SCIENCE FICTION STORIES" and "FUTURE" REPORTED FOLDED

NEW YORK, 29 February, (CNS) - From a reliable source we learn today that Robert Lowndes! two science-fiction magazines, Future Science Fiction and Science Fiction Stories have folded. It is not a t this time known if the current issues now on the stands, Future April 1960 and <u>Science Fiction</u> Stories May 1960, will be the last ones published. Our informative source states that there may have been one more issue of each in the works when the fold order was given and these possibly may come out. It is further reported that Columbia has given up all its pulp magazines, not the science-fiction ones alone.

A call to Columbia and a request to speak to Kowndes today resulted in the publisher Mr. Silberkleit answering the phone, a most unusual procedure. He informed us that Lowndes was at home. When asked if he still was publishing his two science-fiction magazines, he answered that he had issues on the stands. A n effort to reach Lowndes has so far been fruitless.

With the two Columbia magazines no longer with us, it leaves the field with six magazines (seven i f you count the United States Reprint Edition o f New Worlds). O f these, Fantasy & Science Fiction, Astounding, Amazing and Fantastic are monthly, and Calaxy and If are bi-monthly. (I f you count New Worlds that's also monthly). About the lowest number of magazines since the war. But notice that most are monthly magazines.

Columbia published its first science-fiction magazine Science Fiction in 1939, and added Future Fiction and Science Fiction Quarterly a little while later. In a short time Science Fiction and Future were combined, went thru a number of title changes and ended up with the title of Science Fiction Stories as the United States entered World War II. The magazine along with SFO folded shortly after. 1950 saw the revival of Science Fiction Stories a s Future Combined With Science Fiction Stories. This came out as Vol. 1 No. 1 and later changed its name to Future Science Fiction Quar-Science Fiction. terly was revived shortly after also as Vol. 1 No. 1. NOTES TO THE EDITOR

by Our Readers

Germany, 8 October 1959

Dear Mr. Taurasi,

I got <u>SF Times #322</u> and I saw onpage 4 some supports about the German SF Fandom which are not quite right. I think you must know the reality and so I've made up my mind to tell you.

First a chronik of the Gerfandom: The Science Fiction Club Germany was founded by Walter Ernsting and Wolf Detlef Rohr soon became business manager: Then the name of the SFCD was changed into Science Fiction Club Europe by Rohr and Ernsting. Soon the fans began to call for statutes and a regular executive committee. In fact W. D. Rohr had it already understood to change the clud fanclub SFCD into a bookclub and publishing house. He began to print the "Blick in die Zukunft" and it was all but no fanzine. But we all realized that too late,

In February 1959 we had a Con in Hannover and the fans asked Ernsting and Rohr whether they would 1 et the SFCE have statutes or not. Ernsting: YES: Rohr: NO! That was too muvn for the real fans and they left the SFCE, which was surely no fanclub, behind and founded the SF Union Europa. AFTER this foundation Ernsting left the SFCE behind cause the fans had elected him as President of the Union.

Although the name of the former SFC Germany was changed into that of the SFCE, the club was still in existence as the court of justice told is and Ernsting as President (Of SFCGermany and the Union)called the old executive committee together. They decided to transform the Union back into the SFCGermany. And so we now have our good old Science Fiction Club Germany back. In Unterwossen, where the 1959 Con took place, we elected the new executive committee of the club.

Now the owner of the bookclub SFCE, Rohr, who calls it a fanclub, was forced to give a real fanclub to the members cause they wanted so. He called it SFC Germany, too: but without any rights!

Another example for the business

methods of Mr. Rohr: One year ago the fahs Kirchmair (Austria) and Kwiay (Germany) haf the idea of an Science Fiction Union Europe. It was soon diskussed and planned in the fanmag of the SFCGermany, Andromeda. A 1 1 seemed okay and the EUROPEAN SF UNION should be founded at the Con in Unterwossen. One week before the SFCE (Rohr), haf his Con in Zurich and there fonded an European SF Union, telling all people it was his idea! In reality however Rohrs ESFU has only a few members.

In spite of that disturbance we founded our ESFU in Unterwossen but to get no difficulties with Rohr and to show all people that we only want peace un our fandom, we called it: EUROTOPIA -Federation of the European SF Vl. a lthough even the name ESDU was our idea.

Our members: SFCD - Germany, IGMU - Austria, SFG - Switzerland, SFV - Saar.

By the way, the name SFCE means Europe what needs Rohr an ESFU?? If the SECE is that wonderful ganclub he's always telling, the other European Clubs may enter and the name of the SFCE will get authorization, but they'll never do they even didn't enter his ESFU!

In the years '55, '56, '57 the document for the best German SF Novel, the "HUGO" was awarded by Walter Ernsting as Presedent of the SFCD (and SFCE President) In this year Rohr's SFVE awarded the "HUGO", cause Gernsback sent the document to the SFCE thinking, Ernsting and Rohr were still together in the SFCE! As Ernsting told him the facts he was at once ready to send a second document to the SFCDGermany. He wrote to him: "I would be glad to give this document to whom you ever select." But W. Ernsting renounced to make no confusion.

In reality the SFCE has no rights to award the "HUGO", But we, the SFCD want peace and no conflict in the fandom ans so we called o u r award the "ERNST H. RICHTER GEDACHTNISPREIS" i n rememberance of an well known fan and SF writer who died shortly. These are thefacts, Mr. Taurasi and y o u must not think that I want to speak ill of Rohr and Eisfeld, no; they a re personal friends of mine, but they can't tell you things which aren't right.

I would be glad if you would print that sectification about the Gerfandom
