The deadline for Banquet tickets has been extended to April 1st.

Among possible consequences, he foresees trouble for younger fans, danger to 3rd-class mailing privileges, and even a chance of disrepute becoming attached to s-f conventions. Tom Bulmer added that Wertham seems to have preconceived notions that his findings will uncover startling disclosures on drugs and obscenity. Furthermore, said Bulmer, the Foundation will likely believe everything Wertham tells them. Sam Moskowitz suggested that since Wertham seems to believe fandom is made up of adolescents and comic book collectors, he should be invited to speak at ESFA to meet a mature group.

Fred Lerner plugged the Tanstaafl-Con to be held on Feb. 14 at the State Uni-

versity campus, Binghamton, N.Y.

Sam Moskowitz confirmed a long-time rumor regarding the Stanley G. Weinbaum memorial edition of Dawn of Flame, 1938. He has obtained one of the reputed six copies of the variant edition with a Raymond A. Palmer introduction. This introduction was objected to by Mrs. Weinbaum, and a different introduction by Lawrence A. Keating was substituted in the remainder of the edition.
