COMMENT IN GENERAL

The Spring issue of Blanet and the January issue of Astounding offer an unusual amount of comparative basis as both Kutt ner and McDowell have a story in each mago. The difference bet ween the covers is directly proportional to the difference between the stories in the two mags. Astounding has presented an issue in which all the stories are likable. Received TNFFF: Tucker disagrees with the vote of the Directorate on Daugherty's fan census and wonders whether the NFFF wasnt founded upon the principle of aiding fans in worthwhile pursuits. The reason that I voted 'no' was because I thought the idea was to aid fandom in worthwhile pursuits whereas the Daugherty proposal seemed to be one of aiding a fan in a worthwhile pursuit of his. Beneficial results to fandom as a whole were secondary.

An analysis of the election with respect to Dunk's campaigning leads us to this conclusion; regardless of Dunk's recommendations for the directorate the result would have been substantially the same because there were so few names on the ballot. Write in candidates are notoricusly unsuccessful. The only case in which we can partially judge fandom's reactions to Dunk's recsisting in laney versus Sneary where Laney won by only seven votes. Sneary probably benefitted under the set up but if there had been more names on the ballot I doubt whether he would have been so close.

Speer, in Stefnews, says that 126 ballots out of around 180 wasnt so bad. At present it isnt but hwhen servifen are back and things are more nearly normal 126 returns out of 180 will be bad. Very bad. Ken Krueger in his latest QX subscribes to the idea that the election was a farce. Well, I'll tell you right now that there's not very much for a director to do so let's see about ten or fifteen fans come forward next year for those offices. Constitutionally Warner and I will be ineligible next year. One thing I'm glad of and that is that at least one man came forward this time for the presidency. If executive candidacies continue to be as scarce we'll have to amend the succession clause.

A DISCUSSION OF PHILOSOPHICAL CONSIDERATIONS

In philosophizing about man and men's relations with other men Nietzche, the German philosopher, looked for a fundamental base and thought that he had discovered it when he promulgated his world renowned concept "the will to power". On this basic idea he erected a strongly individualistic philosophy which is believed to be the philosophical background of Naziism by many of our contemporaries. The fact is, I believe, that Nietzche made a mistake in selecting too narrow a basis for his concept of human motivation and erred further in ascribing the definite value of a basic desire to the will to power when it is more generally a satisfaction than a dreiv.

could it be that the basic of a rational being such as man is conscious desire and that such desire is divisible into two

parts --- desire to live and desire for happiness.

Conscious desire is a product of the faculty of realization and is not to be confused with 'instinct' or what might otherwide be called natural impulse or natural desire. For instance, the 'conscious' desire exhibited by man is not the same as the 'survival instinct' of lower animals. This is not the to say that man does not have the natural impulse toward survival. The survival instinct is a natural impulse independent of conscious realization.

han has a developed sense of identity and it is this identity which he consciously seeks to preserve as life. This powerful compulsion toward preservation of identity is the underlying

motivation of religione

The desire for happiness is not a single factor as is the desire to live because happiness is a compound abstract varying with different individuals. An example showing the difference between a simple desire in a man and the same one in a lower animal:

In a dog the sex instinct is completely natural and therefore normal and unperverted, in man the sex instinct is transformed by the faculty of realization into conscious desire which is subject to the intellect and its reactions to ideological environ-

ment. Consequently, man has sex perversions.

We see evidence of the complementary nature of the two elementary conscious desires in the observed fact that as man's desire for happiness is frustrated to the breaking point he loses simulateneously the conscious desire to live. In probably the majority of cases the resultant impulse to suicide (conscious compulsion) is sidetracked by the natural (subconscious) instinct for preservation of the life which accomplishment is achieved by loss of the faculty of realization, i.e. becoming insans.
