The Office of Censorship in Washington has requested that we cease the practice of publishing names and addresses of fans in service, both at home and abroad, because of the danger this entails not only for the living of these fans, but for security of our own shores.

They pointed out that men in service are forbidden to correspond with strangers, and the Leg. has encouraged just that; as well as giving to some detail the positions of certain units and forces. This will be a blow to the "free fanzines for fans in service" movement, but the various fan editors will have to get along as best they can themselves, by sending fanzines to home addresses, and such away addresses as they get from the trusted fan himself, hereafter. Leg will carry only the name of the fans who are in service, but no other information about them.
