"IF" TO ADD 32 PAGES WITH SEPTEMBER ISSUE

NEW YORK, 3 May, (CNS) - Diane Sullivan Associate Editor of If announced today that her magazine, If, would add 32 pages with the September 1965 issue, making a total of 162 pages for this active s-f magazine.

The price will remain the same, 50¢ and the magazine will continue to be a monthly.

This came hard on the beels of the announcement by Sol Cohen that his two new magazines, Amazing Stories, and Fantastic, will also add 32 pages. Most of the science-fiction magazines on the stands now stand at 162 pages and 50¢ with the exception of Fantasy & Science Fiction, Gamma, and Magazine of Horror (all with 130 pages and 50¢) and of course Galaxy with 194 pages and 60¢.

Thus a new standard has been set for science-fiction magazines. Up until now the standard had been 130 pages and 50¢. Now with the new additions, the standard has gone up to 162 pages and 50¢. Galaxy more or less fits in this

standard with its 194 pages and 60¢. It will be interesting to see what Fantasy and Science Fiction will do now.

MAD magazine, one of the few non-science fiction maggzines that seems to interest-most science-fiction readers, just increased its price from 25¢ to 30¢. This has been the first increase in price this magazine has had since it changed from a dime comic magazine to a 25¢ large-size magazine in the early 50s. MAD continues to publish a large 50¢ reprint edition and paperback reprints. The latest paperback is THE MAD SAMPLER.

Dickson, Charles F. Fontenay, Ron Goulart, Kit Reed, Jules Verne, Jay Williams, and Fritz Leiber. The magazine has interior illustrations, but just printing on the cover. The stories are reprints from the U.S. Fantasy & Science Fiction, and Venture Science Fiction.

Latest reports indicate that Sam Moskowitz's excellent science fiction article series "Profile", long in the Ziff-Davis Amazing Stories, will in the future be published in Fred Polh's Morlds of Tomorrow. These articles are proclaimed as the best of their type ever published in science-fiction.
