# NEW "FANTASY" MAG COMING

THE TIME STREAM - - - - - - -

Syracuse, 16 May, (CNS) - The May 1959 issue of Writers Digest announced that: Camerarts Publishing Co., Inc. of Chicago will soon publish a fact-fiction fantasy magazine. It will be published bi-monthly and the first issue will be out August. Editor-In-Chief Paul G. Neimark states his need for the proposed mag is: "...our need is immediate for all lengths of stories and weird true adventures, from 3000 to 30,000 words. Anything which cannot b'e scientifically explained is welcomed here, although we do want a tight plot and good characterization --- even if the main character is a ghost or a monster from the depths of the earth. We will use one long story per issue (20,000 - 30,000 words) and a couple of short-shorts (5000 or less). The balance of the pieces should run between 6000 a n d 12,000 words. No science-fiction, since we intend to make this magazine the purest excape reading on the newsstands. Payments on acceptance: is a word for first acceptance by an author, higher rates thereafter."

In a later notice in The Writers magazine, it was stated that the new fantasy magazine would be called Strange Stories and will be pocket-book in size.

If you'll remember Strange Stories was once a title of Pines (or Standard) Magazines back in the late 30s.

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"FANTASTIC" TITLE CHANGED TO "FANTASTIC SCIENCE FICTION STORIES"

NEW YORK, 25 May, (CNS) - Fantastic will change its name again with the September 1959 issue. This time it'll be Fantastic Science Fiction Stories. Fantastic started life as plain Fantastic; then under Paul Fairman it became Fantastic Science Fiction. It later became plain Fantastic again - and now Fantastic Science Fiction Stories. It seems that "science-fiction" is still needed to sell a science-fiction/fantasy magazine. Cele Goldsmith states that the contents of the magazine will not change, it'll still carry weird, fantasy, and science-fiction.

The term 'Science Fiction Stories' was first used by Robert Lowndes just before World War II, when he titled his combined Future and Science Fiction magazine Science Fiction Stories.Lowndes later revived (in a sense) Science Fiction -Stories and added "The Original" to it. ((Although the actual name of the mag is Science Fiction Stories)). Paul Fairman changed the time-honored name of Amazing last year to Amazing Science Fiction Stories. On e announced title change for Fantastic was Fantastic Fact & Fiction, but it never came about.

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"SATURN"DISAPPEARS FROM 'DETECTIVE' EDITION:

NEY YORK, 23 May, (CNS) - The former science-fiction magazine Saturn Science Elction that became a detective magazine Saturn Web Detective Stories has changed its name to plain Web Detective Stories with the current July 1959 issue. It still carries the Science Fiction Book Club ad on the 'two rear covers, one of the few magazines, s-f or otherwise, that still does so. The current issue was delayed a month in coming out. It was suppose to be dated June and actually was dated July. Collectors might note an error in the numbering of the April 1959 issue of this magazine. It was suppose to be numbered Vol. 2 No. 2 and was actually numbered

Vol. 2 No. 3. This has been corrected with the current issue.

# IN GENERAL:

Venture Science Fiction Magazine that folded last year has been combined, after a fashion, with Fantasy and Science Fiction. The current, July 1959, issue states on the contents page: "Fantasy And Science Fiction, including Venture Science Fiction". This keeps the name alive, and the possibility of revival of Venture if and when Mercury Press thinks such a move would be wise.

Mack Reynolds who has been touring Europe and writing for the men's magazines is currently working on a lengthly story f o r Astounding which takes place in Moscow.

Larry Shaw divorced on May 5, 1959. The former Mrs. Lee Shaw will resume her maiden name of Lee Hoffman.

There is a rumor afloat that a science-fiction magazine (35¢ type) might become a pocket-book series.

Starting with the next issue, October 1959; ((9th Anniversary issue)), Galaxy Magazine will use heavier stock on their covers. This will be a good deal as the present thin cover is a bit too thin for the job it has to do. The British edition of Galaxy beat the "home" edition to it, their first 196 pager #72 has a very heavy stock on their covers. In fact the interior paper is also much heavier andit bulks up the whole issue to almost twice the thickness of the US edition. The reason why thin paper was still used after the mag went 196 pagers was that Guinnhad a suplly of such paper on hand and had to use it up first.

