

Since several SOTUJ readers have asked for some background info on the ed., we might as well kill two birds with one vignette, and introduce ourself to the FAPA members at the same time.

Born 20 March 1933, in Washington, D.C. Lived in the D.C. area most of our life (excepting five years at Gettysburg College-A.B. in Sociology & Psychology-and 61 years in U.S. Army Signal Corps as Cryptomaterials Specialist and the like). Spent four years in Herrie Olde Englande ('57-'61), courtesy of Uncle Sam (got back once, so far, in Summer of '67); married English girl (Stella Giles), had two children (Stephen--now age 12 and in 1st year of Jr. High, and Sharon, now age 10 and in 5th Grade), and drank in the culture/history/etc. insofar as it was possible to do so in four all-too-short years. (Have some marvellous tapes in our collection from the BBC) . Started reading science fiction (discounting such items as the Oz books and the like) with the May, 1948 issue of ASTOUNDING--one of the best all-around issues of an sf 'zine we've ever seen--after some encouragement from fellow-members of the National Capital Astronomers. Joined WSFL soon thereafter, in early 119, and was really hooked. Ignored "junk" like WEIRD T.LES and other now-valuable items for "better" stuff. and have regretted it ever since we started collecting seriously (ah, to have another chance....). Founded and ran clubs in high school and college; gave many lectures on the subject, ran exhibits, wrote amateur fiction. Started fanzine publishing with THE WSFA JOURNAL and THE GIMESLETTER in 1965, and have been overwhelmed ever since. Joined NFFF and NUAPA, and FAPA Waiting-List in late '65 or early '66, making FAPA in Nov. '71, at the worst possible time. Other SF 'zines published included several issues of THE WATION.L FANTASY FAN, TIGHTBEAM, THE LASER, and THE MASER for the NFFF, SENA for NUAPA (Amerind/APA-'zing: hopefully, will eventually be reborn as our major FAPA- zine), KITTLE PITCHERING HUBBLE DE SHUFF for Shadow-FAPA w1 (which was apparently never distributed), and later N'LPL, SLPS, and (when we don't send thru SOTIJ or something else) FAPA. Used to average three novels a day at college, but since we started pubbing, the only reading we get dome is at conventions, while on vacation, and while sick (5-7 books a year, i.e.). Sob! Main interests are bibliographic. collecting, and editing. Prefer good fantasy to sf.

Other hobbies and interests include intellectual games of skill (our w1 interest; publish THE GIMESMIN, a gaming genzine, and THE GIMESLETTER, general supplement to THE GLMESHAN, as well as a Postal Diplomacy 'zine, DIPLOPHOBIA (the only survivor of a host of Dippy 'zines including a genzine, UIPLOMINII, and a host of gameszines: SUPERCALIFR.GILISTICEAPLALIDOCIOUS, FANTASIA, AUX ARMES!, LETHE, DIPSOMANIA, ASTRA, SHANGRI-LA, THE EXCHANGE, HYDROPHOBIA, and a lot of others); also published RULESHEET PORTFOLIO series, YE FLEHIE CHESSE-MAN, and some other odds and ends; and am still running seven Postal Diplomacy games (out of 60/, many of them based on such sf works as ... simov's Foundation trilogy and Tolkien's Lord of the Rings). Main interest in this area is in history of games, and in reconstructing, studying, and then redesigning games from other times and places, as well as developing variants of existing games. with Other areas of interest include American (North, Central, & South) Indians, Cultural Anthropology, Classical & Ethnic Folk Music, magazine collecting, Philately, Ornithology & Natural History, Ancient & Meso-American history & archaeology, Hiking, Sports (spectator & board, mostly), writing, experimental psychology, recreational math, word puzzles, linguistics, astronomy, record & tape collecting, art, & other things which we forget for the moment Almost forgot. Worked as Administrator of National Prisoner Statistics program of the Federal Bureau of Prisons (editor & compiler, mostly) after leaving irmy in '63 until just recently, when switched over to Computer Programming (starting down at bottom, again). " " "Nuff for now. Maybe some more, some day

Neither mailing was particularly stimulating (although, this might reflect a loss of enthusiasm on our part, rather than a drop-off in content-quality). There were a few gems in the group---such as DIFFERENT, HOMIZONS, and DYN., TROM-but nothing like the F.P. mailings of old--or, for that matter, like the NAPA mailings in the hey-day of that organization a few years ago. Perhaps it's because the members, after having so long a wait on the waiting list, are old and jaded by the time they finally get in-having lost most of their "boyish" enthusiasm. Perhaps it's because, being generally older than the members of the "lesser" APA's, FAPA'ns generally tend towards more serious -- and "worldly" -- topics than with the younger ... Phins. Or, perhaps it's because F..Ph, too, is affected by the general malaise which seems to have afflicted APA's in general, with many of the former mainstays dropping out, waiting-list lengths growing shorter, size of mailings decreasing, and quality of contents falling. The trend nowadays seems to be towards local groups, with more frequent publishing schedules. But maybe FAPA will revive -- it certainly has a formidible list of members, and great poten--- DLM tial....
