

SCIENCE-FICTION TIMES, INC., CELEBRATES 25TH ANNIVERSARY

NEW YORK, l'June, (CNS) - Science-Fiction Times, Inc. is celebrating its 25th Anniversary this month. For a quarter of a century th is amateur publishing house has been producing science-fiction of one form or another under a number of company names.

In early June of 1937, the first amateur magazine from this company appeared. A hectographed amateur fiction magazine called <u>Cosmic Tales Quarter-</u> ly and featuring amateur science-fiction by writers, some of which have become the top science-fiction authors of today.

The first name for this company was Taurasi Publications. Inspired by the Philadelphia fan group (still meeting toady as the PSFS) coming out under the banner of Comet Publications,... the frame was changed to Cosmic Publications with the second issue of <u>Cosmic Tales</u>.

It was Richard Wilson who was responsible for the first newsmag published by this firm. Dick started a weekly hectographed news sheet in late 1937. It ran items on the light side and mostly of fan doings. It was also the first WEEKLY s-f fan publication. Taurasi read in The New York Times in the Spring of 1938 that <u>Anazing Stories</u> had been

sold to Ziff-Davis. He inmediately sent the item via Post-Card to Dick for his paper. Dick treated the news with dis-This started the wheels going, belief. as Taurasi believed that this should have been big headline news. In the early Spring Taurasi had given the rights to Cosmic Tales to Robert G. Thompson; who had been unable to continue it, Taurasi felt that he was responsible for the unfilled subs to Cosmic Tales, and had a desire to try his hand at pub-Lishing a weekly paper to present the news as he would like to see it present-He combined both these problems in ed. July of 1938 by starting Fantasy-News as a weekly newspaper for the Summer, and used it to fill out the subs of Cosmic Tales. (Cosmic Tales eventually went to Louis Kuslan who continued it for about a year.) Well, Fantasy-News was a surcess and Taurasi published it weekly for about a year and a half, then turned it over to Will Sykora who carried it on in one form or another until 1949.

Cosmic Publications carried on with numerous small publications until 1941 when Taurasi dissatisfied with w h a t Sykora was doing with <u>Fantasy-News</u> began <u>Fantasy-Times</u>, a title he had used as a professional column in 1940 in

During the month of May 1962, 8 paperbacks came out costing \$4.10 and containing 1,391 pages.

Hornig's Future Fiction. At that time Cosmic Publications became The Fantasy-Times Publishing Co.

The name Cosmic Publications returned in 1945 when Taurasi and Ray Van Houten met overseas in La Harve, France and produced weekly editions of <u>Fantasy-Tim-</u> es there, while Sam Moskowitz continued with a few editions at home: On his discharge from the Army in 1946, Taurasi once more took over <u>Fantasy-Times</u> and has been editor of it since.

Cosmic Publications became Fandom House in 1948. It 'was incorporated in 1957 as Fandom House, Inc. Random House, Inc. objected because it was too similar to their title, and Fandom House; Inc., became Science-Fiction Times, Inc. i n 1958.

Science-Fiction Times, Inc., has produced many firsts in the science-fiction field including in 1961 of being the first amateur company to buy a professional title. They bought <u>The Original Science Fiction Stories</u>, and a r e now in the process of producing their first issue.

During their first twenty - five years, Science-Fiction Times, Inc. publications have won many awards. Two "Hugo"s. One in 1955 and the other in 1957. They have also won numerous awards at the Edison Hobby Show thru the years. Science-Fiction Times, Inc. is the oldest anateur publishing house in science-fiction, while one of its publication, Science-Fiction Times is the oldest subscription amateur paper in science-fiction.

Jay a n d Frank didn't publish an Annual last year t o cover the Seattle (SeaCon) World Science Fiction Convention because Jay couldn't get there and he wants to make sure he gets the right pictures. But this year, <u>Convention Annual #2</u>, "Chicon III Edition 1962" will be published as both Jay and Frank will be there.

This coming <u>Annual</u> will be bigger and cover more. Instead of 20 photooffset picture pages, it will have 24. The text pages will also increase 20-30% making it a huge book of about 60 pages, 81" x 11". Photo - offset pictures and mimeographed text.

Prepublication price is \$1.60, while regular price is set at \$2.00 (after December 10, 1962). We suggest that you order a copy right now at the above address. It is a fine publication, one you should have in your files.

