Remember, to vote you must have been active in fandom prior to September, 1966.

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MISCELLANEOUS NEWSNOTES: The Tale Of The Big Computer by Olof Johanneson is about a future time when humanity disappears because the computers have taken over. The book, a January release from Coward McCann (\$4), will be made into an opera. The Royal Swedish Opera has commissioned Karl-Birger Blomdahl, distinguished Swedish composer, to write the opera's music for performance by an electronic orchestra.

Lawrence P. Ashmead has been appointed department head in charge of the Crime Club as well as science fiction titles at Doubleday. Ashmead joined the company in 1960 as an assistant editor in the science department.

NEWS FROM FANTASY & SCIENCE FICTION: Several people have found it extremely difficult to pick up the December F&SF, as their local newsstands are not getting it. The reason for this, according to Edward Ferman, editor of F&SF, is that the marazine changed distributors effective with the December issue. The magazine's old Distributor, Lanhattan News Co., which operates the Union Newsstands in the airports, bus stations, and subways around the city, wanted to be paid for a guaranteed sale higher than the actual sale. F&SF, which couldn't meet their financial demands was forced to change distributors.

The new company, G.I. Distributors, located in Queens, will have distribution problems under control within a month, and the January issue should be on all newsstands on schedule. In a seperate move, F&SF is forced to raise its price in England due to the devalation of the English pound. The new price, effective with the February issue, will be 4 shillings per copy. The price had previously been 3 shillings and 6 pence. The new price is equivalent to 48¢ in US funds. (Source: Edward Ferman)

Ghod Is Not Dead -- He'll be at St. LouisCon in '69!!!

From time to time I (Dave Van Arnam, of 1730 Harrison Ave, Apt 353, Bronx, NY 10453, sole prop of this fanzine, which rides for free with Andy Porter's SF WEEKLY) get this feeling that no one pays any attention any more to FIRST DRAFT, which doesn't particularly bother me except that I feel that I've got some things to say, from time to time. I also get the feeling that people think I'm just rambling on about things. Perhaps

this is true; for the last two issues I went on at great length on one aspect of what I had billed as a vigorous massage of the Media. Ok, let's see how far I can get into the next phase without losing track of what I'm getting at.

Topic: Is something new happening?

I don't know. But if it is, it's beginning to be absolutely certain that the Media are going to be the last to know it (with some notable an pleasant exceptions).

I count myself, by the way, as a reasonably disinterested observer; I have found no answers and, like Gertrude Stein, may not even know the questions. I'm a Nixon Republican (one of my few long-time Causes), I've never taken LSD, I'm not a speed freak nor a marijuana addict, I intend to sign the petition sent to SFWA members stating support of the US commitment to South Viet Nam, I think that if we don't do something for the Negro pretty soon they're really going to start burning down the cities and are going to be slaughtered (this is the most negative aspect of the current war), and I have lots of other eclectic ideas. By this I only mean to point out that I am, as I said, reasonably disinterested in terms of having any single attitude or solution. For now, anyway.

Since I have not taken LSD, I cannot say from my own experience whether it is a good or a bad thing. However, most of what I have heard and what I read seems at this point to indicate that it may well be a very good thing indeed, if you know what you're getting into. When LSD causes harm, the cause seems usually traceable to one or more of several things.

1 Approximately 2% of the human race shd never take LSD under any circumstances; these people, I understand, are those who are schizophrenic in a particular fashion that happens to be chemically verifiable (the East Village Other once printed a New Jersey address where such tests could be made for a small charge). If these people take LSD, it can cause all sorts of horrendous psychoses and whatnot. But some go ahead anyway, thus providing fodder for the scare-Media. 2 An LSD trip shd never be taken alone and, what is more, shd never be taken without a thoroly competent guide in whom you have full personal trust. trip alone and you're liable to wake up dead on the sidewalk because no one was with you to prevent you from flying out your fifth floor window. Take a trip without a competent trusted guide and if your trip starts to go bad the incompetent and/or untrusted guide won't be able to help you, and you're liable to wake up in Bellevue freaked out of your mind for a few months. 3 Know what a trip is. It looks to me as if a lot of bad trips are simply caused by the subject's negative response to sensations, perceptions, experiences he didn't expect. There was a long thing on

Null-Q Press Undecided Publication #291 hippies and psychedelics in LOOK some months back, and it included a revealing account of a bad trip taken by one of the magazine's editors. He wanted to find out what the LSD experience was about; apparently he didn't take the trouble to study up on it first, because his writeup at no point indicates any real understanding of what he says was happening. And as for the bad trip, he himself inadvertendly gave away the reason for it when he wrote of panicking at last when it seemed to him he was struggling on the lip of some mental whirlpool that was trying to make him let go and fall into...whatever it was. Now as I say, I haven't taken LSD myself, but from what I've read, at that point the man had come up against the drug's insistence that he simply let go and let the substance do its job. Since he fought, it turned the whole thing into a bad trip.

