

#### TIDBITS

In Memorium: James Blish, who died at his home in Henley, England, July 30 '75, after a long illness, at the age of 54. Born in Orange, NJ, Blish and his second wife, Judy Ann Laurence, moved to the U K. seven years ago (his first wife was literary agent Virginia Kidd, by whom he had two children). Blish will be remembered for his many novels (most notably his <u>Cities in Flight</u> series) and his critical forays under the name of William Atheling, Jr. Coming so soon after the death of Will F. Jenkins, Blish's untimely death is a doubly sad event. ## <u>Rod</u> <u>Serling</u>, who died June 28 '75 in a Rochester, NY hospital of complications following ten hours of open heart surgery; he was 50. Born in Syracuse, NY, Serling was a paratrooper in the Pacific during WWII. He is best known for his TV scriptwriting (several plays, and the supernatural series <u>Twilight Zone</u> and <u>Night Gallery</u>) and his narration of several TV documentaries. He is survived by his wife, Carol, two daughters, and a brother (Robert) author of <u>The President's Plane Is Missing</u>. /Sources: Blish, WASH. POST 1/8/75; Serling, POST & WASH. STAR, 29/6/75./

The Media Scene: TV: ABC is filming The Night the Martians Landed, a two-hour recreation of Orson Welles' 1938 War of the Worlds radio broadcast and the panic that followed. Paul Shenar is cast as Welles, and Paul Stewartm from the orig. broadcast, will be a consultant to the TV adaptors /WASH. STAR 24/6/75; TV GUIDE/; Jim Nabors and Ruth Buzzi are doing children's TV series called The Lost Saucer, about a couple of humanoids ("humans that are computerized") living "all over the universe, getting around in our saucer" /TV GUIDE/. ## Misc.: Mark Owings reports a new b&w Doc Savage comic, large-sized, and "not based upon the novels". He also says that George Pal is doing a series of Doc Savage films, with Philip José Farmer writing the scripts starting with #3. And he notes that radio station WPFA, a new area station in the Pacifica Foundation network, will start broadcasting at year's end; it may have a Baltimore-based sub channel, WPFB; SF fare will consist of twice-weekly 15-minute SF book reviews, Sat. morn. one-hr. fantasy for children, occasional SF dramatizations, and a monthly  $\frac{1}{2}$ -hour program of SF music.

(8 titles), an Editor Index (for the prozines incl. in Part I), and a Title Index for crossreference with the Author Index. ## An invaluable reference work, one which will prove especially useful for libraries, universities, and researchers. Our one regret was that Part II wasn't able to include more (the pre-#70 TWJ's, e.g., included some excellent reviews -- and the SATURDAY REVIEWs from the early 1950's had some of the best SF book reviews we've seen in a regular column of SF book reviews, to give just two examples). But then, one could go on compiling reviews for years, and still not finish -- and such a book was sorely needed -- so we assume Hal did as much as he could, then cut off his indexing and sent the finished product in for publication. We hope future supplements will pick up some of the earlier reviews omitted from this volume, as well as include reviews published from 1974 on. ## In addition, while such a volume is invaluable to libraries, etc., it would be much more useful to the readers (esp. new readers looking for a "buyer's guide" to help them choose from all the titles being reprinted) if an "opinion rating" of some sort could have been included with the review entries; this is a project we've been working on for some time, and we hope some day we can include such a set of ratings in one of the supplements to the current volume. (Such a project almost has to be the work of one person, because of the degree of subjectivity involved in coming up with a consistent set of ratings.)
