Minutes of ESFA Meeting of May 3, 1970 -The meeting was opened at 3:15 p.m. by Vice-Director Mike Deckinger, with an attendance of 19. Deckinger announced that the banquet meeting had been postponed to the 2nd weekend of June. The Secretary's minutes and Treasurer's report were given and accepted.

News items were given by Les Nayer and Bob Weinberg. Mike Fogaris said that Erwin Porger, as biographer of ERB, had a letter in the NEW YORK TIMES book review section asking for letters written by Burroughs. Sam Moskowitz, who had seen the Tarzana files, said he couldn't see the necessity of this, as Burroughs kept carbon copies of every letter he wrote. In connection with this, Sam said that his new book, Under the Moons of Mars, containing a quarter-of-a-million words, and partly researched at Tarzana, would be published by Holt, Rinehart, and Winston on June 4, at \$7.95.

Mike Fogaris reported a new biography on Max Brand. Sam Moskowitz reported a Zane Grey biography by Frank Gruber from World at \$6.95, and one on Dashiell Hammet by William F. Nolan at \$7.50 for 170 pages: He recommended both. Sam also reported that Hans Stefan Santesson had a heart attack and was in Bergen Pines Hospital in Paramus, New Jersey. Mike Deckinger said that a book on Churchward's Mu had just come out. Moskowitz said that there was a forthcoming book on pulps for which he had recommendations to the editor, who had used Sam's collection to pick stories. Sam also reported a bibliography of Brle Stanley Gardner from Kent State College Press, and a Study of SF at \$3.95 from John Knox University. Sam commented that with all this attention to pulps and their writers, America seems to be belatedly discovering a segment of its basic culture. Milt Spahn said that bibliographies of SF writers are in demand from rare book dealers. Many would-be bibliographers are not aware of work already in existence. Advent is doing an up-dating of the Tuck SF HANDBOOK. Spahn said that he had 885 hard-cover titles not in either Day or Bleiler.

Sam Moskowitz commented on the difficulty in getting complete bibliographic material, and observed that you are rarely praised for what you include, but are damned for your exclusions. Sam stated that there are no great bibliographic scholars; those there are merely feed on existing bibliographies, and repeat their original errors. Sam said that he now knew of 200 pen-names of writers, used in WEIRD TALES. This provoked some discussion when Mark Owings doubted that this had any significance.

Further discussion of the June banquet meeting disclosed that only 10 persons had signed up and paid. The suggestion was made that the affair be put off, possibly to coincide with the October Open Meeting. A committee was formed, consisting of Brian Burley, Mike Deckinger, Allan Howard, Sam Moskowitz, and Milton Spahn.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:55 p.m.