There are other points I cd number and add on, but I'm not writing a treatise on how to turn on. I simply wanted to point out that the indications at present are that the much-vaunted dangers of LSD can be substantially minimized by proper care. I've no doubt that there are tripsters in fandom who will tell me that I don't know what I'm talking about, and they may be right. But I'll bet they tell me I'm closer to being right than the hypothetical non-user who will probably write me to tell me I don't know what I'm talking about.

Hm, yes, there are two major dangers we're warned about I didn't cover. One seems a justifiable warning -- pregnant women, and women who have decided to become pregnant in the very near future, shd not take LSD. LSD originally was derived from ergot, which, as I understand it, has been used for millenia to cause abortions. It seems quite possible that LSD, like ergot, can cause abortion. Point against LSD. (But one, obviously, that can be ignored by men, and women content to remain on the Pill.)

There is also some evidence LSD causes chromosome damage, tho different investigators have come up with conflicting reports. There are several considerations that apply here in taking some of the curse off this possibility. One is that there is as yet no evidence that this fact (if it is a fact) means anything. Another is that many common substances cause similar chromosome breaks, including, I am told, coffee, aspirin, artificial sweeteners, etc., from which I will allow you to draw your own conclusions. A third is that LSD has been around for some years now, and a lot of babies have been born to women who have taken LSD, yet no one has come up with a single baby that can be said to have been harmed by LSD chromosome damage. A recent case has come up of a partially-deformed child whose mother had taken LSD, true; but she took it during the first three months of pregnancy, and as I said above, the facts already seem to show that that is absolutely contraindicated.

The Federal Narcotics Bureau has frequently gone on record as being absolutely...puzzled, shd I say?...by the vast surge of interest in using psychedelics among the young. Their feeling is that the psychedelics are dangerous and harmful, and, a level lower, below their verbalizations but in range of some other critics who have explicitly said this, that the psychedelics a do nothing, are useless, are escapism, b result in the formation of a way of life that wd ultimately mean the destruction of The American Way of Life. This last concept is sort of big in the Media right now, usually by snide implication, and in a way it may be what I am leading up to. Next week I'm going to try to deal with the results that seem to come from this growing use of psychedelics. Preview I'm not too sure... Still, I am hoping that you are the sane...

This space for rent cheap

Currently exercising the Media is the problem of completely documenting the disintegration of the hippie concept. The Media is convinced that the hippie 'movement' is dying or dead, and for the most part the Media is (are?) contented, to say the least, that this is so.

But is it so?

I don't know. I'm not a hippie. But I have a sneaking feeling that the Media are wrong again.

What do the hippies represent that everyone's so exercised about them, one way and another? Psychedelic drugs, to liberate the spirit from ego games; that seems to be it in a nutshell. Points to be considered in relation to this are that, rather amazingly as far as I'm concerned, a lot of people have gone through this psychedelic dropout scene and have come out the other side -- not, however, to sell out, although when they get to the other side they usually turn around and say "you don't need the drugs; it's all in your mind and you can do it yourself." Prime example: the Beatles, who went thru pot and LSD, allowed LSD to do whatever it does, allowed LSD in this case to transform both their music and their life structure -- and are now zeroing in on Hindu mysticism. I.e., the psychedelics, from the mature hippie point of view (let's not argue the word 'hippie' right now, huh? There's real and there's phony, and right now I'm talking about real), seem to be primarily useful to make the initial breakthru; after that, one goes on to other things.

There are, perhaps, hippies-in-process and hippies-beyond, tho that does not strike me as neatly phrased.

When in-process, we have Hashbury and the East Village, where hippies attempt a dropped-out life of love, joy, and rapt religious contemplation. But with more and more people progressing beyond (wherever that is, and I have enough trouble trying to grasp the in-process concepts), there has been a shift in emphasis. Partly as a result of this, it has appeared that the whole scene is dying on its feet (wretched metaphor).

And the Media love this. Not only the Media, for that matter -- the VILLAGE VOICE, juiceless voice of people left over from about two stages of progress in the past, has been positively gleeful that the Love Generation, the Flower Children, are, to quasiquote them, "learning that love isn't enough, that you've got to fight back, that flowers aren't the answer to police clubs, " etc. The same cheerless glee infuses an article in the current NATION by some tired old activist psychologist, who says, among other things, "...the main fact of hippie life is that the prescription is not feasible." New Left activists seem positively venemous in their delight that the hippies are being "forced to face up to the realities," according to New Left activist definitions of

Null-Q Press Undecided Publication #292 reality (which shd tell you something right there...). The call once more goes out for violence and destruction, and only sneers are left for those odd folk who polished the badges of the peace officers arresting them, washed sanitation trucks, stuck flowers in MP rifle-barrels. It seems that the New Left thinks the hippies invented nonviolence, and that nonviolence is wrong.