Arkham House is just getting set to release a new bulletin which will publicize dates for forthcoming titles. First of all, AH is handling the penultimate Stanon & Lee titles - WILBUR, THE TRUSTING WHIPPOORWILL, a whimsy for pixilated adults by Derleth & Dwig - (Clare Victor Dwiffins died last October a t 84, and this is his last work); this book comes out this month (May) at \$2. Then; Summer 1959, two chap-books, paperbound: ARKHAM HOUSE: THE FIRST 20 YEARS (\$1.00), and SOME NOTES ON H. P. LOVECRAFT (\$1.25). I n October, 1959, our 20th anniversary volume, THE SHUTTERED ROOM & OTHER PIECES, by Lovecraft & Divers Hands, \$5.00. In April, 1960, Clark Ashton Smith's THE ABOMINATIONS OF YONDO, \$4.00. ... \$4.00 seems to be the set price now for the standard AH collection. ... Coming up after YONDO will be La Spina's INVADERS FROM THE DARK, Wakefield's STRAYERS FROM SHEOL, Derleth's T H E CHATEAU, Long's THE HOUNDS OF TINDALOS, and Howard's SKULL FACE & OTHERS.

Of other non-publishing news, I divorced my wife March 23, and I was given custody of our children, April Rose - almost 5, and Walden William, almost 3.

If AH chapbooks catch on, we may do others.... Best - selling new books from AH in the past 6 years have been THE SURVIVOR & OTHERS and THE RETURN OF SOLAR PONS. Both are over 50% sold.

# HEARST BUYS AVON

Avon Pocket-size books, plus all other titles published by Avon Publications, Inc., all company titles, copyrights and goodwill, plus inventory have been bought by the Hearst Corporation. No purchase price was given out. It will be operated in the future as the "Avon Division" of Hearst Magazine who have been distribting Avon books for the last seven years.

Avon has and is publishing numerous science-fiction/fantasy pocket-books. At one time it published digest-size Avon Fantasy Reader and Avon Science Fiction Reader, plus Out Of This World Adventures and 10 Story Fantasy, both pulp size, and Avon Science Fiction & Fantasy Reader, in digest-size. All but the last were edited by Donald A. Wollheim, now at the helm of the Ace science-fiction pocketbooks.

Avon was one of the first publishers of pocket-size books and has been in business twenty years.

One of the best comic strips in the world, I think, is one called Spirou, drawn and written (in the French language) by A. Franquin, and published in Belgium, France and Canada by Editions Dupuis, Fils & Cie. Spirou is the star of a biweekly comic magazine of the same name, and there have been published (at 1 as t count) some six hard cover volumes  $(8\frac{1}{2}" \times 12", 64$  pages in full color) exclusively dedicated to his adventures in Europe and lesser-explored parts of the world. The strip, a wonderful blend of humor and adventure, of cartooning and action-illustrating -- is hard to describe, but the author has t h a t story-telling ability which we associate with such writers as Edgar Rice Burroughs. (I am also tempted to describe it as a sophisticated version of the Mickey Mouse daily strip of the 'thirties'). Spirou is a boy, or young man, dressed in what appears to be a bellhop's uniform. His side-kick, Fantasio, not employed in one of the uniformed professions, is the inventor of various fantastic gadgets. This Buo is accompanied everywhere by something resembling a quirrel. There is a high proportion of fantasy in the strip, rendered surprizingly plausible by many comic and realistic touches. Unfortunately, each of the volumes cost about \$2 -- but they're worth it, if you like good comic strips and have a French-English dictionary handy. I got my copies from Editions Fides, 25 Saint James Street East, Montreal, Canada. -------

#### AUSTRALIAN SCIENCE-FICTION NEWS - - - -

PERTH, Australia, 19 May, (CNS) - Just out in Australia is one of the most important books to deal with science-fiction, ever published. It is "A HANDBOOK OF SCI-ENCE FICTION AND FANTASY", compiled and published by Donald H. Tuck. Published in two volumes at \$6.50, the mammoth 400-page work is a vertitable encyclopæedia of science-fiction. Everything, but everything is listed: authors' and their bibliographies; checklists of all the magazines; short histories of the magazines; exhaustive lists of hard cover books, paperback books, fan mags, in fact everything but comic books is listed (and the only reason Tuck has ignored the comics is because of lack of data on them). This must have been a labor of love for Tuck, and it is a definite MUST for every collector and science-fiction fan.
