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LEO MARGULIES BUYS "SHORT STORIES" AND "WEIRD TALES"

WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE "WEIRD TALES" REVIVED?

New York, 23 July, (CNS) - Just a short announcement that may be of interest to SCIENCE-FICTION TIMES and its faithful reader-fans. I have recently concluded negotiations for the purchase of SHORT STORIES. As you may know, this fine old magazine has been in continuous publication for sixtyeight (68) years. My first issue of SHORT STORIES will hit the newsstands about October 1st. It will be the only magazine in this country to publish a variety of fiction; every conceivabletype of story will be used from time to time. It will be subtitled "A Man's Magazine" - which in itself tells the story of SHORT STORIES.

SHORT STORIES will be digest-size, 128 pages, 35¢ and bi-monthly.

In taking over SHORT STORIES, I also acquire its long and honored inventory of subsidiary rights, all copyrights, on material previously published. The first issue printed by us will be whole Number 2004; so this gives you an idea of the tremendous amount of published material to date. I also acquired all subsidiary rights to the very famous WEIRD TALES, from its first issue until it discontinued publication. I haven't even counted the number of stories available to me. This now means I have at my disposal material from SHORT STORIES and WEIRD TALES.

Of special interest, probably, to the fans is the fact that SHORT STORIES will reprint material from both sources. However, I shall use a minimum of reprint fiction; most of the stories, in each issue, will be brand-new. For instance, in my first issue I'm going to-use a short novelet entitled NIME LIVES by Clifford D. Simak, and this is a new story. I will also reprint THE LAKE by Ray Bradbury, from WEIRD TALES. Every

issue of the magazine will use a science fiction piece, preferably a brand new story and a reprint from WEIRD GALES. The first issue will also contain a new Western story by George C. Appell and a reprint Western by Ernest Haycox. An action-adventure reprint by Luke Short and new stories by Walt Sheldon, Georges Carousso, Frederick Nebel, among others.

Incidentally, I am seriously considering reviving WEIRD TALES. I am wondering if there is a strong enough demand for such a revival. I'd try to bring back the real old magazine of the Farnsworth Wright days, and if I did, I would not make it a reprint magazine. Of course, I'd use two to four of the famous old stories; concentrating, if this is possible, on reprinting material not published in book form or in anthologies. But this must remain a project of the future. Maybe response f r o means readers wight help

your readers might help.

The up-coming October 1957 issue of SATELLITE SCIENCE FICTION will have a rather splendid full-length novel, ROCKET TO LIMBO by Alan E. Nourse, and will run from page 4 to 102. There'll be three short stories; THE TEMPTER by Robert Bloch, DOOM OVER KAREETA by John Christopher and BONE OF CONTENTION, a short-short by Walt Sheldon. Also, an interesting article entitled TENNESSEE WILLIAMS, BOY WONDER by the inimitable Sam Moskowitz*. Sam discovered that Tennessee Williams probably sold 'his first short story to WEIRD TALES, at the amazing age of fourteen (14). *see issue #274 of the TIMES.
