Croutch and a book review of 'Dancing on a Volcano' a volume about Atlantis, Lompuria and (oh, yes) future continents a feature of considerable interest.

Star-Treader's department states that P.Schuyler Miller's story 'THE TITAN' is to be published in book form by W.L. Crawford. The Price will be (in US) one dollar and if a success will lead to others being

issued.
