Suite). There were also some interruptions, drunken fools banging on the glass door which led to the outside of the hotel. Some kind of "killer" game, I understand (what kind of points do you get for harassing filkers?).

The attendees were mostly very young (or am I getting older?) and were mostly the party set. But that is Necro's style. There were familiar faces from around the state, but not nearly as many as would be found at Tropicon, OASIS and CrackerCon. They live in a different world out west.

The parties were sparse Friday evening, but they were scattered all over the hotel Saturday. The vampires and cyber-punks provided the mundanes (airline crews and National Guard) with something to write home about. My only gripe was the transformation of the lobby bar into a "sports bar", replete with blaring televisions everywhere (Friday was 10 cent beer night, so there was a huge mass of mundanes crowded around there). However, that certainly was not the convention's fault.

The panels I attended were moderately well attended, and interesting. The "Check's in the Mail, part 2" panel on Sunday, which was supposed to be a chance for the authors to gripe about their problems, turned out to be just the opposite. Jim Hogan had no complaints, Glen Cook and Carl Lundgren ditto, with Johanna Bolton the only odd "man" out. The auctions were lively, and the cabaret on Friday eve was a lot of fun. It provided all with a chance to tell that favorite bad joke, and there were some pretty entertaining acts.

The dealers' room was a disappointment, with only one book dealer. There were plenty of games, japanimation and jewelry. Glen Cook had brought some books, so one of the dealers was selling them for him.

Altogether, it was a pleasant weekend.

# Glasgow in 1995

Breaking the voting record set last year in Chicago, here are the final results of the 1995 Worldcon Site Selection:

1147 for Atlanta
1310 for Glasgow
32 for No Preference
11 for "I-95 in '95"
6 for blank ballots
2 for None of the Above and 1 for "Ny in '95."

There were 55 invalid ballots (for one reason or another) for a total of 2564 ballots cast, compared to 2107 votes cast at Chicon V. The convention will be called "Intersection" and will run August 24th through 28th, 1995 with Guests of Honor Samuel R. Delany and Gerry Anderson.


