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In Brief --

Well, it was a tight squeeze, but we made it! Got all of the fanzines roc'd during Aug. into one issue (along with books and prozines); doubt if this will be possible every month; so may cover them every 15 days or so instead of monthly.

Bad news--mimeo lapsed into coma Aug. 31, in midst of running off SOTWJ #61 (and messing up quite a few copies), so we have no way of getting anything at all published at the moment. (If you are reading this, at least a temporary solution will have been found....) As things now stand, we have #'s 61-66 of SOTWJ on stencil, with most of #67 done; also, TGL #43 and DIPLOPHOBIA #103 are mostly on stencil, as are issues 80 and 81 of TWJ (still delayed by missing electro-stencilled artwork). Should have at least temporary solution to problem by Sept. 16 (but then, should have had missing artwork by mid-May....).

Alph, by Charles Eric Maine (Nelson Doubleday, Inc., Garden City, NY; 1972; orig. pub. by Ballantine Books, Inc.; SFBook Club Ed.; 218 pp.; d.j. by Brad Holland) -- ". . . set in a far distant future when the widespread use of a new birth control tablet has drastically affected the birth ratio of males to females--until finally no male children are born at all. Only the perfection of parthenogenesis . . . saves the human race from extinction. But parthenogenesis can only produce more females, and when the last man dies, history begins again for a new humanity of only one sex." ## After 500 years, the frozen body of a man is found in the Arctic. His chromosomes and masculine DNA factor are transferred to a female ovum, and a living male embryo is produced. This poses serious social questions for the monosexual society; these questions are fed into the world computer brain network. The answer: if the child is allowed to live; society as they know it will disintegrate--so he must be destroyed. One of the labs scientists takes the baby from the lab, "and sets out to do what seems impossible--kidnap and care for the world's only male child in defiance of a ruthless totalitarian authority."
