First Issue of Vanguard ue on Newsstands During January, 1958

NEW YORK, 30 Oct. (CNS) -- The 1st issue of "Vanguard Science Fiction", new magazine edited by James Blish, is now completed and will be on the stands in January, Blish reported today. It will be dated March, 1958.

The line-up for the second (May)

issue is also almost complete.

The first issue of the magazine has an Emsh cover, illustrating "S O S, Planet Unknown", lead novelette by A. Bertram Chandler.

"This is the best Chandler I have ever seen, superior even to Giant Killer'", Blish declared. "It's brand new -- it was completed by Chandler in Australia September 1 -- and we were lucky

to get such a fast look at it."

Backing up the 15,500-word Chandler will be two other novelettes: "The Strad Effect", by Raymond F. Jones, and "Mirror, Mirrow", by Alan E. Nourse. The short stories will be "I've Been Trying To Tell You" by Gordon F. Dickson, and "Wind" by Charles Fontenay.

Also tentatively included is "When The Shoe Fits" by James E. Gunn.

"We're not sure about the Gunn, however", Blish added. "It was a deadline Purchase and may get crowded into the second issue. That depends on howmuch space we have to devote to advertising, which isn't determind yet."

The first issue will also include initial instalments of L. Sprague de Camp's regular column, "Wonders Ar e Many", a n d book reviews (titled "The Tales They Tell") by Lester del Rey.

"This is all hard copy", Blish reported. "Pure s-f is not so difficult to get as some of the complaints I've been hearing suggested. Once the writers and agents knew that I really wanted it, they saw to it that I got it. Incidentally, I asked for rewrites in only two instances for this issue."

TITLE STANDS FAST

The persistance of the "Vanguard" title of the magazine after the Russian satellite shoot of Oct. 4 was explained by Blish as follows:

"We decided to let it stand, because we still hope to be in the vanguard among s-f magazines." be said. "After all, we are not in the satellite business, and we never did want people to think we were. We're in the fiction business, and for what we have in mind 'Vanguard' is as good a name as it ever was."

Blish was also one of the founders of the now defunct Vanguard Amateur Press Association, as well as of Van-

guard Records./
Interior illustrations for the first issue a r e by Emsh and by Kelly Freas.

Lead novelette for the May issue will be "Reap the Dark Tide," a 20,000worder by C. M. Kornbluth. The cover story will be "Mine Host, Mine Adversary", a novelette by Lester del Rey, with the cover again by Emsh. Several short stories are already in for that issue.

Universal-International will make "Gulliver's Travels" in 1958. It will be "a..big project", according tvo Edward Muhl, vice-president of the company. The screenplay will be by Jack Sher and Arthur Ross. Sher will also direct.

George Pal is filming "Tom Thumb" at the MGM-British studios in London.

MGM will film "The End Of The World" in New York. Film will star Harry Belafonte! Sol Siegel is the producer and Ronald MacDougall the director.

Another picture which will also be released by MGM is "Underwater Warrior", to be produced by Ican Tors, and currently shooting at San Clemente Island. It will star Dan Dailey, Claire Kelley.

American-International pictures is filming "The Fantastic Puppet People" and will star John Agar; produced and directed by Bert I. Gordon.

By the way, the "Tom Thumb" picture men-

tioned above will also be released by MGM. It stars Russ Tamblyn, Alan Young.

"The Colossus Of New York", a psychological shocker yarn", has been set by Paramount for commencement in December. William Alland is the producer.

Walt Disney will film in Ireland a liveaction Irish Fantasy, "The Wishes Of Darby O'Gill", based on stories by Herminie Templeton Kavanaugh. Barry Fitzgerald may play two roles in the picture. Also being planned by Walt Disney (according to a pocket-size girly magazine I was glancing through recently) is "The Rainbow Road T o Oz!" I've never seen any mention of it elsewhere. It might possibly be "The Road To Oz".

Jules Verne's "From The Earth To The Moon" has been set for a November start by Benedict Bogeaus, who wants Errol Flynn to lead the cast. Screenplay is by Robert Bless with production designs by Hal Cox and special effects by Lee Zavitz.

"The Abominable Snowman" got a fairly good review in The Hollywood Reporter. It was made by Regal in England, stars Forrest Tucker and will be released in this country by 20th-Century Fox.

Ray Bradbury is suing TV writer Robert Alan Arthur on the grounds that his Playhouse 90 drama, "A Sound Of Different Drummers", borrowed too freely from his novel "Fahreneit 451". Arthur claims that he has never read the book, but Bradbury doesn't believe him. He says that his agents were approached by Arthur in the Spring of 1955 and that Arthur wanted to negotiate for a telecast of "Fahrenheit 451" for the Philon-Goodyear TV Playhouse, for which he was then story-editor. A script by Jerome Bixby, "It", has been purchased by Robert E. Kent of Peerless Productions. This company has eight science-fiction titles registered with the Motion Picture Actors Association.

Amazing Will Jump To 144 Pages With March 1958 Issue

"FANTASTIC" LOSES "SCIENCE FICTION" LOGO

New York, 15 November, (CNS) - Paul Fairman announced today that the circulation of his magazine, Amazing Stories, has been going up of late to such an extend that he will add 16 pages with the March 1958 issue. This will bring it up to Galaxy Science Fiction in the number. of pages department, each with 144 pages, but still leaves Astounding Science Fiction as king-pin with 162 pages*.

For a while last year Science Fiction Stories added 16 pages, but dropped them later. All other magazines in the

field** have 128 pages or less.

Starting with the March 1958 issue, Amazing Stories, will feature a book-length novel (approx. 40,000 words) in each issue. This will be set in special type, so that the whole novel can be published. Most departments will be dropped except the readers' column. The first novel will be "The Space Egg" by Russ Winterbottom. Also, Amazing will add a Science Editor, Dr. Barron to its staff. Dr. Barron will do a science article for each issue.

Starting with the March 1958 issue "Fantastic Science Fiction" will drop the 'science fiction' part of its name, and will revert back to plain "Fantastic". It will key-note light fantasy in' its stories, the science-fiction stories and other types will also be published.

The boys at Fandom House are mighty proud of their Science-Fiction Times' art editor, John Giunta. He is the only man in the history of science-fiction to do all the interior illustrations in two science-fiction magazines. John has been doing all the interior illustrations in Saturn since the first issue. Now the current Venture Science Fiction has come out with all interiors by John Giunta.

John Giunta also did all the cuts in the first issue of Satellite Science Fiction, but that doesn't quite count.

Some of the artists in the past who have done complete interiors and covers have been Frank R. Paul for Wonder Stories and Leo Morey for Amazing Stories, and only this year Frank Kelly Freas did the cover and all interiors for Astounding Science Fiction. Oh yes, and there was Marchioni who did a whole issue of Startling Stories and several complte issues of early Thrilling Wonder Stories, and of course Wesso who did complte covers and interiors of some Clayton Astounding Stories, and perhaps others.

The British Street & Smith Detective Monthly recently went digest-size and 64 pages and reduced its price from 1/9 to 1/-. But while the pulp-size reprinted a Doc Savage novel in almost every issue, none have appeared in the digest-size issues. The mag is published by Atlas who also publishes the British Astounding Science Fiction.

We are most happy to note that Bill Hamling is thinking it over twice before he begins his flying saucer column in his magazines. He stated in the January Imaginative Tales that there was little readers response to the column. Natch, old boy, you are suppose to be putting out a s-f mag, and your readers are suppose to be s-f readers—'n ot flying sauver nuts. Believe me, Bill, stickto s-f and leave the occult alone. It'll pay off in the long run.
