In Brief --

Something a little different this time. We've been indexing our entire prozine collection, from the April, 1926 AMAZING to today, in a manner similar to that presented in the small index herein. (Small? Eight pages for three months' issues of six titles, four of them bi-monthlies? Wonder if we'll get the larger index finished before we die...) The TWJ #81 out in Feb.; 80 & 62 may be out in May.

Next is sue we'll return to the "normal" FAPA material (unless someone out there finds these indices of interest, in which case we might do one now and then).

As the index ran a bit longer than we had planned, we had to omit the AMATEUR PRESS coverage of FAPA Mailing #142 and the Index to Vol. 4 of SOTWJ, both of which should be with us in the next FAPA issue. In the interim, we'll be covering the major FAPA genzines in a coming SOTWJ.

Also note the fact that pages 3 and 4 are only half-pages. We would have gone for a full 12, but none of the postal scales on which we mailed a sample 12-page

issue could agree on whether it was under an ounce or not....

We hope there'll be some feedback on the "On Dreams and Dreaming" material in the coming FAPA Mailing, and that the authors will allow us to reprint it in SOTAJ for the benefit of our readers at large. We also welcome letters/contribs from FAPA'ns (and anyone else) with anything to say on the subject (or any subject); reviews are especially needed, as our folder is completely empty for the first time in years... ## Publishing problem still with us, & help still needed....

More Reader Feedback to "On Dreams and Dreaming" in SOTWJ #62 & Responses in #76:

I'm sorry not to have responded earlier to your questions on dreams. Perhaps you should make up a questionnaire. This would presumably garner more responses (by making it easier) and would also facilitate the collating of the information. Since nobody who has written to you up to now answered your questions in the exact order asked (even Tony Waters' numbered answers didn't quite correspond with the original series of questions), I will arrange my replies in the order which seems appropriate to me:

- (1) Frequency and Recall: Only in a few instances each month do I retain some specific memory from a dream after awakening. However, since dream experiences sometimes cop into my head later when triggered by a similar thought, I probably dream much more often than I consciously realize. My best chances of having conscious memory of scenes from a dream is apparently when something wakes me up in the middle of it. Thus it's hard for me to say if I've had more than one dream in a single night, except that I woke up in the middle of the night once recently and thought about a dream I'd been having, then in the morning I remembered scenes from a second dream and the fact of having had a first dream (but no specific scenes from it). Incidentally, I was told once that someone had woken me up the previous night and apparently received intelligible responses before I went back to sleep, but I had no memory of it at all. Even those dreams that I have some memory of fade to a couple of scenes or a basic situation after I get up, so I doubt I could write down most of a dream unless I had a typewriter under my pillow.
- (2) <u>Vividness</u>: I'm generally not aware of the colors of things, nor details of people or scenery. I never remember anyone's face. I expect, therefore, that my colorless dreaming is due to disinterest in anything but the main situation of the dream, rather than conditioning from hours of watching black—white TV as a child. I don't think it's an inability to visualize detail, as the main objects of the dream sometimes acquire detail. I have only one distinct memory of ever having noticed color in a dream, but the fact that it was one of my few science-fictional dreams may give it special status. It concerned a force-field with a violet glow being projected around a farm house by a spaceship, the details of which I've forgotten.
- (3) General Characteristics: And dreams, rather than having complete plot development including beginning and end, generally involve an activity for which the antecedents are not particularly clear, and which is still going on when the dream ends. Although I did have one recently in which I remember flying off into the sunset (in an airplane, I should probably add) and waving goodbye. But I expect that it wouldn't have ended there if I hadn't woken up at that point, because my intention, as I recall, was actually to fly to the sun--which would have taken awhile in that airplane.... I don't have any recurring dreams, nor have I had any nightmares since a couple of years ago when I saw my first horror movies. I have never dreamed of geometrical patterns or the like, rather than story-like events. I haven't dreamed of falling, floating, or flying since I was very young. I presumably wondered what falling felt like but had no intention of hitting the ground, so my falling dreams always ended up with my floating to a stop and then. flying around. People I know are never involved directly in my dreams. What I'm thinking about before going to sleep never seems to have had anything to do with what I dream about, nor have I noticed a correlation between any particular type of dream and a day of hard physical (or mental) labor. I have never gone back to sleep and continued the same dream, nor have I ever dreamed of falling asleep and dreaming.

(4) Subject Matter: Most of those dreams which I can recall upon awakening fall into three general categories: 1) adventure dreams in which I am trying to accomplish some definite task, 2) exploration dreams in which my principal activity is to make my way through passageways in some building or underground enclosure, and 3) anticipation of real-life dreams in which I imagine problems or situations that could confront me in the normal course of my life.

Type 1 dreams have included moving boulders to stop a flood, sneaking around with revolutionaries, hosting a conference between humans and aliens, trying to trace down what is happening to people who aren't arriving at the other end of a matter transmitter, and trying to buy illegal cigarettes in a totalitarian future and being chased by the police (which is odd since I don't smoke).

Type 2 dreams usually take place in department stores or other buildings, but I also had one dealing with a cave. Corridors, hidden staircases, ladders up to overhead trapdoors, have all featured in these. In addition to mere exploration, they can involve pursuing or attempting to elude someone, or a search for something, but the main interest seems to be the winding through lanyrinthine passageways. (Incidentally, I made the mistake of mentioning the ladders and staircases to a friend who was studying Freudian dream-interpretations.)

Typr 3 dreams are the only kind that sometimes pop into my head days later in response to some real-life thought resembling the dream situation. In fact it usually takes me a few moments of thinking about the memory in order to realize that it is a, memory of something I imagined rather than of something that really happened.

And, except for one dream in which I worked out the solution to some imaginary problem at work, the situation of the dream is usually not resolved. For instance, I dreamed I was in a used bookstore (oddly enough) and spied two copies of a rare SF novel. I needed a copy, and it occurred to me that one of my friends might also be looking for it for his collection, but I wasn't sure and I couldn't decide whether or not to buy both copies. End of dream.

(5) Awareness & Control of Dreams: I have never realized I was dreaming during the dream and been able to awaken myself, but I have experienced something similar. Twice I've become more-or-less conscious in the middle of the night and found myself apparently unable to move, which got me quite scared. After great mental struggle, I finally awakened to realize that I must have been dreaming, but I feel that there must have been something different about this situation than an ordinary dream. It appears similar to an experience mentioned by Tony Waters, and I wonder if it represents an actual physical condition of being half-awake with one's consciousness still trapped in one's imagination. Has anyone else ever had a dream of this sort?

Obviously I don't go to enough cons--I should be dreaming of hotels rather than department stores.

((Thanks for the interesting letter, George. We remember dreams best when we wake up slowly, and have time to lie and mull over them awhile before rising. We often play the role of observer rather than actor in our dreams (would like to see a movie or TV show thru the eyes of its star!). — On the basis of the responses so far received (your turn, FAPA....), we'll work on questionnaire.--ed))