Of course the conservatives have been gleeing also; NATIONAL REVIEW ran an article on hippies a few months ago telling us with no-nonsense vigor that the hippies are simply heretics, since they believe in love, peace, freedom, un-hung-up sex, etc.

Alan W. Watts, in his recent paperback titled THE BOOK ON THE TABOO AGAINST KNOWING WHO YOU ARE, has, without specifically stating the fact, shown in simple manner the basic nature of the Eastern mystic concepts toward which most serious hippie thought seems to trend. Now, long-term readers of FIRST DRAFT are well aware that my attitude towards religion is, well, atheistic. I hold neither with Western activist theologies such as Christianity, which has caused far too much unnecessary suffering, nor with the Eastern contemplative religious philosophies that have produced the epic miseries of the East (since mysticism transcends any ordinary perception of reality, the ordinary perception of reality called hunger is rendered unimportant; hence, India is in a constant state of semi-starvation).

What I think the hippies may be getting at is a kind of fusion between the best of the East -- Thou-art-God, everything is God, everything is holy, true, and beautiful, as a rough first approximation -- and the best of the West -- not our technology of death but our technology of life. (If the hippies ever start seriously claiming that all technology is evil, or some such baloney, they're going to lose me fast; where wd the SERGEANT PEPPER album be without technology? For that matter, where wd our stereo fm and radio be, without which for a civilized person life wd be a lot less colorful.)

This is a question apart from all the scurryings-about of the Media and the New Left and the New Right. This is a philosophical question that perhaps has never been posed before as a contemporary possibility.

If you follow the Underground Press Syndicate in any of its avatars (i.e. the Boston AVATAR, the EVO here, the L.A. FREE PRESS, OPEN CITY, The BARB, YARROW STALKS, etc.) you will have found that the hippies/free men/whathaveyou are marvelously unconcerned with the reports of their demise. What you or I or "They" might think of the hippies is irrelevant They are proceeding along their own lines. They are growing more responsible (i.e. they are alerting the underground about the dangers of methodrine -- SPEEN KILLS articles, ads, posters -- and about health matters, VD, hepatitis, etc.). They are forming tribes, moving to the country, growing their own food (thus, by the way, obviating the criticism that they are only parasitical).

They consider that American -- and Western -- culture is a lie. And every time they open a paper (say, the NEW YORK TIMES...) they see more proofs of it. They don't seem so much interested in destroying this culture, however, so much as transforming it -- which is the main difference between them and the far-left agitators who are so upset by the hippies. And along the way (and see again Watts' THE BOOK ON THE TABOO AGAINST KNOWING WHO YOU ARE) they seem to be finding some answers that make a new kind of sense. We shall see. They're certainly a hell of a lot more appealing than Peking-based hoodlumism. \(\precent{\Psi}\) Hoping you are the sane...

## THE TRANSATLANTIC FAN FUND

VOTING BALLOT

The candidates:

Ed Cox
Ted Johnstone
Steve Stiles
"Hold Over Funds"

Voting:

TAFF uses the Australian Ballot, a vote-counting technique with a built-in runoff count: On the first "ballot," only first-place votes are counted; then, if of 100 votes four candidates get 40-30-20-10, the last one is dropped and the second choices of his 10 supporters become first-place votes distributed between the remaining three candidates; this procedure is repeated until the leading candidate has over 50% of the vote, thus assuring a majority winner.

When voting, rank the candidates in the exact order in which you prefer them. If you don't rank them all the way, you forfeit your vote if the ones you do list are eliminated.

"Hold Over Funds":

This choice, similar to a "No Award" vote in Hugo balloting, gives the voter an opportunity to vote for no TAFF trip in a given campaign in the event that either the candidates don't appeal strongly enough to him or he feels that TAFF should slow down its program of trips. "Hold Over Funds" may be listed in first, second, third or fourth place, just like any other candidate, and the votes will be counted accordingly. If the final, majority vote is against sending a candidate this year, funds will be held over for the next election.

Continuing Voting Rules:

Under no circumstances may a fan vote more than once or enter one candidate's name more than once on a ballot. Details of voting will be kept secret. Write-ins are permitted. No proxy votes are allowed; each voter must sign his own ballot.

Each candidate has promised that barring acts of God he will travel to the British National Convention on Easter, 1968 if elected. In addition, they have posted bond and provided signed nominations. Their platforms are on the reverse of this sheet, along with the voting blanks.

Votes must reach one of the two Administrators on or before January 5, 1968. The result of the election will be announced as soon as possible after this date.