The latest from Arkham House is that "Lonesome Places by August Derleth (\$3.50) is already out. This 4th collection of weird tales by August Derleth include many of his best, written since publication of "Not Long For This World" in 1948. It contains 18 stories: Cover jacket by Clarence John Laughlin, design by Gary Gore.

"Dark Hind, Dark Heart": The proofs to this book have just gone back to the printers and the jacket is following. T h is is a collection of never-before published horror stories - fourteen of them - together with two published long ago and since revised by their authors. Among the authors in this collection are Robert Bloch, Robert E. Howard, David H: Keller, M. P. Shiel, and H. P. Lovecraft. \$4.00.

Planned for 1963 from Arkham House are: "Collected Poens" by H. P. Lovecraft, with 18 fantastic illustrations by Frank Utpatel, who did the illos for HPL's "Shadow Over Innsmouth"; "Who Fears the Devil?" by Manly Wade Wellman (the John stories); a n d "The Dark Man and Others" by Robert E. Howard (uncollected weirds). These will probably sell for \$4.00 each.

The Lovecraft "Selected Letters", in three volumes, will begin publishing in 1964.

MAD, the non-science-fiction magazine, that so many science-fiction fans love and follow, celebrated its 10th Anniversary with the July 1962 issue (#72). <u>Mad</u> started out as a "comic" by Milliam M. Gaines, who still holds that position and is one of the "pure" American type magazine' such as <u>Playboy</u> and <u>Famous</u> <u>Monsters</u>, tho of course it is as far removed from these examples as possible.

Gaines will be remembered for his outstanding science-fiction comics in the early 50s. They have never been equalled, altho Schwartz's <u>Strange Adventures</u> and <u>Mystery In Space</u> still being published are also tops. Gaines and h i s crew that wrote and illustrated his s-f comics attended many "Fanvet" sciencefiction conventions and still follows science-fiction.

Congratulations Bill Gaines a n'd your staff on an excellent non-s-f mag.

The latest <u>MAD</u> paperback is "Had's Maddest Artist --Don Martin Steps Out!". 224 pages of Martin's MAD-Mad-mad drawings, for only 50¢. Published by Signet, #D2107. If you like Don Martin's stuff, and we do, you'll love this book!

Saturn WEB Detective Stories, a thirdgrade mystery-sex-horror magazine o f very poor quality, whose last issue was dated September 1961, has just come out with another issue. Now it has changed its name to TEB Terror Stories and publishes a collection of the worst stories ever put together in a professional magazine (Shock Magazine is about the only mag that comes close to it). It now publishes pure sex-horror-torture stori-112 pages for 35¢, published biės. monthly. What makes this a science-fiction item. This horrible magazine started out as Saturn Science Fiction in the '50s and was edited by Don Wollheim. At one time John Giunta was Art Editor. It is the only science-fiction magazine that I know of that continued on as some thing other than a s-f mag (officially that is) after its science-fiction days were over. Oh yes, this first horroris-sue contains a s-f story, "Orbit of the Pain-Hasters" by Arthur P. Gordon.

REVIEV IN BRIEF: American-International's Survival (a picture also called, at one time or another, The End of The Morld and Panic in the Year Zero) would-'ve disappointed me i f I had been expecting anything. Predictably, however, it was a drab story of a "typical" American family (if a family headed by Ray Milland and having Frankie Avalon as a son can be considered typical) and what happens to them after an atomic attack. There will be no surprises to anyone familiar with either the typical B-picture or any of the many s-f stories on this theme written since 1945. Acting and direction (by Milland himself) do nothing to help, nor is the story treated at all believably, despite attempts at authenticity. This is one to stay away from.

NEWS ITEMS: American-International has already released <u>Assignment Outer Space</u> in some areas. It is a foreign-made (Germany?) color spectacle, dubbed into English, featuring (according to' a friend of mine, who saw it in New Jersey) excellent special effects. More on this one when and if it plays New York.....An English firm plans a film version of "The Borrowers", a well-known children's fantasy......Another Tarzan film will be released soon, after a long

delay since the last one. The title is Tarzan Goes to India. Former Stunt man Jock Hahoney is the latest in the long line of actors to play the ape man. The same form plans at least one more Tarzan picture, again with Mahoney Robert Mise, winner of an Academy Award and director of The Day The Earth Stood Still. is now filming Jackson's "The Haunting of Hill'House" in England. The 'H-G-H release, with Julie Harris starred, will be called The Haurting Soon to be released is The Three Stooges in Orbit (:).....Later, from Disney, will come Son of Flubber, a sequel to last year's successful Absent-Minded Professor, with much the same cast as the first film.
